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Noble Assumes Duties As Postmaster Here

J. Mac Noble Jr. received his commission as postmaster for O'Donnell on Tuesday morning of this week, and took over the duties of the office Wednesday. Official notice of his appointment was received several days ago, but the commission was not received until the above mentioned day. Mrs. Lora Ellis also went into the office as assistant postmistress, replacing Samuel P. Singleton.

So far as we have been able to learn, the postoffice location will not be changed, at least for some time yet. Index readers will recall that an inspector from the postoffice department was here some two or three weeks ago investigating the matter, but we are told he recommended no change. We also understand that Mr. Noble has leased the mail boxes and other equipment of the postoffice from Mr. Singleton. All the office equipment, with the exception of the three rural carrier's desks and the stamping machine, was the personal property of the retiring postmaster, Hal Singleton.

Heat Wave Broken By General Showers

The intense heat wave of the past few days was relieved Tuesday night when light but general showers fell over much of this territory. Locally, precipitation is said to have varied from a quarter-inch to as much as three-quarters west of town. The shower was preceded in the afternoon by the customary sandstorm, and the atmosphere was oppressively sultry and hot. Heavy clouds and almost continuous lightning were visible in all directions, but our rainfall appeared to come chiefly from the west. Daily papers reported showers east of us as well. While this welcome moisture seems to have covered only a part of South Plains, in those localities where it was received it will be the means of insuring bumper crops, both grain and cotton. Cotton, corn, maize, and hedges in this immediate territory are as fine as we have seen in many years.

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Democratic Primary Holds Spotlight; Some Races Heated

Saturday, July 25 is an important day for much of the population of Texas, for on that date Democrats from all walks of life will go to the polls to record their choice for the various public offices of precinct, county, and district, as well as state. As has been the custom for several years, the school building will be used as the local voting place, but we have not been informed who will act as judges and clerks for the election.

In our own precinct, Waldo McLaughlin is the only candidate for commissioner. T. J. Vandell the only man out for public weigher, while W. L. Henderson and D. M. Estes are both asking for the office of Justice-of-the-peace.

In county politics, there is judge's race is somewhat clouded by the recent appointment of the incumbent, Judge Happy Smith, as acting postmaster at Tahoka. Judge Smith is quoted as saying that he had withdrawn from the campaign, but a withdrawal from him in a county paper last week does not say this in so many words, and many people are of the opinion that he is still a candidate. Opposing him is P. W. Goad, who has become well known in this end of the county since the first of the year. Either man will make a splendid county judge.

For sheriff, B. L. Parker is asking for reelection on a basis of three successful past terms. His opponent, Bill Thompson, an old timer in Lynn county politics, has not campaigned to any extent, at least in our end of the county, and a great many of our people hardly know about him. The clerk's race bids fair to be one of the most interesting, with three good men.

H. C. Story is asking for his third term as tax collector for two terms and is now in his first term in the double office, is asking for reelection, and his opponent is Edgar Edwards. Edwards was in the race for this same office two years ago, going to the run-off with Mr. Cade. County treasurer's office is being sought by Miss Viola Ellis, who is now in her fifth term, and also by Miss Jewel Redwine, both young ladies being from Tahoka. District clerks' place is sought by Skip Taylor, incumbent, and by Miss Hattie Server of Wilson. Miss Server has campaigned earnestly among local people, and has made many friends during the campaign, whatever the results of the election.

In state politics, the representative's race, 119th district is well supplied with candidates. Tom Carter and Hop Halsey of Lubbock, J. Doyle Settle, incumbent, Crede J. Rhea of Leveland, and George Bond, Crosby county judge. We understand that Lynn county political prophets give the runoff to Settle and Rhea, but we make no predictions ourselves. Congressman George Mahon is opposed by E. J. Speck of Lubbock. Mr. Speck is running on the Townsend platform.

General state politics have been discussed in the daily press so thoroughly that the Index does not presume to put in a word, other than to deprecate the abusive, mudslinging tactics employed by various of the candidates. Surely, in this enlightened day, the faults of one candidate should not be proof of the qualifications of the faultfinder for the office in question. We sincerely trust that Texas, everywhere will bear this in mind.

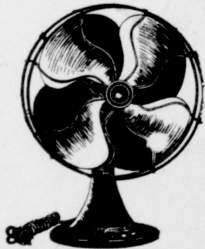
