### Shivers Rule Of Party Ends

### School Receives Audit

In a called meeting of the local school board last week Adlene Payne, the local colored school teacher, was given a year's extension of a teaching contract here.

In other business before the Board, John Earles, Felix Jones and Ted Rogers were named to the Board of Equalization which will organize and hold its initial meeting June 8th. Both the City and the School are required by law to hold annual equalization proceedings.

### School Gets Audit Report

In its regular meeting of last Thursday the Board received its annual audit of school finances as prepared by Watson Wilson. Mr. Wilson said the school was found to be in excellent financial shape and a condensed audit will be published next week. Anyone may study the complete audit report at the School Tax office, at superintendent's office, at Index office or any Board member will loan their copy.

### Must Attend School 5 Months

Supt. Skinner was authorized by the Board to conduct an extensive campaign next fall to enroll all children of legal school age for the time required by law by State of Texas. Cases will be filed as a last resort where parents are uncooperative. Most instances are among Latin-Americans and Negroes.

### Some Weak Spots

Supt. Skinner explained the recently completed achievement tests and he said the school system compares favorably with the mean media of rural schools. He has pinpointed the weak spots in local education and stress will fall next year on the weaker subjects. He said he, his principals and his teachers always welcome an opportunity to counsel with the parents.

### ADA Is Holding Up

The average daily attendance has surpassed expectations and the average of 570 students or more a day will entitle the school to keep all of its 23 teachers. On the last day of school the Grade School will be treated to a FREE children's movie at Rex by the Board as a reward for good attendance. Try to keep your children in school until the last day.
