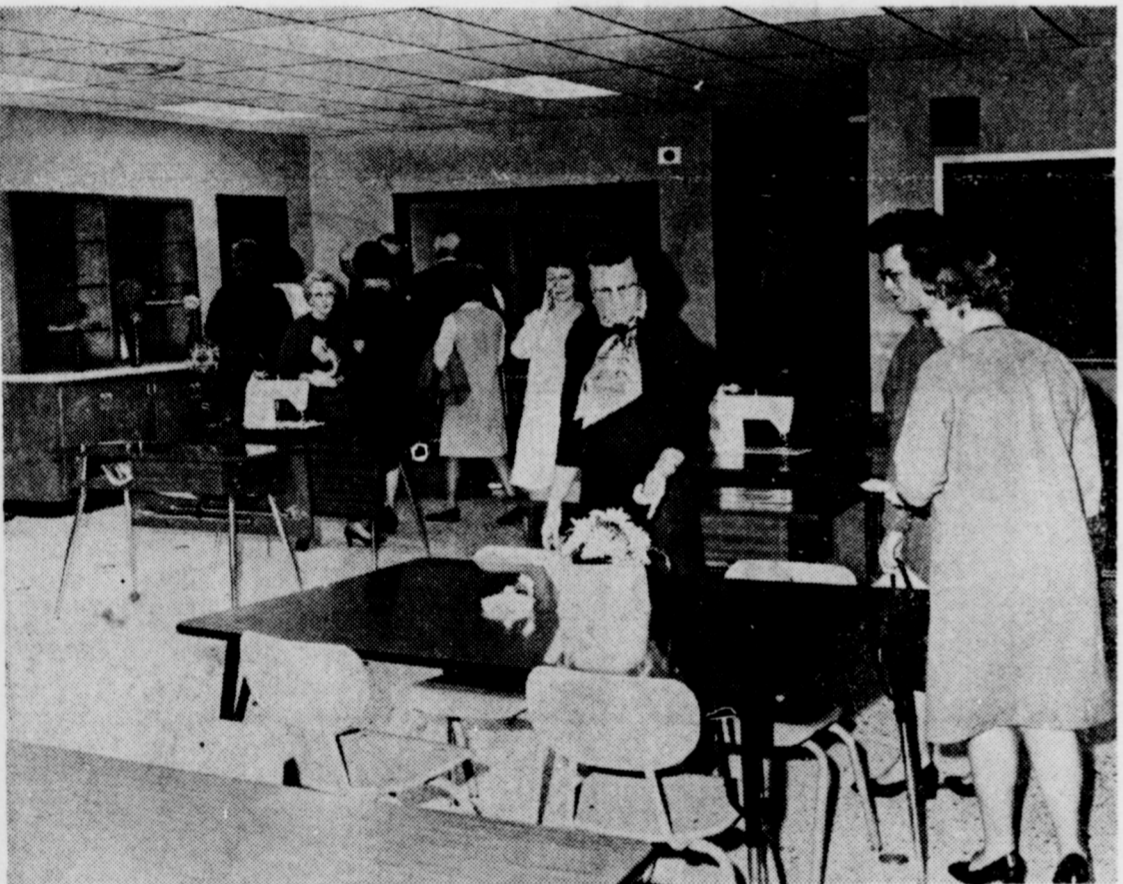

## R. R. Brubaker Taken by Death

Robert R. Brubaker, 31, died last Friday morning in Wichita, Okla., after a long illness.

Born June 21, 1888, in Kansas, Bob was brought to Iowa Park when he was only three months old. He attended school here and then finished his studies in Valparaiso Law School in Indiana.

He then became associated with his father in the retail lumber business and later was manager of two lumber yards.

Brubaker and Miss Bess Sherrod were married Dec. 27, 1916. She died in 1966.

Besides his regular employment, Brubaker found time to serve as Justice of the Peace in Precinct 3 for more than 30 years, and gave the work his full attention more than 20 years.

One of his duties was to keep records of births and deaths in the Precinct. The deaths ran into quite a figure, but during the past quarter-century there were no births to record! It seems all the prospective mothers had time to reach the hospital, or managed to be away from home for the blessed event!

Bob was Sunday school superintendent of First Baptist church here 38 years, was a deacon and member of the building committee of 1926.

## Vocational School Studied by Group of I.P. Educators

Representatives from an alert administrative staff and a progressive-minded school board spent last Thursday in Duncan, Okla., observing the Area Vocational-Technical Center on the high school campus there.

Those making the trip were Faris Nowell, superintendent of Iowa Park schools; Dean Miller, counselor and guidance teacher; Fred Parkey, Cecil Streich, Hoyt Watson, trustees of Iowa Park Independent School District; Mrs. M. L. Hines, former teacher; Mike Malonev, member of an architect firm.

This was another step in exploration to determine the ways in which Iowa Park school can best serve the community in developing the potentials of its students.

It is a follow-up to surveys made in the past few years by our educators and interested citizens as to the need for vocational education and the job opportunities that are available in the immediate area.

Purpose of such research at this time is stated in a curriculum handbook furnished by John Sibley: "Technological developments and the rapid pace of change in our society have focused attention on vocational education.

"No longer does the son learn a trade or find his place of work by serving as an apprentice to his father. No longer can the youth of 16 leave school and go to work. Nor can youngsters who graduate from high school without preparation for a job expect to find employment with job security.

"The girl who graduates from high school no longer makes plans for marriage only—she, too, will be seeking employment, perhaps not once but several times."

Under the direction of Hoyt Sandlin of the Area School at Duncan, members of the Iowa Park group were amazed at what they discovered. They returned with an enthusiastic desire that

At present IPHS offers vocational home economics, vocational agriculture, which includes ornamental horticulture, and auto mechanics. In addition, our district has received approval when funding is provided, for initiating courses in building trades, cosmetology and business mechanics.

Regardless of some difficulties, it is now planned that building trades will be offered next September. The course will be conducted on the Cluster Plan with training in masonry, plumbing, carpentry and cabinet making, cement-concrete finishing, and electrical repair work.
