FFA CONVENTION

Eight members of the O'Donnell Future Farmers of America Chapter are attending the State FFA Convention in Houston this week, July 14-16, according to Jimmy Barton, president of the chapter. The three day meeting of representatives of over 900 FFA chapters throughout the state are participating in the awarding of degrees, scholarships and awards to outstanding members of the organization.

Principal speakers at the three day meeting included the Honorable Preston Smith, Lt. Governor of Texas, and Nenneth Kennedy of Cadiz, Kentucky, president of the national organization of the FFA. Approximately 4,000 rural youth are attending the Houston meeting, July 14-16.

Louis Birdwell will be awarded the Lone Star Farmer Degree and recognized as a Star Lone Star Farmer candidate.

Saturday was a day to remember here when O'Donnell was honored with a visit by one of her favorite sons, Bobby Dan Blocker. At the same time Dan was honored by an outpouring of love and admiration seldom paid to a man.

The largest crowd in the history of a local parade honored Bobby. Later at the rodeo a record crowd of 4,000 hung on Dan's every word as he made a brief talk.

Traveling back thru memory lane we are want to believe that his late father, Shack, could see the honor the town bestowed on his child who Shack "worshipped."

Dan is the same likable person he was known here and none of show business has changed his humble, likable personality.

In talking Saturday we heard so many recollections of old timers of Dan that we wish we could record all of them. In a short 20 years he has become such a legend to our town in that it is hard to keep fiction from fact in a report.

Hit by "lightning" some 5 or 6 years ago to play in "Bonanza," a T.V. series, the program on Sunday night, is now rated first in T.V. rating and Bobby is rated highest of the cast in this program.

We have more on Dan but time will wait.

Incidentally Dan picked up the tab on his visit and the Roping Club was out no expense.

To Dan, your home town, can not thank you enough for your generous token of love and assistance in a community project.

As noted in this column some months ago the Ed. is committed to making a park or a housing project of Block 93 (in the Flats). The Negro citizens have been gently forming a positive public opinion to improvements in this Block. Accordingly the Index has written the State Health Department for an investigation and to condemn the Block as a fire and health hazard.

A Napho Indian, born 79 years ago in Indian Territory, now Oklahoma, he was a working cowboy here in 1900 when our town had only three to four pioneer stores. In 1901 Rock moved here to make his home. He was elected deputy sheriff of the Venus precinct of Johnson county in about 1917 and served four years. (At that time precinct deputies were elected).

Rock, although not a Negro, is held in high esteem by the Colored Community for his honesty, fair play and intelligence. In getting a job done in this "island" of our community Rock is the man.

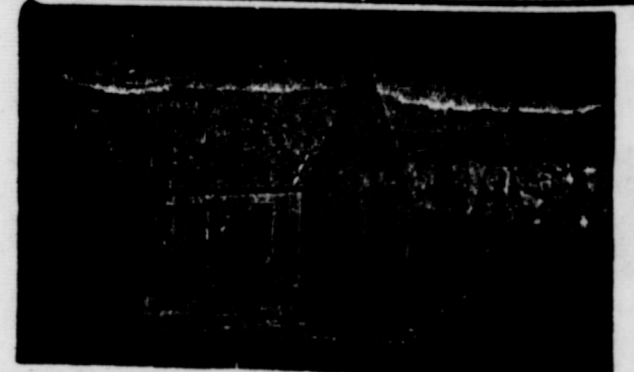

DUCK DODGES SHOTGUN 16 YEARS, KILLED LAST YEAR

Some ducks are smarter than some duck hunters! One of the smartest ducks that ever dodged a load of shotgun pellets finally met its fate in the vicinity of St. Catharines, Ontario, Canada.

The computers at the Migratory Bird Populations Center, Laurel, Maryland, have furnished Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife biologists with proof that this duck, a female redhead, had dodged the shotguns of Canadian and United States hunters for sixteen years before being downed last hunting season.

When young waterfowl biologist Cecil Williams leg-banded this duck at the Delta Research Station in Manitoba way back in 1948, World War II had only been over for three years. Harry Truman was in the White House, and manned space flights were only a gleam in the eyes of our scientists.

Now Cecil Williams is the Director of the Bureau's Denver Wildlife Research Center and human beings are taking a stroll through space at asped of over 17,000 miles per hour.

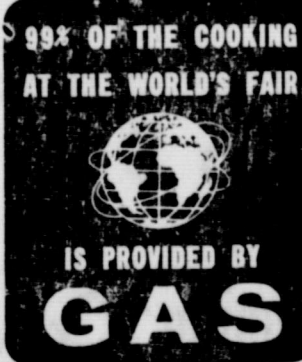

Most Drinking Starts Before College Days

NEW HAVEN, Conn.—Four out of every five college men who drink began their drinking before entering college, a researcher at Yale University's laboratory of applied physiology reported recently.

Robert Straus, research associate, disclosed for the first time preliminary results of a five-year study into the drinking habits of American college youth. This study was made by Mr. Straus and Selden D. Bacon, director of Yale's center of alcohol studies.

Of the American women students who drink, 65 per cent also started drinking before entering college, Mr. Straus said.

"The probability that a young person will drink at all," he continued, "is closely related to the practices of his or her parents."

"Of the men whose parents both drink, 90 per cent are themselves users. However, only half of the men (51 per cent) whose parents both abstain, drink."

"Where both parents are users, 83 per cent of the women drink on occasion. However, when both parents abstain, only 19 per cent of the women students drink."

He declared that parental advice on abstinence seems to be much stronger than advice from either church leaders or teachers.

Family income is a large factor "closely associated with the probability that one will use alcohol. Among those whose family income is under \$2,500, two thirds of the men and only 30 per cent of the women students drink."

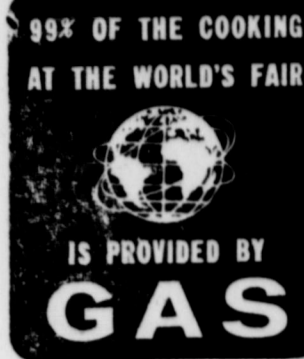
