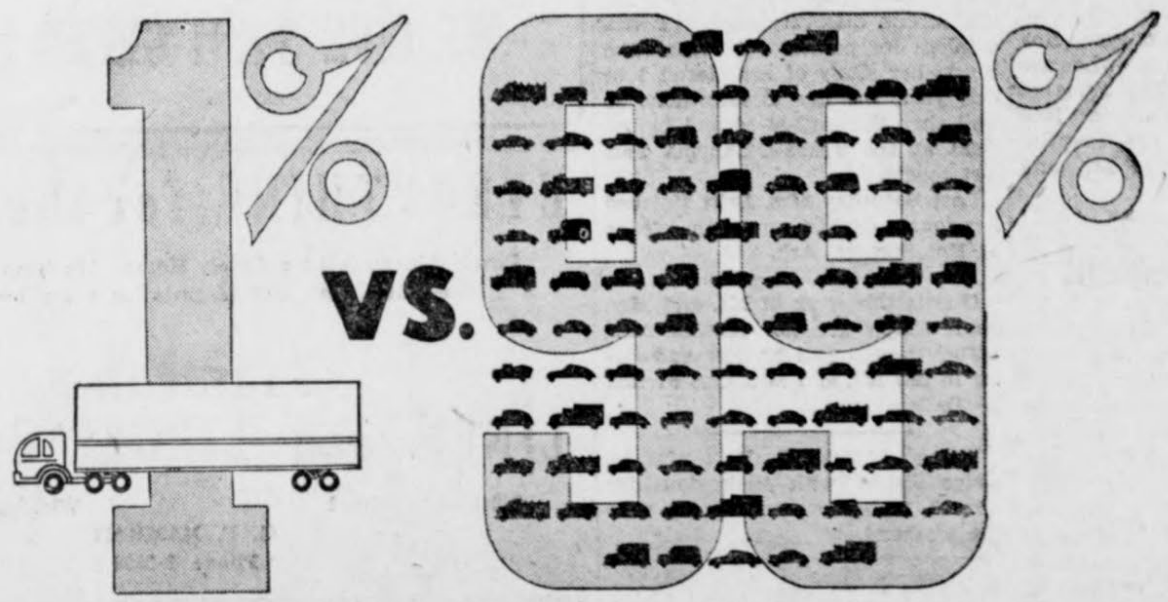
5 yards, and then Fullback Ben Huckaby dived through the line for the tying touchdown.
