City Open Dog Pound Wednesday

To Hold Stray Dogs 3 Days In Pound

City Secretary Tom Brewer said Monday that the City would begin to pick up all dogs not properly tagged and running loose with a 1956 anti-rabies tag. The animals will be held for three days at the City's dog pound near the Santa Fe depot and if not claimed by the owner within that time, the animal will be killed. If your pet is missing, please go by the pound.

The above is a safety measure, according to Mayor S. M. Clayton, Jr., to protect the community from a possible outbreak of the rabies in the future and to cut down on the population of stray dogs roaming the town. It is an interesting fact that since control of stray dogs began three or four years ago there has been no outbreak of dog poisoning.

Much Repair Work Is Being Done At School

To Plan For Hatchery

THURSDAY NITE, JUNE 7th at 8 p. m. in the O'Donnell High School Auditorium there will be a meeting of all broiler producers.

This meeting will be very important to all who are interested in the O'Donnell Broiler Project.

Two of the more important topics to be discussed are:

1. The immediate plans to place a big modern hatchery in O'Donnell
2. The advantages and the disadvantages of bulk feed.

Ken Looper, a tireless worker for the local broiler project, said that he urges all to attend especially those who think they would make good broiler producers and who are interested. Mr. Looper said that only a small amount of additional production is needed to assure a hatchery here in the immediate future.

Recently the Index talked with a local man who said he had cleared \$1100 from selling 4 houses on the average market of 22c. The market is expected to go back to the normal 26c-27c level.
