Left half Berry Moore scored for the Eagles in the first quarter from 3 yards out but Sundown stormed back in the second with two touchdowns, one on a pass, Nick Nichols to Jim McLeRoy for 20 yards after which Bill Waygood converted. Then McLeRoy ran 52 yards for another. The PAT failed but Sundown was ahead 13 to 6 at the half.

The Roughnecks opened the third period with another score, this one by Charles Mann on a short run. Waygood converted and Sundown had a comfortable lead.

It wasn't comfortable long. Benny Clark passed 49 yards to Roger Doss in the end zone to put O'Donnell back in the running and a few minutes later End Ken Fannon recovered a Sundown fumble in the end zone for another TD and Clark kicked the extra point.

Still going strong, Clark gave O'Donnell another score to open the 4th quarter and recovered and ran over a fumble for the PAT and the Eagles were ahead 26 to 20.

Then Sundown began spooling the Homecoming. Nichols passed 37 yards to Waygood in the end zone. The extra point failed and the score was tied 26 to 26. But Sundown wasn't thru. Another pass, Nichols to Mann, good for 55 yards and a touchdown, not only was the victory tally but the last running play of the game. The extra point try failed. Statistics bore out the close game. 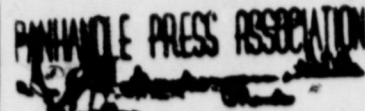

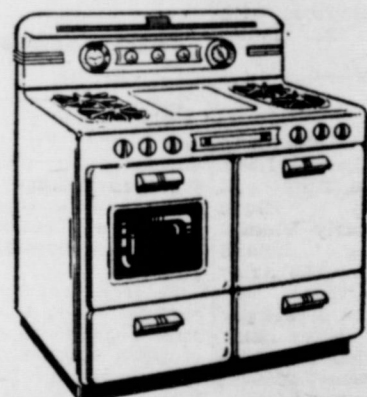

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Glaucoma Is Hazard To People Over 40

NEW YORK—Glaucoma is a word which carries very little meaning to most people, "yet that word will one day sound bitter overtones to one out of every 50 Americans over 40 years of age. These men and women—800,000 of them—are slowly losing sight from the eye disease glaucoma because of ignorance and neglect. Unfortunately, most of them do not realize that they face blindness."

To tell people over 40 the facts about glaucoma, the National Society for the Prevention of Blindness has published a pamphlet on the eye disease. Copies are available without charge.

The pamphlet points out that the best defense against glaucoma is a thorough eye examination at least once every two years after you reach 40.

It emphasizes that the three main points to remember about glaucoma are:

Strikes after 40 in most cases. Is difficult to detect in the early stages; as a result, many have the disease and don't know it.

U. S. Airmen Crash British Air Show

FARNBOROUGH, Eng. — The U. S. air force recently confessed that American Sabre jet fighters gate-crashed a supposedly all-British air show of fancy flying and displayed some fancy flying themselves, although endangering all the other participants in the show by their unscheduled antics.

Ten F-86 Sabres, used in Britain only by United States and Canadian fliers, stunted over the show thrilling spectators but spreading consternation among British authorities.

United States Air Force headquarters at South Ruislip admitted Americans were guilty of the prank and said disciplinary action was being taken.

Some Moles Dangerous Philly Doctor Warns

CHICAGO—Although more than 99.9 per cent of all moles are harmless, some may turn into the worst kinds of cancer—highly malignant, very invasive and promptly fatal—Dr. Albert P. Seltzer, of Philadelphia, warned.

"Many people feel that just because a mole or other growth has been present since birth, it will never cause trouble," Dr. Seltzer says. "This is wishful thinking. We are all born with teeth, with tonsils, with an appendix. Yet frequently these organs become diseased and must be removed. The same is true of the common mole."

"Should every mole be removed? The answer is no. Most moles need no treatment except for cosmetic reasons. But certain kinds of moles are dangerous. A mole that increases in size, a mole that bleeds readily, a mole that becomes irritated or inflamed may already have become cancerous and certainly should come out at once."

Dr. Seltzer pointed out that black moles, particularly blue-black, green-black or slate colored ones, are prone to become malignant. Moles on the foot are quite dangerous and should be removed, as should moles in places exposed to constant irritation or chafing, such as along the collar line, in the shave area of the face, on the lips of a pipe smoker, along the belt line or in the armpit.

Spiderweb Business Proves Profitable In California Town

YUCAIPA, Calif.—Such precision devices as gunsights, astronomical instruments and survey instruments require crossed hairs." Mrs. Nan Songer supplies spider webs with which the "hairs" are made.

Her business goes back to her childhood when, because of her frail health, her parents encouraged her to be out-of-doors as much as possible. She became interested in insect life—first moths and butterflies, then crickets, and finally spiders.

By 1939, when 37, she had been experimenting with extracting the silken web from spiders for several years. The government was inquiring whether the web would be produced commercially.

Human hairs had been utilized for years in gunsights, bombsights and periscopes, but were susceptible to extreme temperatures. They contracted and broke in the sub-zero cold of the stratosphere—and sagged in high temperatures. An extremely fine, sturdy and elastic strand was needed—and the spider web was the answer.

Using fine needles, Mrs. Songer draws the silk from one of the spider's spinnerets and reels it on a metal frame for shipment.

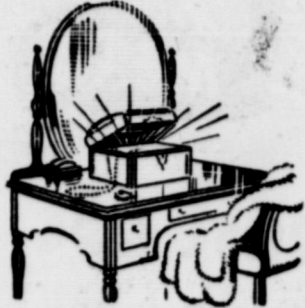

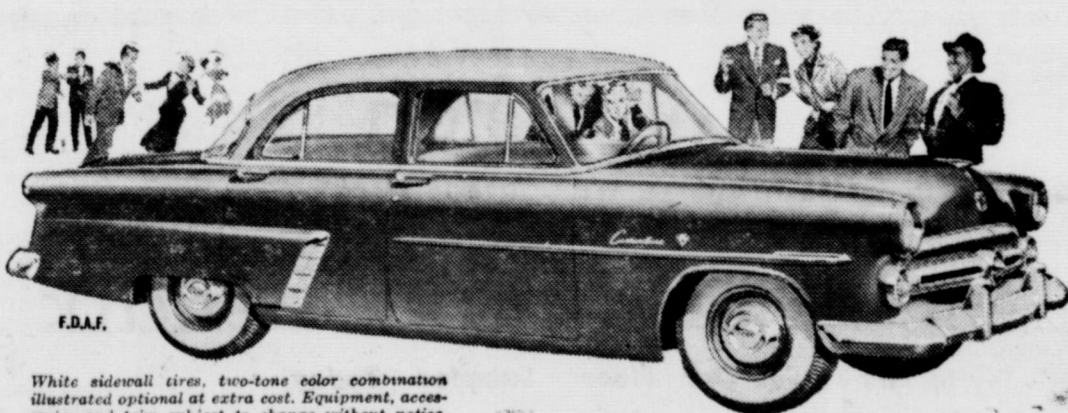
