

MES MILLWEE DROWNED NEAR SONORO, MAY 23

One of the most shocking tragedies that has ever befallen this community occurred near Sonoro Thursday afternoon, May 23, when James Millwee was drowned in a swift tributary of the Pecos river. The son of Mrs. Belle Knight, the young man had the misfortune of his life in this manner. He was here until the body was brought home for burial. As told by witnesses, it occurred in this manner: James and his cousin, Foster Patrick, were employed, at the Foster ranch, and were out with a group of other hands. They happened on ahead of the chuck wagon to scout out the best route through mud, as recent heavy rains had filled all streams from their banks. The two boys came to the edge of Howard arroyo which had overflowed into a rushing stream. Millwee's pony, which he was riding, became unruly and he fell off in midstream. He tried to get to his aid, and the Patrick boys succeeded in gaining a tree. When it was about for the chuck wagon crew to be in the stream, Kirkpatrick who was a strong swimmer, went to try to get him. He had made this trip a few days before but he had not yet in sight. As he left the tree, he called James to stay where he was and the others were there to help him, and as he left the boy was taken after him.

Patrick estimates that he was in the stream some fifteen or twenty minutes, or perhaps not so long when he turned back. He saw the young Millwee in the current. He thought the boy was swimming, but saw that he was really making no effort to turn. Mounting his own horse, Patrick headed into the stream to help his cousin. As he reached the stream, he saw that the boy was not so well as he had thought. Members of the crew instantly diving and grasping the boy of the country and Sonoro and the arroyo and river also, but was not until six o'clock the following morning, some twenty feet from the shore, the boy's body was found, about twenty-five feet from the spot where he was seen.

Some know why or how he came to the tree, or what caused him to fall. Some are of the opinion that he was dazed from watching the chuck wagon and fell from the tree. Others say he had tried to swim to shore and was seized with a cramp in the leg.

Federal services were held here Saturday afternoon at five o'clock, mass was made in the city cemetery following the simple but impressive rites which were conducted by the pastor, Rev. G. W. Montgomery, in the presence of hosts of possible survivors and the mothers, Belle Knight, his sister, Miss Belle Millwee, and Mr. and Mrs. Kimbrell, aunt and uncle, all of Sonoro, and an uncle Dr. Millwee of Dallas.

Several cousins, who had lived here with his mother and sister almost fifteen years, and his school days were concluded here, were employed at each of the services where he had become acquainted with practically every resident.

To us, the best that can be said of Jimmy is simply that he was just Jimmy; to those who knew and loved him the very name brings up his shy smile and his engaging manner.

There are many words which can bring comfort to the bereaved mother and sister, nor is this the place they should be spoken, but this article can not be closed without a tribute from the community—Jimmy was good without being goody-goody. He was kind and loving to his friends, and his loss will be felt by our entire community.

Amendments to be Passed on by Voters

Attention of our readers is called to the publication of three of the seven proposed amendments to the State constitution, which are now appearing in the Index. The law provides that all amendments to the constitution, which are now appearing in the Index, to be published for four weeks in some paper in the county, so that all voters may be fully cognizant of the question which they are asked to decide. These seven amendments will be offered to the voters of Texas on the fourth Saturday in August.

The three which are now being published in the Index are those which provide for the submission of the question of repeal of state-wide prohibition and providing for local option; the amendment which would give the Legislature the power to provide a system of old-age assistance not to exceed the sum of \$15 per month per person; and the amendment which provides that the Courts of the State of Texas having original jurisdiction of criminal actions shall have the power, after conviction, to suspend the imposition or execution of sentence and to place the defendant upon probation and to reimpose such sentence, under such conditions as the legislature may prescribe.

Our readers are asked to study these proposed amendments carefully, so that they may cast their votes wisely.

Water Conservation Plan Suggested By Postmaster

Following up the many and varied plans for water conservation which the recent drought brought into being Postmaster Hal Singleton has worked out a tentative system for the Plains country exclusively, this plan to be perfected and advanced thru the cooperation of our congressman.

Pointing out that many of the rivers in the upper stretches of the Plains, such as the Canadian and the Red Rivers, always overflow their banks during even a thunder storm, Mr. Singleton suggests that their channels be dredged so as to conserve the greater part of these flood waters, that canals be dug down into all parts of the plains, using old river beds as the foundation for this chain of irrigation canals, and damming up such courses to form lakes. These lakes would, of course be used as irrigation reservoirs, the water to be used in time of drought.

This part of the plains is some 900 feet lower than the upper stretches of either of these two rivers, Mr. Singleton reminds us, so that gravity would take care of the problem of keeping the lakes filled in this territory.

The idea as suggested by Mr. Singleton is attracting much interest among old timers here. Another phase of the plan is the belief that a chain of irrigation lakes would bring more rain through evaporation. In the beginning of the century, they recall, all this country was well watered, with small lakes, and there were rain clouds and plenty of rain, but as soon as the lakes and rivers were dried up and there was no moisture evaporating over the plains, rain fall became very much a question.

Furthermore, it should be desired, our own water power could be developed by permitting the streams to follow their courses over the caprock, and in future years this might become a great industrial center.

Mr. Singleton's plan in complete detail, but it is outlined so that its general aspects can be seen and understood. This plan is being sent to Congressman Mahon, for his approval, so that we are likely to hear more of it later.

To West Texans, it sounds just as practical and just as feasible as the Boulder Dam project, where millions of dollars were spent on very much the same principle. At any rate, no harm will come from the suggestion, and it may be that the next generation will see the South Plains as the greatest industrial center, or the greatest farming district in the world.

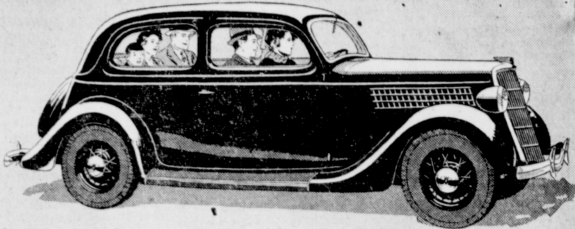

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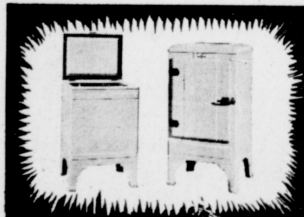

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an Amendment to Article III, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adopting a new Section to be known as Section 51-b, which shall provide that the Legislature shall have the power to provide under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for old-age assistance and for payment of same not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15) per month each to actual bona fide citizens of Texas over the age of sixty-five (65) years, who are not habitual criminals, nor habitual drunkards, nor inmates in any State supported institution; and providing that the requirements for length of time of actual residence in Texas shall never be less than five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for old-age assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such

application; and providing that the Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States financial aid for old-age assistance; providing for the necessary proclamation and making an appropriation to defray the expenses of proclamation, publication and election.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a Section to be known as Section 51-b, which shall read as follows:

"Section 51-b. The Legislature shall have the power by general laws to provide, under such limitations and restrictions and regulations as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for old-age assistance and for the payment of same not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15) per month each to actual bona fide citizens of Texas who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no habitual criminal, and no habitual drunkard while such habitual drunkard, and no inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, shall be eligible for such old-age assistance; provided further that the requirements for length of time of actual residence in Texas shall never be less than five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for old-age assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States such financial aid for old-age assistance as that Government may offer not inconsistent with the restrictions hereinbefore provided."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Texas on the fourth Saturday of August, 1935 at which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following clause:

"For the Amendment giving the Legislature the power to provide a System of Old-Age Assistance not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15) per month per person and to accept from the Government of the United States financial aid for old-age assistance."

"Against the Amendment giving the Legislature the power to provide a System of Old-Age Assistance not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15) per person per month and to accept from the Government of the United States financial aid for old-age assistance."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue

the necessary proclamation for election and have same printed in the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the funds in the treasury of the State, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of said publication and election.

Section 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, until a majority of the qualified voters of such county or political subdivision shall determine such to be lawful at an election held for that purpose; providing that such shall not prohibit the sale of alcoholic beverage containing less than 3.2 per cent alcohol by weight in cities, counties or political subdivisions in which the qualified voters have voted to legalize such sale under the provisions of Chapter 114, Acts of the Regular Session of the 43rd Legislature; providing for an election on the question of the adoption or rejection of such Amendment prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication of such by the Governor and making an appropriation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas as amended by striking out Section 20a to Section 20e, both inclusive, and substitute in lieu thereof the following:

"ARTICLE XVI Section 20.
(a) The open saloon shall be and is hereby prohibited. The Legislature shall have the power, and it shall be its duty, to define the term 'open saloon' and enact laws against such.

Subject to the foregoing, the Legislature shall have the power to regulate the manufacture, sale, possession and transportation of intoxicating liquors, including the power to establish a State Monopoly on the sale of distilled liquors.

(b) The Legislature shall enact a law or laws whereby the qualified voters of any county, justice's precinct or incorporated town or city, may, by a majority vote of those voting, determine from time to time whether the sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes shall be prohibited or legalized within the prescribed limits; and such laws shall contain provisions for voting on the sale of intoxicating liquors of various types and various alcoholic contents.

(c) In all counties, justice's precincts or incorporated towns or cities wherein the sale of intoxicating liquors had been prohibited by local option elections held under the laws of the State of Texas and in force at the time of the taking effect of Section 20, Article XVI of the Con-

stitution of Texas, it shall continue to be unlawful to manufacture, sell, barter or exchange in any such county, justice's precinct or incorporated town or city, any spirituous, vinous, or malt liquors or medicated bitters capable of producing intoxication or any other toxicants whatsoever, for beverage purposes, unless a majority of the qualified voters in such county or political subdivision thereof voting in an election held for such purpose shall determine such to be lawful; provided that this subsection shall not prohibit the sale of alcoholic beverages containing not more than 3.2 per cent alcohol by weight in cities, counties, or political subdivisions thereof in which the qualified voters have voted to legalize such sale under the provisions of Chapter 114, Acts of the Regular Session of the 43rd Legislature."

Sec. 2. Such proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State of Texas, on the fourth Saturday in August, 1935, at which election all voters favoring said proposed Amendment, shall write, or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR the amendment to this State Constitution repealing State-wide prohibition, prohibiting the open saloon and providing for local option."

And those voters opposed to said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"AGAINST the amendment to the State Constitution repealing State-wide prohibition, prohibiting the open saloon and providing for local option."

It appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for such election, and shall have the same published and such election held as provided by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Eight Thousand (\$8,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay for the expenses of said publication and election.

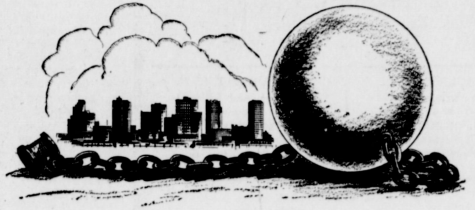
