Funeral rites for Clifford E. Payne, 38, of O'Donnell, who met a violent death in Idaho last week, will be held here today at 3 p. m. from the First Baptist church with the Rev. L. S. Jenkins of Amherst officiating, assisted by the Rev. J. L. Lunsford, local pastor. He died August 11.

Payne is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Payne; four sisters, Mrs. Opal Rogers of Hot Springs, New Mexico, Mrs. Tressie Fiat, Mrs. Roy D. Schooler and Miss Treva Payne all of O'Donnell; two brothers, Cecil of Slaton and Clinton of Comanche.

Mystery surrounded the manner of Payne's death when his body was first found on the lonely Idaho railway track, but gillnet work on the part of the Idaho peace officers uncovered clues and another victim of the murderers which revealed Payne's identity, and communication with the family here. First clues upon which the officers had to go were the victim's fingerprints. His social security card and other means of identification had disappeared, so the Idaho Sheriff informed Sheriff B. L. Parker of Lynn county via telephone.

That Payne was beaten and then thrown off a train on which he was riding was later told officers by the other victim, who was found badly wounded and who had been attacked with the same brutal treatment by two men.

The murderers, identify so far unknown, tried to entice Payne and the other man into a card game. He refused, they promptly assaulted, the first victim, so he told officers, and like treatment meted out later to Payne.

Payne's body exhumed was brought back from Idaho to O'Donnell Thursday.

Payne was born in Comanche, Texas in 1905.

Earliest Bale In County's History

TAHOKA, Texas, August 22.—Many express the belief that a record was broken when Tahoka received her first bale of cotton on Monday, August 19. A few have advanced the claim that a bale was received here one year as early as August 15, but this has not been verified.

E. D. Crouch of Three Lakes brought in the first bale this year on Monday afternoon, and it was ginned at the Farmers Cooperative No. 1, with Claude Donaldson as manager, shortly after eight o'clock that night.

The bale of cotton weighed 437 pounds, and in addition to the \$43.63 which the bale brought at the auction sale, the owner was presented with a premium of \$77.75 contributed by the business men of Tahoka, which was augmented to \$82.75 by the \$5.00 contributed by Anderson-Clayton, making a grand total of \$136.38 received by Mr. Couch for the bale.

This cotton was gathered from a field of about 100 acres of cotton planted by Mr. Crouch in April. Naturally, it had suffered considerably from the July drouth, but estimates are that it will yield from a fourth to a third of a bale per acre.

HEARING HELD ON BUDGET SATURDAY

A thorough check of the proposed county budget was given in a special hearing at the courthouse in Tahoka Saturday by Judge P. W. Goad. A number of interested citizens, present commissioners and those now in the runoff for commissioner's posts were present.

Where a saving to the taxpayers of the county is to come from, as adjudicated by the court, was outlined by Judge Goad. A reduction in the tax rate to 12 1/2-2 per cent is to be made.

Goad explained that it was thought best to lower the rate instead of the valuation due to the fact that it was to the interests of the county citizens. Railways, large utilities, etcetera, now have advocated a lowering of the valuation, Goad said, which would lower their tax burden considerably, but which would not give great relief to other taxpayers in the county.

Surpluses built up from four years ago when the present court went into action was given as follows by Goad (many smaller were also outlined at the hearing): General, 1936 \$399.30, 1940 \$5,087.12; road and bridge, 1936 \$110.43, 1940 \$6,543.00; county hall, 1936 \$1,767.43, 1940 \$7,065.57. Total cash balance was listed as \$47,561.10 in 1940 against \$26,690.07 in 1936.

State Convention Date Changed

TAHOKA, Texas, August 22.—Some time ago it was announced through the public press that the Democratic convention would be held in Mineral Wells on September 3.

County Chairman C. H. Cain calls attention to the fact that since that time Attorney General Gerald Mann has ruled that it is mandatory that this convention be held on September 10. The date therefore has been changed accordingly, and all delegates and prospective visitors to the convention will please note the change in the date.

About the only function of this convention will be to declare the nominees of the primary elections held on July 27 and August 24 and to adopt a platform.

TAHOKA, Texas, August 22.—In our previous Pre-school Round-up, there were quite a number of children who were not able to attend. If the parents are interested in having their children examined, they may bring them to the County Health Office Tuesday morning, August 27th, between the hours of ten and twelve o'clock.

Let us again remind you that this is the time of year when typhoid fever is most prevalent. There has been two cases in your county so far this year. If you have not been protected from typhoid fever in the last year, now is the time you should be protected. If you are not able to pay, a private physician, the health department is prepared to give typhoid, diphtheria, and smallpox immunizations in their office any Saturday morning between the hours of nine and twelve o'clock.

ENLISTMENTS IN U. S. NAVAL RESERVE BEING ACCEPTED

As a part of National Defense plans, ex-navy men, up to the age of 50 years, are now being enlisted in Class V-6 U. S. Naval Reserve and in rating held at time of discharge from the navy, except where manner of their employment since separation from the naval service has qualified such men for higher rating.

Men with no previous naval service but especially qualified in seamanship or trades used in the navy

are also desired for enlistment in Class V-6 Naval Reserve. Age limits are from 17 to 50 years. Married men will be enlisted only if qualified to fill higher ratings.

Enlistment in Class V-6 Naval Reserve carries with it no compulsory obligations to perform drills or training duty as, by law, no member of the Volunteer Naval Reserve can be ordered to active duty without his own consent, except during war or national emergency. They are simply recruits whose induction into the service has been completed. Restrictions upon them in peace time are actually no greater than if they were on a waiting list.

All applications for enlistment in the Naval Reserve should be made at Room 421 Post Office Bldg., Dallas, Texas.

Applications for enlistment in the regular navy (age limits 18 to 31, unmarried men only) should be made to nearest navy recruiting stations, located in Texas at Dallas, Ft. Worth, Marshall, Abilene, Waco and Wichita Falls; and in Oklahoma at Ardmore, Oklahoma City, Tulsa and Enid.
