New West Texas Tuberculosis Ass'n. **Organization Completed At Meeting**

People from 11 counties, including Lynn County, met in Lubbock Saturday, May 21, to work toward merging voluntary tuberculosis control efforts in a 23county area. Local people attending were Mrs. Lillian McCord and Mrs. Dub Harvick.

S. M. Kennedy, Ph.D., led discussions as chairman of the group's steering committee. Dr. Kennedy is dean of the College of Arts and Sciences at Texas Technological University.

Representatives of 22 of the counties had met on May 14 in Lubbock and determined on a name for the association, the West Texas Area Association; headquarters at Lubbock in what is now the Lubbock-Hale Tuberculosis Association quarters, and an executive secretary, Mrs. Clifford Sharp, now of the Lubbock-Hale association.

Dr. John H. Selby, Lubbock physician and a director of the state TB association, was elected president of the area association.

Dr. Selby, in commenting upon the merger, stated that through the merging of small TB associations which are tied together by geography, economics, and similar health problems, the service of one specialized, professional staff would be provided to conduct better TB programs and offer bet ter services, which individually none of the associations could afford. He also explained that decreased costs for fund-raising and administration would result "to provide better services to the publie through better use of the Christmas Seal dollar."

"This represents," said Dr. Selby, "a grass roots approach to conducting a program to eradicate tuberculosis in West Texas"

Dr. Selby explained that 162 counties in Texas have had no local tuberculosis associations, and that only 29 counties had full-time executive secretaries in their local tuberculosis associations.

The group adopted by-laws Saturday as proposed by Dr. Kenpartial board. Board membership, when completed, will have representatives from each county of the 23.



Ordinance

REGULATING THE KEEPING OF DOGS IN THE CITY OF O'DONNELL: PROVIDING FOR THE VACCINATION OF DOGS PROVIDING FOR A DOC POUND: PROVIDING FOR THL REDEMPTION OF DOGS AND THE DISPOSAL THEREOF IF NOT REDEEMED: AND PRO-VIDING FOR THE VIOLATION

OF THIS ORDINANCE. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF O'DONNELL, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. The City Clerk may employ a special office to be known and designated as the Dog Catcher, whose duty it shall be to carry out the terms and provisions of this Ordinance. The City Clerk shall be responsible to the City of O'Donnell for all moneys collected under this ordinance and shall make monthly reports in writing of all money collected under this ordinance to the Council and shall deposit with the city treasurer all money so collected at least once a month.

SECTION 2. All dogs within the City of O'Donnell, Texas, are hereby required to be vaccinated against rabies by some licensed veterinarian on or before June 1st, and each year thereafter and it is further provided herein that every Veterinarian who vaccinates any such dog, either male or female, within the City of O'Donnell, Texas, shall collect his fee for same from the owner of the dog and shall issue a certificate of vaccination to such owner, stating the name of the owner, a brief description of the dog, the date of vaccination and the fee col-

lected by him for same. SECTION 3. It shall be the duty of the Police or his authorized agent to capture and impound in a pen to be provided by the City for that purpose and called the "Dog Pound" and any dog, male or female, found running at large within the City of O'Donnell, Texas, without a tag as provided for under the terms of this ordinance

and if such dog, male, or female, is not redeemed and reclaimed and taken from said pound within the time required under the provisions of this ordinance then the Ctiy Clerk shall advertise said dog for sale twenty four hours by posting one notice of said sale at the door of the City Hall, which notice shall give the time and place of sale and shall, if not redeemed, sell said dog, male or female at public auction and if no one shall bid upon the same, the amount of charges due on said dog, the said dog shall be bought by the city at once and killed by the police or his duly authorized

SECTION 4. (a) The owner and keeper of any dog or dogs captured or impounded under the provisions of this ordinance shall be permitted and allowed at any time within forty-eight hours after such dog or dogs shall have been impounded, to redeem, reclaim and again receive possession of said dog or dogs, upon payment to the City Clerk, or his duly authorized agent, the sum of \$.25 per day or fractional part thereof during which time said dog or dogs may have been impounded for every such dog so impounded which sum so paid to him shall by the police be paid over to the City Clerk for deposit with the Treasurer for the use and benefit of the City as well as all other money received by him under the terms of this ordinance.

(b) Should the owner or keeper of said dogs, male or female, fail to redeem the same as provided for in paragraph (a) of this section within the forty-eight hours

then said dog or dogs shall advertised and sold or kuled in the manner provided for in thas ordinance. It shall be the duty of the police and duly a thorized Dog Catcher to see that the termof this ordinance are strictly enforced, provided however, that the terms of this ordinance shall not be applicable to dogs following countrymen into the City.

SECTION 5. The policemen of this city shall have the right to shoot or kill any rabid dog o any dog in the streets which sha'l manifest a disposition to bite.

SECTION 6. That any person who shall willfully take from any dog a collar or tag shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not to exceed \$100.00.

SECTION 7. Any person violating any provision of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not exceeding \$100.00.


