## Encore On Clean-UP Set For Thursday

### Stores To Close From 1 Until 3 p. m.

At the end of the very successful clean-up drive last Thursday, team captains, staff workers and others made the following progress report to the community—

1. It was estimated that 200 truck and pickup loads of trash were hauled to the dump ground.

2. A very good job was done with the exception of a few places where the property owner was not available or where it was requested that the material not be moved by the owner.

3. A list of these above mentioned places has been given to the City Council for their further study and completion.

4. To put the finishing polish on our town, it has been requested that ALL businesses close again on Thursday, March 14th from 1 to 3 p. m., and again meet at the Legion Hall with men, boys, and trucks to work the places missed in the first drive. Let's finish our job.

5. In the meantime it is suggested that each property owner will continue to clean his property and place the trash in the alley and the City will see to it that an extra truck is used for a day or two in picking up the trash.

6. Last week Mr. Lacy hauled in some 35 yards of rock material and placed it in the mud-hole just west of the Methodist Church.

7. The City was requested to see that trash was picked up between the city and dump ground—some fell from the trucks.

8. It was suggested by a student in the lower grade that the entire school turn out from 1 to 3 and clean the school grounds.

9. Places to be cleaned will be listed with workers for the drive on Thursday afternoon.

10. Since the Clean-Up program was sponsored this year by the Rotary Club, the Club expresses their appreciation to our three Commissioners (Mrs. Beatrice McLaurin, Ode Brewer, and A. B. Furlow) for their seven maintainers, loaders trucks, men, etc. and their fine help and cooperation.

Also thanks to the State Highway Department out of Tahoka for moving in last week and dressing up Highway 87 Loop.

11. Also thanks to the School students and teachers who greatly assisted in the drive last Thursday.

12. The members of the Committee wish to thank each and everyone who had a part in this worthwhile project for their splendid cooperation and only ask that we put the finishing touches on before writing "finished" to the project.

### GIRL SCOUTS HONOR "FIRST MAN IN THEIR LIVES"

The Girl Scouts this week are marking a double anniversary — their own 45th birthday and centenary celebrations for the man whose ideas on women's education shaped the lives of 12 and one half million American women. The man was Robert Baden - Powell who started the idea of a scouting game for boys while he was still an officer in the British Army. Because Baden - Powell was one of the first supporters of Scouting for girls, the Girl Scouts this week are joining in Baden Powell Centenary celebrations being observed by Scouts and Guides all over the world.

Baden Powell's idea for a scout ing game started with a book, "Aids For Scouting" which he wrote in 1899. The idea caught on so fast, he had to retire from the army to devote full time to his new youth movement. One of the first big Scout rallies in London had so many girls in makeshift Boy Scout uniforms that Baden Powell decided to form a similar organization for girls.

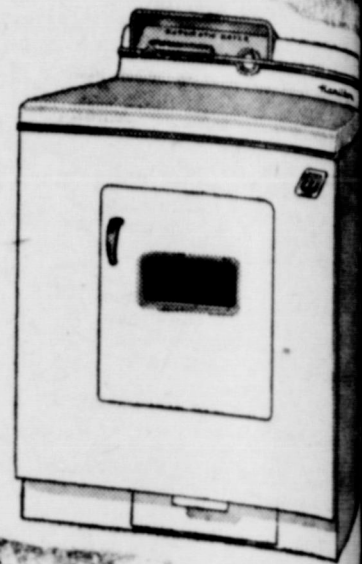
