Halsey In Race For Legislature



Hop Halsey, Lubbock druggist, announced his candidacy for representative to the Texas Legislature from the 119th district composed of Gaines, Dawson, Lynn, Terry, Yoakum, Cochran, Hockley, Crosby and Lubbock counties. He is the first announced candidate for the district seat.

Halsey is well known over the South Plains, having lived in Lubbock the past 15 years and associated with his father, Mark Halsey, in the drug business for the past 14 years. He is manager of Mark Halsey Drug No. 2 Broadway and College avenues. For the past year he has been broadcasting with his Drug Store Cowboy over KFYD and at numerous celebrations over this section.

He is a graduate of Lubbock High school and attended Texas Tech college for four years before entering the University of Texas where he studied law. In 1933 he returned to Lubbock to take charge of the college store his father opened.

Halsey was prominent in activities at Tech, and has been active in business and civic affairs since Halsey's previous political campaign experience came in the 1936

Census Bureau Shows Lynn 6th In Ginnings

Reports issued last week by the bureau of the census show that Lynn county placed sixth in the state for cotton production up to January 15th, with a total of 59,423 bales ginned.

Lubbock county placed fifth, with approximately 200 bales more than Lynn.

O'Donnell's gins report a total of 14,107 bales up to the same date, with all ginning practically complete.

Area ginnings for the 19 counties reported by the U. S. Bureau of the Census showed 208,416 bales ginned; for the corresponding date for the 1938 season ginnings were 443,929 bales.

Five South Plains counties ginned more than 20,000 bales for the season: Lubbock, Lynn, Lamb, Hockley, Dawson. Other counties ranked Crosby, Hale, Terry, Seely, all with more than 20,000 bales. Nueces with 78,063 bales, led the state; Ellis was second with 72,996; San Patricio, third with 59,923; Collin fourth with 59,727.

Other rankings in the high producing counties were: Hunt, El Paso, Fannin, Navarro, Hill, McLennan, Kaufman, Lamb, Williamson, Grayson, Hidalgo, Lamar, Wharton, Fort Bend, Hockley, Dawson, Falls, Cameron, Delta, Limestone, Bell, Dallas, Houston, Wilbarger.

State ginnings were 2,715,969 bales as compared with 2,596,787 bales for the previous year.

One more ginning report will be expected some time late in March, with a final connection probably in the late summer or early fall.

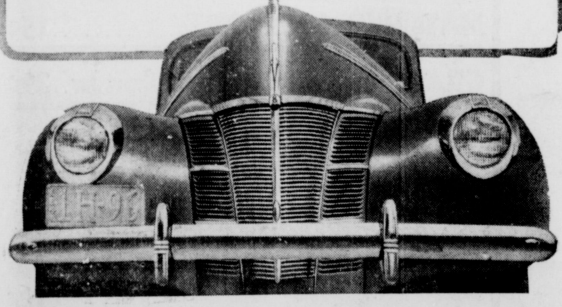
Reports show that ginning in this area is practically a thing of the past. One or two gins in the county may have another day or two. Some of the gins have closed down for the season.

Five counties showed greater ginnings in 1939 than in 1938: Castro, Lamb, Lynn, Parmer, Terry. The latter, which includes Yoakum, has approximately a 90 per cent increase in this year. Lynn county's increase is due to improved conditions nearly 4,000 bales.

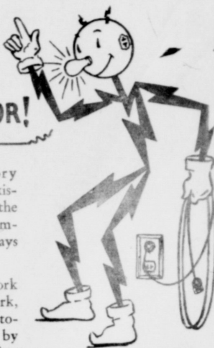
