Hawks 7 Lions 15

Pass interference calls at crucial points in last Friday night's game at Brownwood cost the Iowa Park Hawks the game. Final score was 7 to 15 favoring the Lions.

Brownwood scored first with a 27-yard field goal kicked in the first quarter by Rodney Folsom.

That score stood alone until the last seconds of the half when Iowa Park scored on a 4-yard pass from Grog Frazier to Jerry Burkhardt, with a PAT kicked by Wayne Hallford.

Play leading to this touchdown was interrupted about a minute while officials were deciding if Frazier had made first down on the Lion 4. The officials studied the position of the ball a seeming eternity before the decision was made that Frazier had made the six inches he needed. During several seconds of this time the game clock was running. Hawk players noticed it and called attention of the officials to this error.

Another unfortunate play as far as the Hawks were concerned was an interception made by James Frazier. He caught the ball on Iowa Park's 1. Tackled into the end zone, the officials declared a safety had been made, bringing the score to 7-5 Iowa Park.

In the fourth stanza, had luck again stalked the Mean Green. A defensive holding penalty gave the Lions a first down on the Hawk 24. They moved down to the 3 and Folsom kicked a field goal from the 21 to make the score 8-7 Lions.

With 5:25 remaining, Iowa Park took the kickoff and reached the Hawk 12. Frazier passed to Perkins twice and Steve Webb once. His next pass to Perkins carried to the Lion 25 but officials set the Hawks back to their own 43 on an offensive pass interference call.

On the next play the ball was knocked loose from Frazier and caught in the air.

Brownwood then went in for a 7-point touchdown and bonus with only 9 seconds remaining.

The loss to Brownwood broke Iowa Park's 34-game unbeaten record. This Friday night Stephenville will come here, and the Mean Green will have opportunity to get a new row of victories started.

Hawk fans will be happy to learn that District 4-AAA, which includes Iowa Park, will not have any changes of membership in the next two years.

Schedule of games this year will be reversed next season, and host teams this year will be visiting teams next term.

Non-district games for the Iowa Park teams will naturally be up to the schools with whom we wish to schedule games.

1971 4-H Scholarships at Record Level

SPECIAL - Rapidly approaching is an occasion of special significance for nearly 3-million youths. It is the 50th National 4-H Congress, Nov. 28-Dec. 2.

And this Golden Anniversary will turn into actual gold for nearly 300 4-H members who will receive educational scholarships ranging from \$300 to \$1,600.

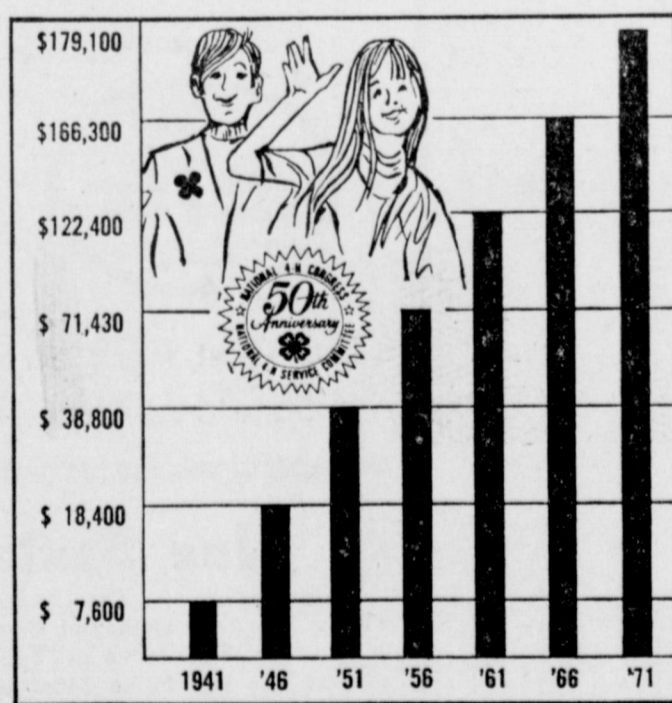
Scholarships available to 4-H'ers during the Golden Anniversary year are at an all-time high \$179,100. Most of them in the amount of \$700 will be presented to the fortunate young people at special events during the Congress.

The funds are provided through the generosity of donors to 4-H through the awards programs supervised by the Cooperative Extension Service and arranged by the National 4-H Service Committee.

6,400 over 40 Years

Scholarships were first offered 4-H members some 40 years ago. Since then donors have provided some 6,400 scholarships valued at more than \$2.8 million. And they also have funded an estimated 50,000 expense-paid trips to the National 4-H Congress and other events over the 50-year period.

Besides the scholarships and trips in 1971 nearly 200,000 other 4-H'ers will be recognized for outstanding accomplishments in the form of county medals, U.S. Savings Bonds, watches, plaques and other awards.



Some 60 companies, foundations and civic organizations have contributed this year over \$1.4 million to the support of 4-H through the National Committee and several lent their support throughout the 50 years the committee has been in existence. Others are in their first decade of sponsorship.

Donors Span 50 Years

Armour and Company has allocated funds for advancement of 4-H activities for over half a century. Cities Service Company, Coats and Clark Inc., Allis-Chalmers and Carnation Company also are

among long-time sponsors. Ford Motor Company Fund, Hercules Incorporated, Standard Brands Incorporated and Union Oil Company of California have been contributors over several decades.

John Deere, Eli Lilly and Company and General Foods Corporation joined the 4-H donor ranks more than 10 years ago.

in Africa**

The Rev. Mr. Harry T. Maclin Jr., organizer and director of the All-African Conference of Churches' communications training center & his wife Alice will speak at 6:00 p.m. Sunday, Oct. 24, in the First United Methodist church of Wichita Falls.

H. T. and Alice have returned to this country after completing their 5th term of missionary service. They have turned over the training center to African leaders.

In response to a growing demand for training in skills relating to visual education and radio and television broadcasting, the Communications Training Center was established in 1966. Maclin was its first director and Mrs. Maclin organized and taught the courses in basic communications.

The Maclins first went to the Congo in 1954. Through 1959 they were involved in teaching and in school administration. From 1962 through 1964, H. T. conducted courses and seminars in communications in various African countries as the AACC's commission on communication director.

Prior to becoming a missionary Maclin served a pastorate in Dallas. Mrs. Maclin taught English at SMU. The couple have four children.

**Santa Rosa Dist.
Women Meet
in Childress**

"No longer can anyone live in his own little world," said Mrs. Robert Tipps, third vice-president of Texas Federation of Women's Clubs when she spoke to club members at the Santa Rosa district workshop Saturday in Childress.

"Concerned Women Seeking Expansion" was title of her challenging address. She remarked that change is a prerequisite to survival in today's world; change is accompanied by turbulence; but change just for the sake of change is not wise.

She advised all groups to extend their benefits to reach more people in more varied areas of endeavor, with a new understanding because by the year 2000 three-fourths of the world's population will be black, yellow and brown and three-fourths of the persons in this country will be under 26 years of age.

The eight department chairmen and the chairman of project committees suggested methods for promoting community improvement, respect for morality and law, more vital home life, and utilizing potential ability of women for the betterment of mankind.

The verse of scripture advancing the theme was "Ask and it will be given you, seek and you will find, knock and the door will be opened." The women were encouraged to do their own research for projects and programs, rather than to designate outsiders for the task.

Orange Filling Enhances Cake

"The filling can make the cake," is more than true when that filling is a smooth corn starch thickened custard.

This one is deliciously fresh tasting because it is made with freshly squeezed orange juice and grated orange rind. For extra goodness, whipped cream is folded into the custard just before spreading on the cake.

Such a filling can be used to enhance the goodness of a prize sponge or chiffon cake or to work dessert magic with bakery sponge layers.

Orange Filling

3 tablespoons corn starch
1 teaspoon grated orange rind
½ cup orange juice
½ cup light corn syrup
2 egg yolks, slightly beaten
1 tablespoon margarine
½ cup heavy cream

With a spoon, blend corn starch, orange rind, orange juice and corn syrup in a double boiler top. Cook over boiling water, stirring constantly, until mixture thickens. Cover and cook 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. Stir a little hot mixture into egg yolks, then stir all into remaining hot mixture in double boiler top. Cook 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from boiling water. Stir in margarine. Cover and chill. When ready to fill cake, whip cream and fold into chilled mixture. Makes about 1½ cups.

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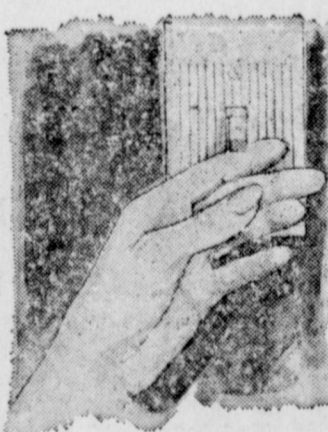
