





A bit early to be thinking about preserves? Not really. Preserve shooting takes planning, reservations, etc. Besides, there's another interesting aspect

In the past year, commercial shooting preserves have made the biggest gain in their history. There are now over 400 of them, in 42 states, compared to some 300 in 1968. These preserves, open to the public, offer pheasant, chukar partridge, mallard and quail shooting for a fee. Many have seasons six months long, with top-flight shooting over good bird dogs. Some even have exotic big game shooting.

Has it ever occurred to you that every time you pay your fee at a commercial preserve, you're also furthering the cause of the sport you love? As in any business, one successful preserve leads to the establishment of another. If enough of us participate, some day there may be commercial shooting preserves within easy reach of everybody

everywhere.

A special directory of the nation's commercial preserves, including their locations and types of game offered, appears in the October issue of "Outdoor Life" magazine. My advice? Get it,


