Rains Prove Value of Soil Conservation

Recent rains have proved the need for more extensive soil conservation practices in the Lamesa Camp Area. Although numerous small terraces have been broken, erosion by water has been reduced considerably. Very little water and soil have been lost from terraced and contoured land but the terrace breaks should be repaired as soon as possible. Small breaks can be repaired with shovels while it is more economical to use Fresnoes or scrapers to make the larger fills. The entire terrace should be planted with broad cast or close drilled to sorghum crops to stabilize the structure until they have sufficient height and width to handle heavy rains. Any gullies that have been formed can more easily be checked if some Sudan grass or other sorghum crops are left on the land. This will not only stabilize the gully and collect silt but will also check and hold the sifting sand during the next bloom season.

Services Held Sunday For Suicide Victim

Funeral services for Jesse Clarence Holt, printer who com-
mitted suicide here on May 24,
were held Sunday afternoon at
the graveside in the local cem-
tery. Rev. E. C. McDonald,
pastor of the First Baptist church
said the service.
According to information given
the Index by his two nieces,
his only living relatives, Mr.
Holt was born in Dublin, Texas
on April 15, 1891, so that he
observed his last birthday a day
or two after coming to O'Don-
nell. He had had no other
family for years, and the nieces
had last seen him in 1929.

For several days following his
death, the mystery attached to
his life had given rise to var-
ious rumors. Immediately after
his life was found, his fingerprints
were taken and sent to the FBI
in the hope that at some time in
the past, perhaps if he had he
come a member of a lodge or
union, some such record might
have been taken. It was known
that at one time he was a mem-
ber of the I. T. U. (International
Typographical Union). There
never was any suspicion that
he had a criminal record, and
the report from Washington
wired to Justice of the Peace
George D. Foster Thursday
stated positively that the FBI
had no data which could give
any foundation to such an idea.

All former employers con-
tacted in the effort to find his kin,
spoke in emphatic terms of his
honesty and efficiency, without
exception also mentioned his
eccentric disposition and his evi-
dent desire to be left strictly to
himself.

On the few occasions when he
talked to anyone at all, his con-
versation clearly indicated that
he had enjoyed better circum-
stances and had seen better

days, but that poor health and
financial reverses had made a
derelict of him.

So ends the final chapter of a
man who lived to himself, and
died to himself. The Great
Typographer has written 30 for
another life.

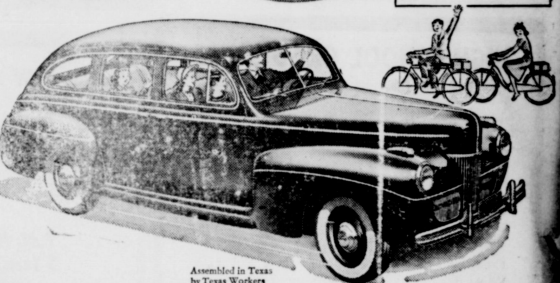
