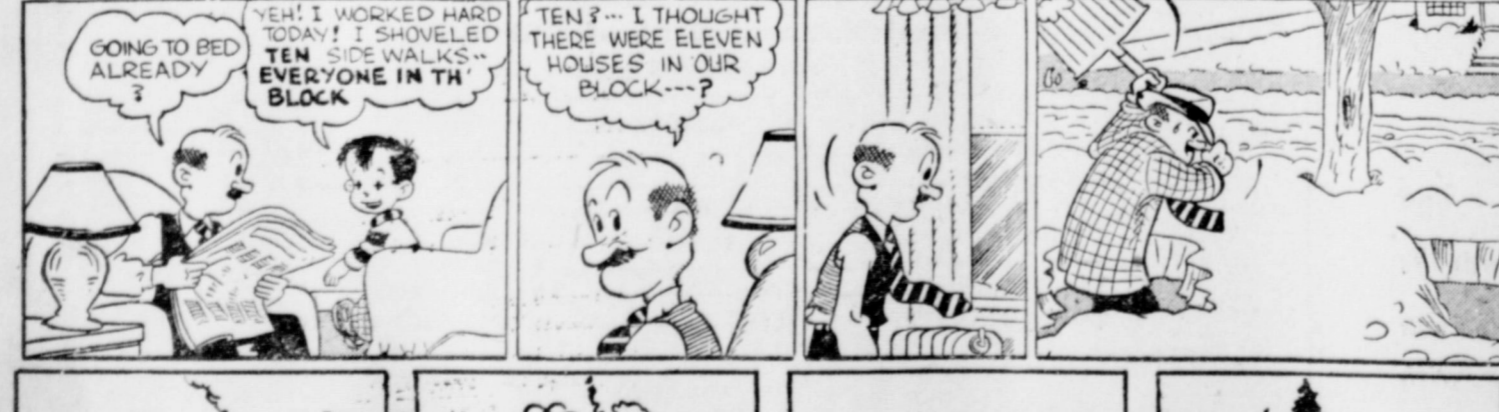

Vary the Salad With the Meal

Salad Parade

Salads lead the health parade because in them you eat so many fruits and vegetables before they get a chance to lose their vitamins and minerals. All through the ages people have turned to salads because they craved things fresh from garden and orchard. Besides, certain foods are more attractive and appealing served in their raw state, or in salad form.

Salads may accompany the main course, and then they are served on a side plate, but alongside the main course. If you want to entertain in a special way, the answer is a salad platter or salad bowl. Use fruit or vegetables as your taste dictates.

Don't forget the party or dessert salads which are in a class by themselves. These are full of fruit and even whipped cream, the fairy princesses of the salad world. Serve them for special occasions as a topping to a meal or as a party dish.

Frozen Banana Salad.

(Serves 10 to 12)

- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 tablespoons mayonnaise
- 2 3-ounce packages of cream cheese
- 2 tablespoons crushed pineapple
- 1/2 cup maraschino cherries, cut in quarters
- 1/2 cup walnut meats, chopped
- 1 cup cream, whipped
- 3 ripe bananas

Crisp greens
Add lemon juice and salt to mayonnaise and stir in cheese. Add pineapple, cherries and nuts; fold in cream. Add bananas, cut in cubes. Turn into tray and place in automatic refrigerator. Freeze until firm, then serve sliced on crisp greens.

Here's a pretty salad that may be served either as a special salad or as an accompaniment:

Ginger Ale Pear Salad.

(Serves 6 to 8)

- 2 envelopes plain, unflavored gelatin
- 1 No. 2 1/2 size can of pears
- 1/2 cup maraschino cherry juice
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1/4 cup lemon juice
- 1 1/2 cups ginger ale
- Few drops red coloring
- 8 maraschino cherries

Soften gelatin in 1/2 cup of the cold pear juice drained from can. Bring to a boil 1/2 cup pear syrup and stir in softened gelatin until dissolved. Add maraschino cherry juice, sugar, lemon juice and ginger ale. If a darker color is desired, add a few drops of red coloring. Rinse a shallow pan in cold water; arrange pear halves, cut side up in bottom. Top each with a cherry. Pour gelatin mixture over pears carefully so as not to dislodge pears. Chill until firm. To serve, cut gelatin into squares with a sharp knife and place on lettuce. Serve with desired dressing.

When you're serving a heavy dinner, there's nothing better than a crisp salad just bursting with vegetables. For example, a chef's salad is about the best choice, or perhaps a cole slaw.

A true chef's salad is composed mainly of some of the salad greens

such as escarole, romaine, lettuce, raw spinach, endive, watercress, dandelion greens or celery cabbage. They may be arranged bouquet style or shredded and tossed lightly with an oil and vinegar dressing (sometimes a french dressing) just before serving time.

One or more of the following may be added for variety if you want to tease the palate: Sliced radishes, chopped green pepper, diced cucumbers, cut celery, sliced stuffed olives, tomato sections, sliced pickle, sieved hard-cooked eggs, rolled anchovies, minced onion rings, garlic salt, celery salt, celery seed, or a light sprinkle of thyme, curry powder or chili powder.

Here are some tempting variations for a cole slaw type of salad:

Plain Cole Slaw: 4 cups finely shredded cabbage, 1 tablespoon celery seed, 1 cup cooked salad dressing. Optional additions: 1 tablespoon either dill seed or caraway seed or mustard seed.

Carrot Slaw: 2 cups grated or shaved carrots, 2 cups cabbage, 1 teaspoon minced onion, 1 cup boiled salad dressing.

Slaw Deluxe: 3 cups shredded cabbage, 1 cup diced banana, 1/2 cup chopped peanuts, 2 tablespoons catsup and 1 cup boiled salad dressing.

Pineapple Slaw: 2 cups shredded cabbage, 1 cup cut, drained pineapple, 3/4 cup boiled salad dressing, 1 tablespoon celery seed and dash of paprika.

Spanish Slaw: 1 1/2 cups cut cabbage, 1 cup diced tomatoes, 1 cup diced cucumbers, 1/4 cup chopped green pepper and 3/4 cup of boiled salad dressing.

Two molded salads that may be served as an accompaniment are a pretty addition to the table:

Molded Grape Salad.

(Serves 6)

- 1 1/2 tablespoons unflavored gelatin
- 1/2 cup cold water
- 1 cup orange juice
- 1 cup lemon juice
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1 cup seeded or seedless grapes
- 1/2 cup nutmeats

Lettuce
Soak gelatin in cold water for 5 minutes. Bring juices to a boil, add sugar and gelatin. Cool, and when thick, fold in grapes and nuts. Pour into individual molds and chill until firm. Serve in nests of lettuce.

Mixed Fruit Salad.

(Serves 6)

- 3 oranges, peeled and diced
- 3 slices canned pineapple, diced, or 1 cup pineapple tidbits
- 1 unpeeled red apple, diced
- 1/2 cup pitted dates, cut into pieces
- 1 cup seeded grapes, cut in half
- 1/2 cup mayonnaise
- 1/4 cup coconut, shredded, if desired

Mix fruit with mayonnaise and chill thoroughly. Serve on shredded lettuce; sprinkle with coconut, if desired.

Watercress is especially good with mayonnaise to which a bit of catsup has been added. Sliced radishes and chopped green pepper are also good additions.

Asparagus tips on a big slice of tomato seem tastier when served with a blue cheese dressing. Break up the cheese in french or oil dressing and add enough lemon juice for tartness.

The Money Men

Just where is all the nation's money? Probably we've all asked that question at some time. However, we don't have to go far to find a multitude of "experts" eager to point out the answer—their answer. These might range from the old wheeze about "90 per cent of the wealth in the hands of 10 per cent of the people" to other outdated adages just as economically unsound.

The real answer is simple enough. In investigating the possible culprits who command the nation's economy, most of us fail to consider ourselves. Yet many people think only of wealth as being controlled by a few. These usually are pictured as pompous capitalists exploiting the masses for their own gain. A more true picture could hardly exist.

Equal Shares

Actually, the distribution of the nation's money constitutes the most striking argument for freedom of endeavor in our country. Together with more than 80 million of his fellow employed workers, Mr. Average Citizen in 1945 took home some 114.5 billion dollars—71.1 per cent of the national income. As members of the largest group they received the largest share of the country's money. This is the natural consequence of democracy.

Wide distribution does not stop here. In the same period 15 per cent of the national income went to the proprietor class—the farmers, small businessmen, doctors, dentists, and other professional people. It is difficult to think of the local farmer, the corner grocer, or the family doctor as greedy exploiters. Through their own work and training they have provided themselves with a livelihood.

More Sharing

The remaining 12.9 per cent is again distributed. Rents, interest and dividends account for the major part, with corporate savings amounting to only 2.8 per cent of the national income. Included in rent income are large numbers of small property owners, whose rent-bearing holdings might be only a home or building. Then, too, thousands of small stockholders account for a good share of the interest and dividend income.

The 4.5 billion dollars earned as corporate savings is a far cry from the "profiteer" pictures painted by those who would change our way of economic life. For the most part, this is the source of the laboring man's income. This 2.8 per cent return to corporations is their share of a system which puts 71.1 per cent into the pockets of the employed man. As a minority group, corporations receive a minority share.

Despite these sobering statistics, there are many who would call for a change. There are those who would take the responsibility away from the individual and vest it in a central authority. It is paradoxical that these interests would "give the wealth to the people" in a nation where the majority of the people now receive the majority of the income. They would junk our successful economy to institute an unproved one—all to achieve an ideal which we have achieved already in greater measure than has any other country.

Make a Note OF THESE Lighting Tips



For bright and cheerful living in your home, you need plenty of the right kind of light. Floor lamps, table lamps, decorative lamps and all sizes and types of lamp bulbs are available now—see your electrical dealer.

These timely suggestions will help you have better light:

- Clean your new lamp bowls and lamp bulbs** frequently. You'll get 25 to 30 per cent more light.
- Select lamps with white shades or shades with white linings.** Repair them or relace them when they become soiled. Dark shades waste light.
- Sit close enough** to the lamp to get all the help it can give your eyes. A difference of a few inches may mean 50 per cent less light.
- Avoid direct glare** from lamp bulbs or bowl by using shades that are deep enough and big enough.
- Arrange lamps and furniture** so each lamp can serve two or more people, if possible.
- Place each lamp** so it puts no glare in the eyes of persons using it.

Soft Corn Requires Special Attention Several Methods Given For Profitable Feeding

Saving soft corn will be a problem facing many farmers this year. Much of the crop went in so late that frost became a factor in maturity, as well as in winter handling of the corn.



Next to chopping and feeding green, one of the best ways to get full value from soft corn is to put immature crops in the silo or pasture them off with cattle, hogs or sheep, Capper's Farmer points out.

Another method used by many growers in the last big soft corn year, 1945, was to build emergency cribs five to six feet wide. The farmers set two rows of poles in the ground, wired the tops together to keep the cribs from spreading, and fastened woven wire or slat cribbing on the inside of the posts. These cribs, built in east and west directions, took best advantage of prevailing winds.

Farmers in many northern areas, where corn is likely to be caught by frost before it is mature, regularly cut up large quantities and cure it as fodder. Ears later are husked by hand or with a shredder.

Most hybrid corns are stiff stalked and have a good root system. They will stand with few fallen ears well into the winter. Since ears will dry with less spoilage on a standing stalk, many farmers prefer to let hogs, cattle or sheep harvest the crop.

Some New Weed Killers Give Excellent Results

New weed killers to supplement 2,4-D are appearing with good reports. Quack grass and crab grass are two weed pests which 2,4-D does not control. IPC was developed in England during the war and now is giving good results in the control of quack grass, stolons and seedlings, in tests conducted by the U. S. department of agriculture. It is harmless to persons and to some broadleaf plants.

Be Patient About Your Baby's Growth

IF YOU'RE concerned about how your baby is growing, just give him the best possible care and be patient, advises Beulah France in an article in Capper's Farmer, one of the leading farm magazines. He will develop only as rapidly as nature intends.

"How fast your baby grows depends on 2 things," she writes in the magazine read by 1,300,000 farm families. "One is heredity—traits he inherited from both sides of the family. The other is environment—baby's surroundings—which include the food he eats and the treatment he receives."

In the early months, once a week is often enough to weigh your baby, she says. Later, once a month will be sufficient. Baby usually doubles his birth weight in 6 months. At one year he should weigh about 3 times his birth weight.

Your baby may begin to sit alone for a moment or two at a time when he is 7 months old. But he must not be propped and left that way. He will sit without support



and walk alone when his bones, nerves and muscles are ready for the effort. Between 12 and 18 months he will try to walk. By a year and a half he may be toddling. Between the ages of 2 and 3 he'll become an accomplished walker.

Some babies repeat a word or two as early as 10 months. But they generally don't know what they are saying. By a year, your child may call several things by name, including his father and mother. But do not expect a child to use phrases before he is 18 months old. Even babies of 2 years may not speak clearly.

"Don't use baby talk with your child," Miss France cautions. "Speak slowly, correctly, as you want him to speak when he grows up. It's unfair to teach a child a language he must later discard."

Herds and Flocks

Fall pigs should be kept gaining from the start. If they stop gaining it is harder to get them started again, and it takes more feed. Don't let them lose their milk fat.

Keep weeds cut under your electric fence, to prevent grounding. Set the posts at an angle and you can keep the weeds cut with the mowing machine.

Flush ewes before the breeding season—that is, feed them generously so they will be gaining at breeding time. Changing from scant to good pasture, or feeding some grain will put the ewes in better condition. Flushing results in more certain breeding.

Cows due to freshen in late fall should be dried off and given eight weeks of vacation to get ready for the blessed event. During this period, feed a fitting ration to keep the cow in good flesh and to develop the calf.

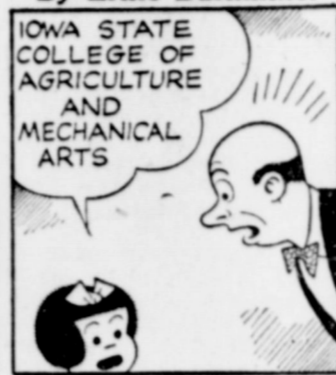

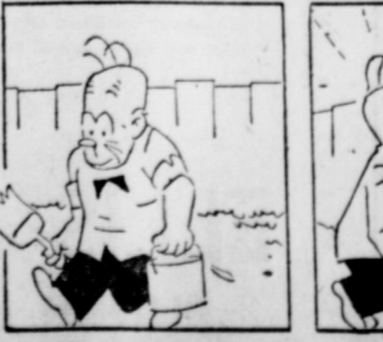

World Council Will Stand Or Fall on Public Opinion

WASHINGTON.—Here are some more notes from a reporter's notebook (of course, reporters don't really carry notebooks—they write on whatever is handy—this is a menu) at the United Nations.

Some of the people who are reading this column attended sessions of the United Nations. I think I recognized some of you. It was hard to get in because so many nations felt this session was so important that they brought much larger staffs than ever before. These "extra" workers couldn't sit in the seats reserved for delegates, nor the news people's, so they were given seats ordinarily handed out to the public.

For those of you who stayed home and listened to the radio or read the reports in the paper—well, what impression did you get?

Your impression is highly important, as I'll try to point out later.

There was, and is, this, danger, which Trygve Lie, secretary general of the United Nations, pointed out in a speech which stirred all the delegates who heard it (and you, too, I imagine, if you were listening) when he summarized it afterward over the ABC network.

Lie said: "... the peoples of the world, and many governments as well, are shocked, frightened and discouraged to find that those same nations which created the United Nations so openly disagree." He called for a rebirth of the "San Francisco spirit," the spirit which we all felt in those hopeful days when the United Nations was born.

A colleague of mine, a most restrained and thoughtful commentator (Pauline Frederick, with considerable experience here and abroad) told me something which is worth repeating. She was interviewing Eleanor Roosevelt at a luncheon at Hyde Park. Whatever you may think of Mrs. Roosevelt's domestic politics you must know in what high regard she is held as a member of the American delegation to the United Nations.

My colleague asked her if her heart weren't heavy over the world situation today. I haven't her exact words here, but Mrs. Roosevelt replied in the negative. She said we had expected too much too soon from the United Nations. And then she went on to point out what so many of the delegates have said, namely, that faulty and ineffective as the United Nations may be, it is far better than nothing. How many times have I heard that from even the most cynical of the reporters and observers here!

As the New York Times remarked in a recent editorial, "it cannot be stressed too often that the struggle brought to a head in this session of the general assembly is not against the Soviet Union but FOR the United Nations." The most striking thing, the editorial added, is "the determination of the United Nations (that means the member nations) to survive."

One strange phenomenon which appears to persons not too well acquainted with the ways of such gatherings is the friendly and entirely normal manner in which the delegates to the United Nations who attack each other on the rostrum, consort in the corridors and lounges provided in the two buildings which now temporarily house the executive council and the general assembly, respectively. That's nothing new to people who have covered congress.

Dispensing of News Is Vital to U. N.

The longer I serve, covering these meetings, the more I realize that the most important of all the groups, not excluding the delegates themselves, are those which serve to dispense the news and information concerning the United Nations.

It would be impossible, of course, for enough people to visit the sessions to affect public opinion greatly. But many of the people who do come go back with a message which stirs great interest in the organization in their communities. Proof of this interest was contained in the report of the secretary general, Lie, when he said that information had been sent out and other steps taken in cooperation with a thousand meetings in the past year.

But more important than anything else are the actual reports of press and radio direct from one or the other of the two headquarters, or as a result of the many interviews with members of the permanent secretariat.

Here is what they've done with radio alone:

During the general assembly, the radio division of the department of public information will broadcast for 12 hours a day, while visiting radio commentators, using facilities leased by the United Nations, will cover

the debates for listeners in 16 countries.

The French, Spanish, Chinese and Russian sections of the radio division also are preparing to broadcast adaptations of one of the U. N. programs which will be offered in transcription to stations unable to relay the original broadcast.

The two services most widely relayed, because of the high quality of reception, are those in Spanish (to Latin America) and in Chinese. The programs all carry the latest news on work of the assembly and other United Nations bodies, interviews with delegates, background talks, recorded excerpts from speeches in debate and short features.

As the bickering and obstructionism increased at the current session and it became clear that confidence in the United Nations was being undermined, the importance of the work of the agencies distributing information concerning the topics discussed by the general assembly, became more and more evident. The reason was this: It became clear

that under the present structure of the United Nations, where a unanimous agreement on the part of the major powers before major steps could be taken, is required, the only force behind the whole idea is the force of public opinion.

As this is being written, the question of the report of a committee on tele-communications is being discussed. The plans envisioned by the men on the United Nations who realize the importance of strengthening the opinion-forming force of the organization, are not too grandiose to be practical but they do involve expenses which make their completion uncertain. Nations of the world are all feeling the pinch of poverty and there is a strong move to cut expenses.

A part of the tele-communications plan was a radio network which would dispense objective world news for all the world. To show you how well the meagre efforts along those lines already have succeeded, I was told by the radio liaison division that even the Russian reporters who, as you know, work for newspapers which are under a strict censorship, which permit no news which doesn't suit their needs, have begun to ask for items issued by the United Nations because they are so fair, so objective that no one could accuse them of containing propaganda for any one nation.

The men on the staff of the United Nations are not all perfect. There are a number of weak sisters. But on the whole, it is surprising to see how the majority of them has been able to develop a world-wide viewpoint, an attitude whose whole policy is based on world understanding and the perpetuation of peace.

SAME AS IN 500 A.D.

Pacific Journey Made on Raft

Dr. Thor Heyerdahl, 32-year-old Norwegian ethnologist and zoologist, had a theory that the first Polynesians were blue-eyed blondes who floated over to their Pacific islands from South America on rafts in about the year 500 A. D.

What he did about proving that theory now is history. He and a party of six men built themselves a primitive raft of bamboo and balsa wood, climbed aboard and set themselves adrift at Callao, Peru.

Exactly 101 days later the scientific group drifted ashore on their raft, the Kon-Tiki, at Raroua reef in the Tuamotu archipelago, center of their target. They had used no

NEWS REVIEW

Urge Food Conservation; New Battle Shakes U.N.

DIATETICS:

Waste Less

Lips that sincerely frame the words "food conservation" will not touch such sturdy edibles as meat, poultry and eggs quite so often hereafter.

Charles Luckman, head of President Truman's citizens food committee, opened the widely heralded "waste less" campaign by calling on the American people to cut their consumption of those three items, thereby effecting a conservation of grain for Europe.

At the same time, it was disclosed that stop-gap aid for Europe this winter may run as much as 800 million dollars—220 million more than Mr. Truman had estimated earlier.

The appeal for Americans to cut down on the amount of foods requiring grain feeding was couched in a five-point program which, if followed, will eliminate the traditional rite for the last chop on the platter—it won't be there.

Those five diatetic commandments were: 1) Buy cheaper meat cuts; 2) Don't serve too much; 3) Don't overcook meat; 4) Use leftovers; 5) Save wheat in all other possible ways.

In the future was the possibility that a voluntary program of meatless days and a reduction in the size of bread loaves would be put into effect.

NEW FIGHT:

Recalls Yalta

In the U. N. another scarehead of possible failure and collapse of that organization arose as the U. S. and Russia plunged into a new skirmish.

The issue: Which nation shall succeed pro-Russian Poland on the security council. Poland has represented eastern Europe and the Slav bloc for two years. Russia wants the Ukraine, which, although an integral part of the Soviet Union, have a separate U. N. delegation. U. S. contention is that the Ukraine is not a sovereign nation, therefore does not rate a separate status.

In the background of the affair was the Stalin-Roosevelt Yalta agreement which gave the Soviet Union three votes in the United Nations. Russia proper, the Ukraine and White Russia each has one.

How the U.S.S.R. came to get three votes probably happened something like this: Both the Ukraine and White Russia, intensely nationalistic, did not like to lose their identities by being merged with greater Russia. The Communist politburo, therefore, as a sop to their nationalism, granted the two territories a sort of nominal independence.

Income Disparities

"Real income" of wage and salary earners continues to drop, while farmers' income still is rising, it has been revealed by a monthly Investors Syndicate survey of purchasing power. "Real income" is the relationship of revenue to living costs.

Wage and salary earners now have only about 96 cents of buying power for each dollar a year ago, while farmers have about \$1.09.

At the same time, the biggest cause of the wage earners' problem is the sharp rise in the price of food. The average family now pays more than \$1.31 for the same amount of food that a dollar bought a year ago. It also pays \$1.06 for each dollar on rent, \$1.18 to the 1946 dollar for clothing and \$1.23 for miscellaneous expenses.

"This continued divergence between farm and city buying power," the survey pointed out, "indicates that a serious unbalance may threaten the stability of our economy. A close balance is essential."

RECOGNITION:

Playing Safe

Not as a gesture of approval, but rather as a means of keeping informed of internal developments did the United States grant full diplomatic recognition to the Communist-dominated government of Bulgaria.

Robert A. Lovett, U. S. acting secretary of state, said that the action meant neither that this country approved nor condoned "certain recent actions of the Bulgarian government."

Although he did not say so, Lovett obviously referred to Bulgaria's execution of Nikola Petkov, leader of the opposition to the Communists.

Previously, recognition of the Bulgarian government was withheld on the grounds that the pro-Soviet regime had been elected unfairly, but now the U. S. felt that it was more important to have an embassy in the country to protect American interests there.

LITTLE HOPE:

Less Coal

There is little or no hope springing in the collective breast of official Washington that the coal shortage this winter can be averted.

Current estimates place coal production as running several million tons a month behind exports and domestic consumption, principally because of the coal car shortage. This has resulted in winter stockpiles depreciating instead of growing, as they normally would.

It was hoped at first that some relief would come when winter weather stops or curtails road-building and construction, thus permitting diversion of sand and gravel cars to the coal fields. However, a railroad spokesman said the diversion of such cars would do nothing but offset a normal 10 per cent drop in railroad efficiency in winter.

Creative Power of Faith

Lesson for October 19, 1947

THIS lesson takes us to the Westminster Abbey of the Bible—Hebrews, eleventh through the thirteenth chapters—to meditate for a season upon the



valiant souls in the long ago who obtained a good report as they stood at the passage of destiny and sounded the trumpets of triumph, even the trumpets of faith.

The reader will be richly rewarded to stop right here and open his or her Bible and read these three chapters. Your attention will be riveted to the word, faith.

"Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen. For by it the elders obtained a good report. Through faith we understand that the worlds were framed by the word of God, so that things which are seen were not made of 'things which do appear.'" Hebrews 11:1-3.

A Journey to a New Land

I WANT the boys and girls to look at the passage which describes how Abraham, "when he was called to go out into a place which he should after receive for an inheritance, obeyed; and he went out, not knowing whither he went."

How could Abraham leave his pleasant situation in Ur? Through faith in God, and that alone. A memory verse is here suggested: "I will trust, and will not be afraid." Isaiah 12:2. Abraham might well have been afraid of unknown enemies, of disease, of poverty. Men do become afraid of these things, unless their faith is in God. But Abraham believed in God—had faith in God. And he went forth, holding the hand of God.

There is creative power in such a faith. Abraham discovered that every step he took was accompanied by God. He built altars. He talked with God, and God talked with him. Such will be the experience of every boy and girl who stakes his or her all upon implicit faith in God.

What Faith Can Do

INTERMEDIATES are considering what they will do with their lives. It is the vitally important period when they are wistfully considering a life career. This lesson would seem to clearly indicate that God has a purpose and plan for each life. He will reveal that plan to those who trust him for guidance. Faith in God at this point is absolutely essential if we are to live victoriously.

Read again the eleventh chapter of Hebrews and see how these heroes of faith in the long ago cast themselves wholly into the will of God for their lives. We can have no doubt about their ultimate success.

Parents and teachers are here reminded of their solemn responsibility in pointing intermediate boys and girls to the truth of Sunday's lesson. Life is too valuable, too fleeting, to be frittered away in purposeless drifting.

Faith is the bright shaft of God's presence and power to guide young people into his will. It is the unfailing light to direct their steps daily. It is the creative power to sustain them each step of the way.

This Power at Work

TAKE any one of the characters portrayed in these three chapters of Hebrews and see how faith in God produced men and women who changed the course of history. Young people are interested in biography. I would commend to you the lives of the great men and women of modern times, who lived in the creative power of faith in God.

John Wesley, for example. There was a man whose life, when strangely warmed by the spirit of God, lifted England from the depths of secularism and set her feet once more on the highway of worthy achievement.

Martha Berry is another splendid example. Miss Berry devoted her life to God's will and purpose to open doors of opportunity to the under-privileged boys and girls of the southern mountain areas. Today, at Mt. Berry, stands a school with the largest campus in the world—a school which reveals what one life can accomplish when that life is built by the creative power of faith in the Living God.

"Take my life and let it be, Consecrated, Lord, to Thee."

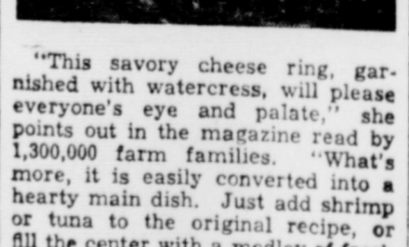

SAVORY CHEESE RING
1 tbs. unflavored gelatin
1/2 c. cold water
1 tbs. sugar
1 tbs. lemon juice
1 tbs. salt
1 tbs. vinegar
1 pt. cottage cheese
1 c. evaporated milk
2 tbs. chopped green pepper
1 tbs. chopped parsley
1 tbs. minced onion
1/2 c. sliced celery

Soften gelatin in cold water, then dissolve over hot water in double boiler. Add sugar, lemon juice, salt and vinegar. Blend cheese with milk; add to gelatin mixture. Chill until mixture begins to set, then fold in vegetables. Rinse ring mold with cold water, then pour in cheese mixture. Chill until set. Unmold, serve with Cooked Salad Dressing. Serves 9.
