U.S. SPENDING:

Deficit System Hit

It seemed an obvious conclusion that the President's council of economic advisers was having little effect in influencing government officials to insist upon a real effort by the administration to put its financial house in order.

ANY such conclusion would have been bolstered by the fact that Dr. Edward G. Nourse, chairman of the council, was quitting that body. In an address before the national retail farm equipment association. Dr. Nourse hit hard at federal deficit spending and charged that the government is "slipping back into deficits as a way of life."

Instead of deficit financing, he said, the government should be "putting its fiscal house in order and husbanding reserves to support the economy if less prosperous times overtake us."

According to reports, Dr. Nourse had informed President Truman that he was going to leave the government, although there was no word as to whether the President had accepted or would accept the

WELL-PLACED official circles were said to believe that Nourse's decision to leave the advisers council was because of his belief that he had failed in what he regarded was a fight to keep the council on a strict professional plane of factfinding and advice-giving, divorced from political issues.

In his address, Nourse was critical of elements among labor, agriculture and management, chiding farmers for "demanding stimula-tive prices," labor for demanding shorter hours in the face of the need for increased production.

RENTS:

Keep Level

A rather surprising thing had happened. A survey showed that lifting of rent control in more than 500 areas had not resulted in whole sale rent increases. Lifting of controls, put into effect in wartime, last April 1.

TAKEN as a whole, however, rents in key decontrolled areas did go up a little, but the hike was not as severe as most observers had predicted. The survey disclosed that land-

lord reaction to decontrol was spotty. One major factor in the over-all rent picture was said to be the number of vacancies available -a factor which might, after all, have considerable restraining effect on any appreciable over-all rent increase. Some landlords raised rents, but had to cut them again when tenants moved out. Also some landlords were still bound by leases issued in the period before decontrol.

According to the survey, increases were scattered, rather than general, in most places.

THUS THE PICTURE of the rent situation generally is clouded by factors enumerated, factors which may of themselves have enough restraint value to hold down rent hike, as well as a dis-inclination of landlords to raise rentals to levels most Americans expected. Continuing strikes, loss of income,

God Our Comfort

Lesson for November 6, 1949

AS THE ENGLISH language keeps on changing, words do not always keep on meaning what they once did. "Comfort" is one of these. When our Bible was trans-lated into English in 1611, the translation most English-speaking peo-

ple use, the word "comfort" had a bigger meaning than most people put into it nowadays. We think of it as meaning soothing; but it is a bigger idea than God is not

merely a soothing Dr. Foreman God. We think of

"comfort" as meaning to make comfortable; but it is a stouter word than that. God does not always make his people comfortable. The word means to strengthen, to steel against fear and despair, to put backbone into people.

"Fear Not, O Worm!"

AT THE TIME of the propuecies we study this week, the Israelites had been kicked around a good deal. They had felt the conqueror's boots, they were discouraged, as all good people are when somehow God seems to be letting evil forces triumph. Their little world had split wide apart, their little nation had been blown to the winds.

To those people, torn by ter-rers and bowed down by wretchedness, people who were in serious danger of developing a once-for-all "inferiority complex," people who were about to lose all their backbone, the great prophet brings his messages: "Comfort ye my people, saith your God."

The whole idea is in this one sentence (Is. 41:14): "Fear not, O worm Jacob! . . . I am your helper, saith the Lord."

God does not indulge his people in foolish pride. Beside the Almightly they are worms, insects. Nevertheless, worm though he may be, the man who trusts in God will not be afraid. He will not trust in his own powers, he will not trust in

A worm by itself is nothing; but with God on his side, the weakest of men can say with Paul, "If God be for us, who can be against us?" God's men do not get their courage up by flexing their muscles or admiring themselves. They grow in courage as they grow in the knowledge of God.

Goodness And Power

A NY ONE who saw "Edward, My Son" will remember the tragedy of that family. A boy's character went slowly to pieces, because his father was determined that nothing should be too good for him. To gain his purpose the father ran rough-shod over everyone who stood in his way, and eventually rained the lives of all around him, including his son's and his own The mother, on the other hand, could see, as the father could not. what his indulgence was doing to the boy, making him a weakling and a rat. But she was too weak to stand up against her husband, and her life too was ruined. That story is a kind of parable.

The prophet reveals a God who is both powerful and good; but suppose God were only good but not powerful, or only powerful but not good? Then the world would be in a mess, as that boy Edward was in a

But these three are all in the same God. A God who is power only, might do as Edward's father did, destroy his children without even intending to do so. A God who is goodness only, might want to do right by his world yet not be able to do so, like Edward's mother. A God who knew what was right but neither wanted nor was able to do much about it, would not be a God at all.

God Is Not Weary

SUPPOSE GOD were indeed powerful, good and wise, and yet grew tired from time to time? Suppose all God's good qualities came and went, unpredictably, like the wind on a spring day?

No: God is the Maker and Keeper of Promises, the Covenant God. He does not grow faint or weary; that is our anchor of comfort.

The earth changes, and men with it: but the Word of the Lord abides forever. His "covenant of peace" does not waver. We do not need to lean gingerly on the Almighty. He will bear all our weight.

Danger of Fires Worse on Farms Suggestions Advanced For Preventing Blaze

Of an estimated fire loss of 11,-000 lives and nearly 700 million dollars in property and resources indicated for the year 1949, a great percentage of these losses will be made up of fires on the farm. Because of lack of fire protection

or adequate fire-fighting facilities, farm fires in almost every case are the most disastrous, because of the almost inevitable complete loss which results.

Already the national board of fire underwriters has reported property destruction from fire in the amount of 398 million dollars, 8.9 per cent below the same period for 1948 But even if a downward trend should continue for the remainder



FLUE LINING

of 1949, this year's losses would approach the 1948 all-time high of

more than 711 million dollars. These figures mark 1948-49 as the most disastrous period in a decade that has recorded five billion dollars in fire destruction. Between 1940 and 1948, fire loss soared 132

per cent. As the "prime cause" of most of the 800,000 fires annually, the Board lists "plain carelessness and misuse of heating and lighting equipment." The leading single cause of fire is careless smoking and use of catches, accounting for 16.68 per cent of the total destruction. However, over the past ten years, the combination of defective chimneys

and flues, stoves, furnaces, boilers and their pipes, and sparks on roofs has been responsible for 20.47 per cent of all fires reported. Proper safeguards in installation and maintenance of heating equipment, chimneys and flues, safety officials say, will prevent fires of this type. Many communities al-ready protect their citizens with ordinances requiring the installation of flue linings in all new chimneys. One effective means of fireproofing chimneys involves the use of clay flue lining which forms a single, continuous noninflamma-ble unit inside chimneys of all



Religion Won't Keep Sweet by Itself

T IS a temptation as old as religion, to put it on one side of a wall and life on the other. But the prophets showed, once and for that God has

literally no use for religion which has been dissected off life. Religion from which is kent apart from life turns sour and In Isaiah's everybody time, knew there wa

something wrong Dr. Foreman

with the country.
Isaiah's diagnosis was shocking: Religion is our principal trouble. God is tired of it. What? The pious people would exclaim. Look at the crowds in the Temple every holy day! Listen to all the prayers. count the number of tithers. If anything is wrong with our country, it can't be religion! But religion it

Why God Was Tired A CATHOLIC priest would shock everybody should he call Vatican City "Hell's Half Acre." Isaiah shocked his fellow citizens by calling Jerusalem "Sodom and Gomorrah." Those cities were the

worst places the Hebrews had ever heard of. They were so bad the Lord had to destroy them by fire— not 10 good people could be found there. The prophet fol-lows up that first shock by another. Every single expression

of organized religion comes under the prophet's lash. Sacrifices and offerings (v.11), attendance at the sanctuary, ob-servance of the Sabbath and other holy days (v. 13), church gatherings, corresponding to our rallies and conventions (v. 13), even

Put that into modern terms: attendance at church, Bible reading, tithing, praying-if that is all, then all is no good. It may be religion, and of course it is one kind of religion; but not the kind God wants.

Indeed, Isaiah says God hates it; he is "fed up" with it (vs. 11). What was wrong? Isaiah tells them that, too, in short simple words. "hands are full of blood." "Your

Oh, the people would protest, we are not killers, we don't lay a hand on anybody. Isaiah goes on to explain: seek judgment (i.e. justice), relieve the oppressed, judge the fatherless, plead for the widow.

You don't kill outright, you churchgoers, he would say, but you are so indifferent to justice in your city, you take so little interest in the people at the bottom of the heap, that people die here, widows and orphans die, simply because no one cares.

What Makes a Town Worth Saving?

ALAS, nobody did care. One hundred and more years went by, and Jerusalem came close to its end. But nobody thought that disaster could strike. The belief had grown in every one's mind that the Temple of the Lord would forever insure the safety of the city in which it stood.

But a young prophet, Jeremiah, preached a sermon on the same theme as Isaiah's (Jer. 7): It is not the temple that will save you, it is not church attendance that will bring you the favor of God.

As the men of Jerusalem looked back to the great days of Moses, God had given them.

But God remembered it otherwise. Jeremiah even says (with understandable exaggeration) that God had not *said a word about sacrifices and offerings; the Ten Commandments, with all they im-





QUESTION: I was recently given two antique glass cream pitchers, but they have been washed in soap and water so much much that the designs in the glass are filled with a soap crust. I have failed to remove this after repeated trials. Can you give me any help?

ANSWER: I believe the deposit is more from hard water than soap, although this has probably stuck to the glass also. If the pitchers are of cut glass of some kind without any painted designs, the crust should soften by soaking with a non-flamable cleaning fluid, giving it plenty of time to act. Kerosene may also help. A stiff brush would be convenient to work with.






