## Business Men Hold Banquet At Which a Number of Civic Improvements Are Discussed

After one of the busiest seasons ever known in O'Donnell, the business men found a moment for a mutual get together meeting Wednesday night, the first to be held in some time. The object of the meeting was to discuss plans for the future development of the town and to criticize or approve the work being fostered by the City Council in the matter of street improvements. Eighty plates had been provided and a most elaborate spread of delectable viands put the men in splendid humor to talk—and they talked.

Mayor Kibbe, acting as chairman, stated that the meeting was entirely informal and that no set program of speeches had been prepared and asked that everyone feel entirely at ease and speak his mind on the subjects as they came up. Among the improvements discussed were:

The curb and gutter work just completed.

The construction of crosswalks, the filling in of the streets in the business section and the grading of the streets in the residential section, now under way.

The construction of a system of waterworks to cover the business section of the town.

The installation of a sewerage system.

The paving of the business streets.

The purchase of a chemical fire truck equipped with hose.

The employment of a man to look after the cleaning of the streets and alleys and keeping them clean of all refuse.

The calling of a bond election to pay for these improvements.

The organization of a Tuesday evening luncheon club composed of business men whereby they may meet once a week and discuss the problems of civic improvements.

After each of the subjects had been discussed pro and con, Dr. Campbell suggested that all of them be endorsed by the gathering which was done without a dissenting vote.

The work of the city council in the improvements already made and under construction was endorsed and a petition will be circulated for signatures asking the council to call an election at an early date to vote on a bond issue to pay for these improvements.

The banquet was served by Mr. and Mrs. Jack Fleishman, proprietors of the Recall Cafe, and was the acme of perfection, showing that these people are artists in their line.

A Business Men's Luncheon club was organized and fifty members were enrolled without solicitation and paid fifty cents in advance for the first feed to be held at the White House Cafe next Tuesday night. The club voted to hold the meetings alternately with the various cafes of town.

J. M. Wyatt and Dee Howry kept the men in fine humor with violin and mandolin playing. When Mayor Kibbe was making a speech on the necessity of water works system, Claude Tomlinson and Mr. Howry opened up on "How Dry I Am." The crowd caught on in a second and rent the air with yells.

No doubt the results of this meeting means a step forward for O'Donnell.

O'Donnell needs the business streets paved.

O'Donnell needs a chemical truck.

By all means let's have them.

### 'High School Report By Prof. Rickards

Owing to sickness and the rush of work, the report cards were not handed out on schedule time last week. They were handed out this week, however. Some interesting statistics were revealed by studying these cards. For the first six weeks of school the pupils making the highest grades were as follows:

Senior Girls, Roxie Hancock first; boys, Delbert Beaton, first Second six weeks—the same two again led.

Juniors; First Six Weeks Girls—Sue Gates, first. Boys—J. V. Shook, first

Second six weeks—the same two again led.

Sophomores; First Six Weeks Girls—Bernice Mariner, first; Hester Gates, second. Boys—Allen Moses, first.

Second six weeks: Girls—The same two led again. Boys—Shaw Jones, first.

Freshmen; First Six Weeks Girls—Florence Gary, first; Lola Weems, second. Boys—Dale Dameron, first; Truett Hodnette, second.

Second six weeks: Girls—There was a tie between Florence Gary and Lola Weems. Boys—Truett Hodnette, first; Dale Dameron, second.

There were five seniors who failed in one or more subjects the first six weeks, and three the second six weeks. Of the juniors, the failures were nine and ten respectively. Twelve sophomores failed the first report, and six the second, while the respective figures for the Freshmen were fifteen and thirteen. Altogether, there were 41 failures the first six weeks, and 32 the second term. By far the larger number of failures by one class were made by the freshmen, but this is because their class is the largest, because some have been promoted too rapidly, and because some have entered from country schools where the standards of work were poor.

While not many of the sophomores class failed, the class as a whole did not make very high grades. Not a straight (a) student was in the class. Come on you Sophs.

Reports seem to indicate that the juniors, as a whole, were doing the best work of any class. Although there are a number of failures in the class, the average record of grades is higher than that of any other class.
