Mr. Johnson comes here from the headquarters of the Methodist church in Washington, D.C. He received nationwide recognition when he led the clean-up fight against roadhouses, gangsters and booze-runners in Bloody Williamson county — Herrin, Ill. His present lecture tour for the Methodist church has brought him from the Pacific coast, where he addressed large audiences and was received with great enthusiasm in pulpits throughout the West.

One of the outstanding lecturers on the American platform, Mr. Johnson has the reputation of deal-

ing with present social problems particularly as they apply to modern youth and their relation to their elders, in a most practical, constructive and engagingly interesting way. Mr. Johnson, as a former Deputy Investigator in Illinois, had a rare "the bad men" and "the bad kids" and the conditions in society lying back of them, along with other valuable data on social problems of the day. His several years of experience of organization work in social welfare, and particularly his unique contacts with vast numbers of high school and college youth have been responsible in part for the high regard in which he is held by ministers and school men throughout the country.

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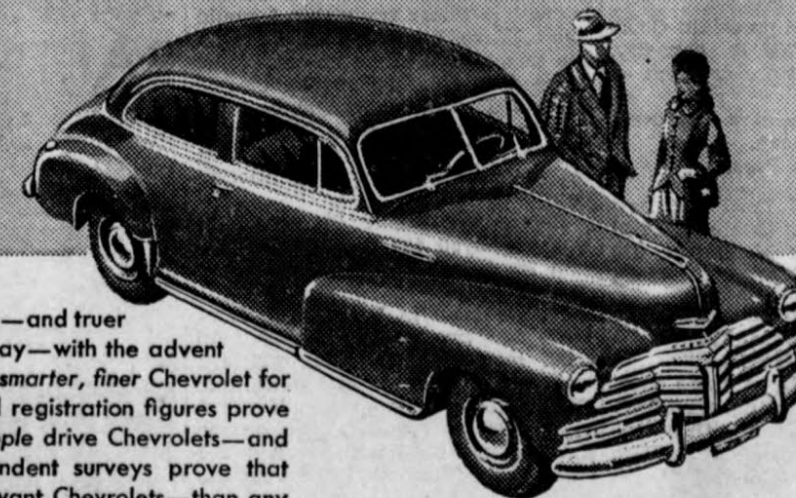

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Motion Pictures, Their Improvement Is Subject At 23 Study Club

Mrs. Sam Hill was leader of a timely and interesting program of the Twenty-three Study club March 4 when members enjoyed the hospitality of Mrs. L. E. Brooks at her "Spot of Paradise" at the experiment station.

In view of the unceasing fight for better films being waged in America by individuals and organizations, the program subject, "Four Bell Films," was of unusual significance. In her introductory remarks Mrs. Hill emphasized the tremendous influence exerted by motion pictures on the thinking and character of the people of the world. She mentioned that parents should make their efforts for cinematic purity constructive by supporting pictures that afford good clean entertainment.

The leader read a personal letter written to the local study club by Cecile B. DeMille, motion picture executive, in which he gave credit to the importance of women's clubs in their crusade for finer pictures.

Mrs. Richey Abernathy gave in a very interesting manner, The Background of an American, Cecile B. DeMille. She traced his fine ancestry to Holland. She said that his background was like a series of chapters in a historical text book. Inheriting his love of the stage from his father, Anthony Demille, he now stands at the pinnacle of a career that has been marked by success at every turn. She asserted, DeMille's constant striving to give the public pictures that are technically superior and more palatable to the people of Christian conscience has made him great, was her concluding opinion.

Mrs. Earle Denny gave some singular highlights of "Unconquered," DeMille's latest picture. She told how he received inspiration for the picture through reading the custom of importing English convicts to America in the 1760's and selling them as slaves. The word "slavery" galvanized him into action. She described some of the most spectacular sets, scenes and characters of the picture.

As the basic principles of all DeMille pictures were given by three speakers, they showed how he steadfastly tries to give worthwhile entertainment on an ethical level and teach something new about the world and that much of the action deals with heroic characters.

The roll call response of favorite motion pictures preceded two vocal solos which were made popular by motion pictures. Mrs. C. W. Coppock sang the selections "Blue Skies" and "You Were Meant for Me." Piano accompaniment was by Mrs. James Sewell.

During the business session conducted by the president, Mrs. King Abernathy, Mrs. Brooks was elected delegate and Mrs. Homer Blalock alternate to the district convention at Breckenridge, April 15 and 16.

Since the silver anniversary of the club is this year, recognition will be given this club at the convention. A poll of the club designated the "Youth Participation" program on Feb. 5, directed by Mrs. Homer Blalock as the outstanding program so far this club year.
