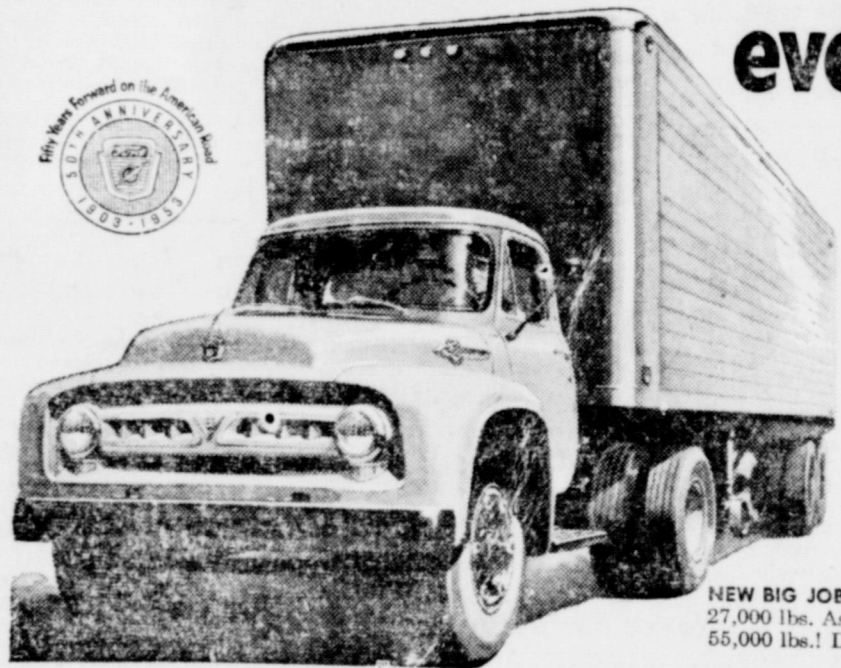

2. Mexican and Negro families living on someone's farm where none now are in school.
3. Families who have recently moved into O'Donnell School District.
4. Older children who have married but who are not yet too old for the Census. This is especially true in Mexican families.

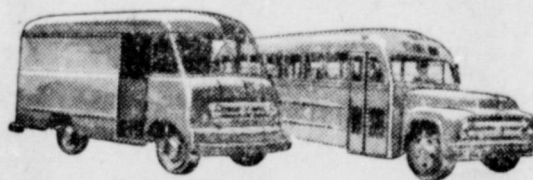

MAY EARN EXTRA MONEY UNDER SOCIAL SECURITY

There are many self-employed persons between the ages of 65 and 75 whose low earnings may make them eligible for monthly insurance payments even though they are still working, according to John G. Hutton, manager of the Lubbock social office.

Mr Hutton said that the recent changes in the law make it possible for a self employed person between these ages to net 900 annually without giving up any of his monthly social security checks. In the cases of those clearing over \$900, but not more than \$1725 annually there is still a possibility of one or more monthly payments for the year. He urged that persons in this group contact the social security office to discuss their individual cases. These people should file their claims immediately in order to prevent loss of benefits, the manager stated. Persons age 75 and older can draw their monthly benefits regardless of the amount of their business profits.

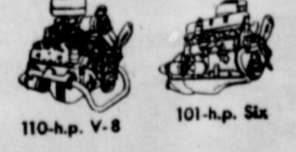

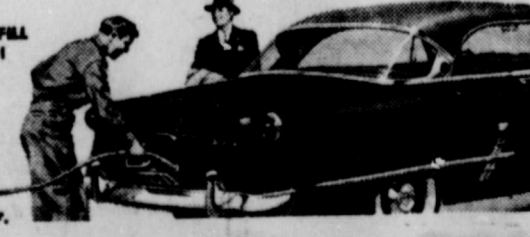

Health News

The word which runs through the State Department of Health these days is this: "Give the Parent-Teachers Assn. anything they want. They're helping every kid in Texas."

That's the way State Health Officers George W. Cox welcomed 400,000 new allies in the Department's campaign to establish tooth saving fluoridation programs in all Texas communities.

Members of the Texas PTA all 401,541 of them have pledged themselves to work for adoption of fluoridation in all areas where natural fluoride content of the community water supply is below the level of 1 part per million parts water as is recommended by practically every reputable health organization in the country.

Following the lead of the national Congress of Parents and Teachers which adopted a pro-fluoridation resolution in their convention just concluded in Chicago, a spokesman for the Texas organization said the entire membership is being urged to actively campaign for the measure "which will mean fewer decayed teeth for our children."

Twelve cities are already conducting carefully controlled programs of water treatment against insidious tooth decay. If the PTA is successful in its promotion project, many other cities will be undertaken similar programs.

And future children of an community where water is treated in the proper ratio will be better off than children in other communities whose leaders have shorter vision.

Long years of steady show that children who use fluoride-treated water have 60 to 65 percent who are denied the benefits of fewer decayed teeth than children such water.

This, says Dr. Geo Cox is the way the health agency is giving unqualified approval to fluoridation, and why he enthusiastically welcomes the support of PTA.

Clan Memorializes Man Hanged 200 Years Ago

EDINBURGH — Stewart clansmen met recently at the site near Ballaehulish, Argyll, where James Stewart was hanged 200 years ago for taking part in the murder of Colin Campbell to protest the innocence of Stewart and to commemorate the bravery with which he met the hangman. An oration was made and the Very Rev. Duncan McInnes, dean of Argyll, held a memorial service.

The Stewarts say that James Stewart was a victim of the most outrageous frameup in history. The murder remains the most celebrated crime case in Scotland.

Stewart was tried by a jury consisting of eleven Campbells and four others and the presiding judge was the chief of the Campbell clan, the Duke of Argyll.

Robert Louis Stevenson immortalized the murder in "Kidnapped."

Noah's Ark Still Is Lost on Mt. Ararat

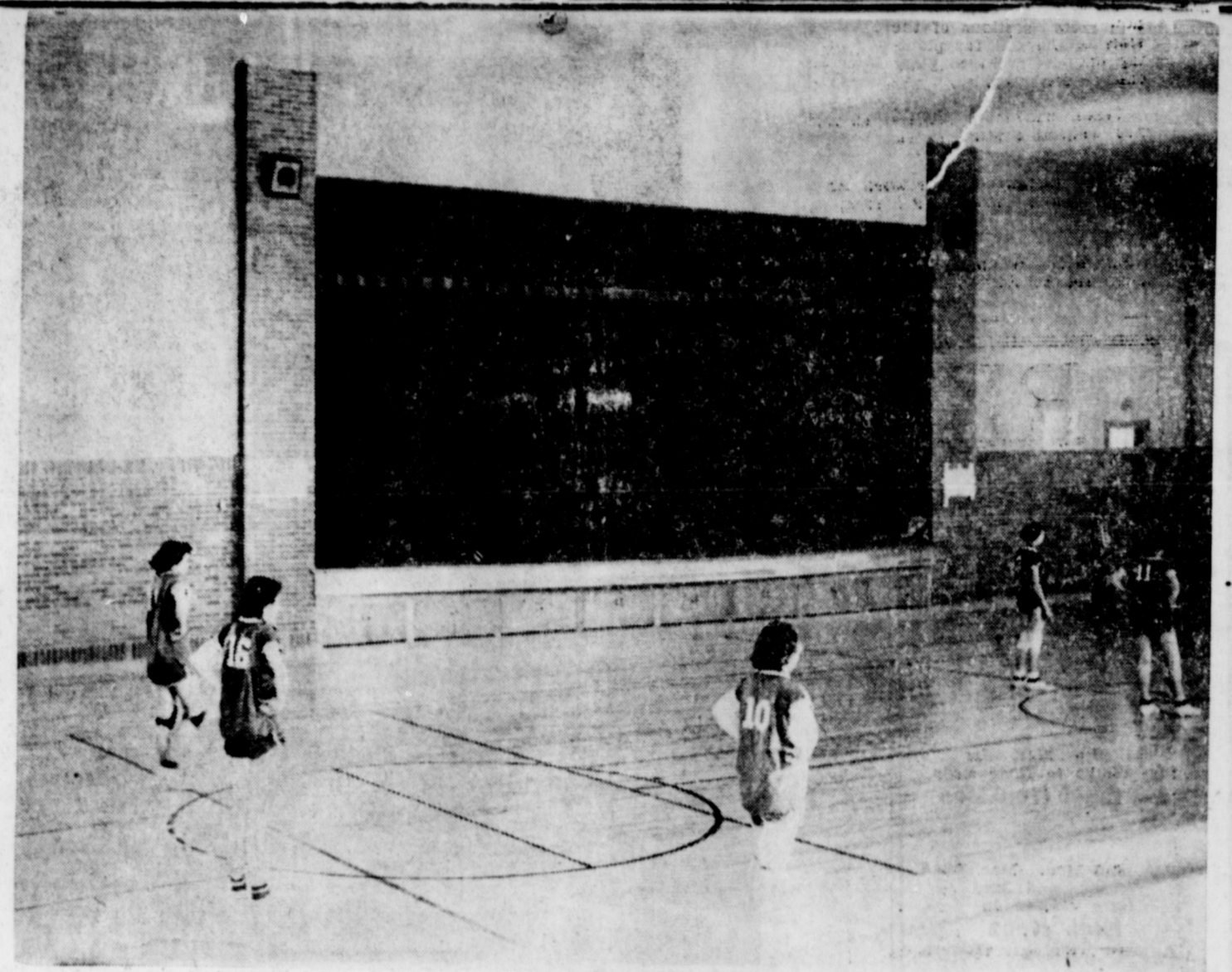
ISTANBUL—Not even a pair of animal tracks was found by a French expedition which battled its way to the top of Mt. Ararat looking for traces of Noah's Ark.

The expedition, led by Jean de Riquier, polar explorer, hoisted the French flag atop the rugged peak after climbing through snow, rain and heavy winds.

MAGNETO CENTER

Town of 4,700 Makes Vital Airplane Parts

SIDNEY, N.Y.—An electronic airplane instrument made in this community of 4,700 population is bringing aviation officials here from all over the world.

So widespread is interest in the instrument—used on airplanes to pinpoint trouble anywhere in the ignition system—that 167 officials, representing 43 domestic and foreign airlines plus builders of planes and engines, recently came to watch the electronic units being manufactured here by the scintilla magneto division of Bendix Aviation corporation.

Take Over Hotel

Because Sidney has but one small hotel, a nearby resort was taken over in its entirety for the record number of visitors, who conferred for three days on the role of the Sidney-built device in aviation safety and reliability.

In addition to the principal U.S. airlines, such foreign operators as Trans-Canada Airlines, Air France, KLM Royal Dutch Airlines, SABENA Belgian Airlines and Linea Aeropostal Venezolana participated in the conference and plant tour.

Ralph S. Damon, president of Trans World Airlines, Inc., said at the meeting that the instrument, called an ignition analyzer, is making a major contribution to aviation safety, which has increased 50-fold in 15 years and is expected soon to topple the safety records of any other form of mass transportation.

The analyzer, slated for application to passenger cars, trucks, tractors and other automotive vehicles as well as aviation, uses a cathode-ray tube like the "big tube" in TV sets to show engine performance in various electrical wave patterns. It will, for example, quickly locate a poor sparkplug among the 224 carried by some of the larger multi-engine planes.

Began in Garage

Sidney, builds magnetos and jet igniters for the aircraft industry as well as additional ignition and electrical equipment for automotive and industrial engines. Described in a national magazine article as "The Village We Can't Do Without," the community was the source of most of the ignition units for World War II military planes, tanks and PT boats.

Age, Circulation Of Blood Connected

BERKELEY, Calif. — The discovery of a progressive reduction with age in the circulation of blood in the muscles, which may turn out to be the major cause of aging, has been reported by Dr. Hardin Jones, associate professor of medical physics in the Donner Laboratory of the University of California.

Dr. Jones found that between 18 and 25 years of age, the blood circulation to the muscles of the average person is cut 40 per cent. Between 25 and 35 years, the supply of blood to the muscles is reduced by another 33 per cent, and so on.

The scientists explained that the circulating blood supplies the nourishment necessary for maintaining the various tissues of the body. With reduction in the nutriment the tissues can get, these tissues function less efficiently, which is a characteristic of aging.

Dr. Jones said that there are wide differences between individuals of the same age in the amount of blood circulating to the muscles. For example, the same 60-year-olds with the highest circulations match the rates of 20-year-olds with the lowest circulation rates.

He said this is pertinent to the knowledge that people's bodies age at different rates. The body of one person of 30 may actually be as old as another person of 40 or 50.
