Lions club members were informed by Vernon Stewart, state representative, concerning the constitutional amendments to be considered in the general election on Tuesday, Nov. 4.

Lion Harold Dykstra offered the invocation. George Huckaby presided at the luncheon meeting in the absence of F. M. Wilson and Morris V. Jacks.

Guests were introduced by Keith Swim: Temple Driver of Wichita Falls and John Sibley of Iowa Park.

In his talk Stewart said, "The 55th legislature, meeting in 1957, passed resolutions proposing 11 amendments to the state constitution. Three were adopted at the November 1957 general election.

- "The other nine include:
1. Annual sessions and salaries for members of the legislature.
  2. Retirement, disability and death compensation for officers and employees of the county or precinct.
  3. Filling of vacancies in office of county judge and justice of the peace.
  4. Resignation by district, county or precinct official serving 4-year term in announcing for different office, if more than one year of term remains.
  5. Permitting cities to extend by majority vote the terms of officers, elective and appointive, from two to four years.
  6. Pensions for retired Texas Rangers who are ineligible to participate in Employees Retirement System of Texas.
  7. Authorizing legislature to establish procedure and make appropriations for advertising historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational recreational and other resources of Texas.
  8. Allowing legislature to authorize vendor payments for medical care to citizens on old age assistance, needy blind, dependent children and aid to permanently and totally disabled rolls.
  9. Allowing legislature to create hospital districts in Amarillo, Wichita county and Jefferson county.
- After reading the summary of each Amendment, Stewart made a more detailed explanation.

Lion C. E. Birk served as program chairman for the meeting. Sweetheart Harriett Coppock and former sweetheart Brownie Tanner provided the luncheon music.

## Area Pioneer Dies at Age 97

Mrs. Fidela Balch, 97, mother of Mrs. W. R. Bradford of Wichita Falls and formerly of Iowa Park, died in a Wichita Falls hospital Saturday, July 5, following a fall in which she broke a hip.

Funeral services were conducted at 3:30 Sunday afternoon with Rev. George Lawler officiating. Burial was in Highland cemetery of Iowa Park. Pallbearers were J. O. Wadsworth, O. C. Callaway, E. M. Boone, Rev. L. H. Hood, all of Wichita Falls, and B. L. Bradford of Iowa Park.

Born Sept. 22, 1860 in Moscow, Tex., daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Hulet, she moved to Wise county as a young girl.

In later years she entertained her grandchildren by telling of the will horses, Indian raids, and the freeing of slaves as she remembered as a girl. She had been a member of the Baptist church since childhood.

Mrs. Balch and her husband, the late J. E. Balch, who died in 1933, resided on a farm near Petrolia for many years. Wichita Falls became her home in 1935.

Two of the four children that preceded her in death were well known here: Mrs. August Galey and Wallace Balch.

## Reflections from the Bible

It is just as necessary today that we meet squarely, and contend earnestly with every false teacher and with every false religion, in the interest of the faith which was once delivered to the saints. The Lord will no more allow a compromise with error today that he would allow it in the days of Jude. Read that book.

We do not like to contend for contentions sake. On the other hand for righteousness sake it is absolutely necessary that Christians stand squarely for the teachings of the New Testament and in opposition to every form of error. We are not anywhere exhorted to contend for any ism or creed or discipline or confession of faith or manual. But we are exhorted to contend earnestly for the faith which was outlined by the apostles under the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

Oftimes contentions arise over personal opinions or private hobbies. There isn't a hobby or an opinion in the world worth contention for, with the kind of contention that Jude enjoins upon people in the interest of unadulterated New Testament Christianity. Paul one time said, "I am set for the defense of the gospel." He had in mind the same thing Jude had in mind when Jude said "Contend earnestly for the faith."

#### DO YOU WANT GOD TO HEAL YOUR BODY?

The top men on my staff and I were interviewed recently. These are three of the questions asked. I believe the answers are very important to everyone seeking help from God. I invite you, my readers, to consider them for your own personal benefit.

Q. Is there any connection between Christianity and health? Yes, very much indeed! Our health is a vital challenge to Christianity. And every Christian can thank God for his opportunity to help bring God's healing power into the bodies of his fellow men today, as well as salvation to their souls.

"Healing," as we use the word, means an all-inclusiveness. We believe that Christ wants to heal your soul; he wants to heal your body; he wants to heal your attitude. In fact, Christ wants to make you whole and complete in your entire being. The phrase that he very often used was this: "Be made whole," which literally means, be in good health, soul and body.

Our Lord Jesus is concerned with all hurt things. He came to heal all who are hurt and to save the lost.

The Bible says that every time a little, worthless sparrow falls to the ground God sees it. When some little boy shoots into a tree and you see a little sparrow crumpled with its wings folded, you may remember that God is concerned with that little bird.

When God looked down from Heaven, he saw that people were hurt. Their bodies were afflicted. Their minds were filled with frustration, fear and torment. Their souls were bound by evil and sin.

God looked upon them and heard their cries. He sent his Son into this

world for them. And Jesus came to save the soul, to heal the mind and the body, and to lift people to a higher plane of daily living. We call this higher plane "the more abundant life." And that is why we know that Christianity is vitally connected with our health and well-being.

Q. Should a person use other resources before coming to God for healing?

Ordinarily, yes. God in his goodness has placed many healing agencies on earth for us. These are agencies such as medical skill, regular recreation and exercise, proper eating, climate, love and understanding.

Included also are strong positive mental and spiritual attitudes. We must constantly challenge any fears, frustrations or hate we may be fostering. We must seek for right relations with others. On the other hand, we know that all true healing comes from only one source—God. But not everyone has the strong conviction to be able to receive healing through faith alone.

For those, however, who do have the faith to come directly to the source, God is prepared to bless them even as Christ promised when he said, "As thou hast believed, so be it done unto thee."

Q. How can I know when I have really believed?

When you can no longer doubt . . . when all things you have been trying to do to help you believe have been done . . . when you know without any reservation that what God has promised to do, he will do . . . when you reach that state of KNOWING, then you have really believed.



## Jack Lemons Advanced to New Army Sergeant Rank

The army recently created a new pay grade — E8 — and one of the first men promoted to that grade was John E. Lemons, son of Mr. and Mrs. Elbert L. Lemons of Unit 35, Valley Farms.

### M-SGT. LEMONS HONORED

Six years of military service as a commissioned officer, 133 months of service as a first sergeant or major sergeant, and three battle decorations for outstanding combat service are just some of the items listed on the distinguished record of M-Sgt. John E. Lemons, Sergeant Major for the 6th Army.

The native of Wichita Falls entered the army at the age of 18 in 1940 and two years later was sent to England with the 347th Eng. Bn. to build airfields in and near London.

He remained with this unit for nine months before being reassigned to the 809th Tank Destroyer Bn. in North Africa. This was followed by service with the 3d Inf. Division with which he participated in the French Morocco and Tunisia campaigns, and the invasion of Sicily.

He returned to the States and was assigned to civilian component duty with national guard units in Texas and Wisconsin on two different occasions. He served with these units for three years.

Sgt. Lemons served his first tour of duty in Germany from July 1951 to December 1953 with the 2d Armd Division.

In May 1955 he left his post at the Army Language School, Presidio of Monterey, to join the 3d Armd Division. He gyroscooped with the Division for his second tour of duty in Germany.

He was the First Sergeant of Co. C, 29th AIB, in 1955 when one of the platoons from that company won the Division's Best Armored Infantry Platoon award. The winning platoon scored 1629 out of a possible 1700 points.

The 36-year-old sergeant major has been awarded the Purple Heart, Bronze Star, and the Combat Infantryman Badge. He also holds a reserve commission as Captain, Armor.

Lemons attended Iowa Park High School. His wife is the former Miss Elsie Mathis, daughter of Mrs. Ida Mathis and the late W. M. Mathis, also of Valley Farms. She and their sons Jimmy Dale and Johnny have been in Germany during both tours of duty mentioned above.

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




## Irrigation Water Management

Land leveling, laterals, checks, turnouts and tube siphons are used to improve management of irrigation water.

Soil conservationists define irrigation water management as applying the quantity of water needed as determined by the needs of the crop, water holding capacity of the soil, water intake rates of the soil, and quality of water.

Purpose of irrigation water management is to make efficient use of available water without significant erosion, provide uniform crop stands, uniform growth, optimum production, and prevention of deposits of harmful salts where a low quality of water is used.

Applying the correct amount of water requires information on the amount of water to replace in soil, efficiency of water applied, quality of water, water intake rate of soil, and quantity of water available.

Soil Conservation Service technicians are available to help you determine these steps in irrigation water management.

**TYPES OF FLOOD IRRIGATION**  
Farmers may consider level borders, graded borders, level furrows, or graded furrows as a method of applying irrigation water, according to Elvy Sargent, work unit conservationist of the SCS at Iowa Park.

These methods may be accomplished by field leveling or border leveling. However, lands must slope less than six inches per 100 feet to be suitable for field leveling, and best results will be obtained with land that slopes less than three inches per 100 feet.

Steeper soils may be leveled by bench borders.

Co-operators with the SCS have available soils information furnished by the Service on which to plan their irrigation systems. This information includes soil depth, water holding capacity of each foot of soil, quantity of water available for plants, and soil intake rates. After considering these factors, a farmer can determine crops that may be irrigated.

Some soils have intake rates of one-tenth to one-fifth inches per hour. It would follow that if three inches of water are needed and a soil will take one-tenth inch per hour, it would take 30 hours to irrigate this soil. Crops that are adapted to long periods of water flooding must be used.

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
