





Painting Cellar Floor Rubber base paints frequently

are used for painting cement floors and basements, because they are resistant to alkali which would adversely affect some other types of paint. Before applying rubber base paints to a cement floor, any old paint should be removed with paint remover, all residue from the paint remover washed off with turpentine mineral spirits, and the floor thoroughly dried out. A further precaution before painting cement cellar floors, either new or old, is to etch them with muriatic acid solution in the proportion of about one pint of acid to one gallon of water. If the acid solution is used the floor should be well rinsed to remove traces of the acid and then thoroughly dried before painting. Two coats of the rubber base paint then can be applied, being careful that the first coat is dry before the second coat is applied.





In general the danger signals of rheumatic fever are pain and swell ing in the joints of the knee, ankles elbows or wrist The pain usually is felt in one of these centers and spreads to the others. Oftentimes a child will get irritable and without any visible signs of a good reason for this attitude: cry easily or develop habits of nervousness. A physician should consulted at once in such a situation, for these symptoms may be the beginning of rheumatic fever.

The best safeguards against this disease are to have each child examined at least once a year by a physician, to have the right kind of fodo and plenty of rest. When the disease is suspected of being present, a doctor should be called.


Although they don't know it, usually this condition of being selfcentered starts in childhood.

Lesson for October 5, 1947

WITH Sunday's lesson we turn into another field of Bible study for the concluding quarter of the year-messages from the Epistles, other than those of Paul.

This lesson, and the next two, are from the Epistle to the Hebrews-

one of my favorite books in the Bible. The passages of study for this lesson are Hebrews 1-2; 8:6-13; with kindred passages in Mat-thew 3:16, 17 and John 14:5-11. Suggested devotional reading for the lesson is Psalms 40:

The title of the lesson has reference, of course, to Christ-the better revelation of the Son of God in his appearance to bring the father's plan of redemption nigh unto all

The Father's Son

" G^{OD} , who at sundry times and in divers manners spake in time past unto the fathers by the prophets, hath in these last days spoken unto us by his son, whom he hath appointed heir of all things, by whom also he made the worlds,' chapter 1, verses 1 and 2.

"And Jesus, when he was baptized, went up straightway out of the water; and, lo, the heavens were opened unto him, and he saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove, and lighting upon him; and lo a voice from heaven, saying. This is my beloved son, in whom I am well pleased," Matthew 3:16, 17.

Could there be a more beautiful and impressive manifestation of God's acknowledgment of Jesus Christ as his son?

love is the Key

N THIS better revelation of Jesus Christ, we find that love is the key that opens the door into the brightly lighted room. "The father loved the son, and hath given all things into his hand," John 3:35.

Love is the key. It is ever so with all the revelations which God makes of himself to his trusting chil-

It is God's own will that he be revealed, and he must do the revealing. Turn to John 14:5-11, where we read again that revealing incident when Jesus patiently reassured Thomas and Philip, declaring "He that hath seen me hath seen the father."

The better revelation of God in Jesus Christ brings us far beyond the revelations of God in the Old Testament, •dramatic and impressive as they were. . . .

A New Covenant

THE better revelation means "a more excellent ministry," because Jesus Christ has now become "the mediator of a better covenant, which was established upon better promises," Hebrews 8:6. The first covenant was imperfect,

because it was manifest through humanity. Only the perfect son of the perfect God could manifest the better covenant. Jeremiah foresaw the better covenant. See Jeremiah 31: 31-34.

Now that the better revelation is our portion, what shall be our response? One cannot be excused today by claiming ignorance of God's proffered salvation unto, all men. He has revealed his love in the death of his only begotten son on the cross. He has revealed his love in abounding and forbearing mercies.

"How shall we escape if we neg-lect so great salvation?"




