"Making Men Out of Boys"

Coach Tommy Watkins made a season-end report Tuesday to Noon Lions on the State Champion Hawks. He summed up the season by saying that every man on the squad had an intense desire to win state. He and the assistant coaches, therefore, never had any difficulty getting the players "up" for a game.

Watkins traced the Hawks' fortunes through the past six years, when they won district each time but fell short of the state title each time until 1969.

Asked when he decided Iowa Park could go all the way, the coach said, "After we came from behind to beat Hirci, I knew the boys had the desire and the ability to make it."

He also said he has coached a long, long time and never has had a better bunch of boys all in one squad.

Concentrating on the Klein game, Watkins said he and the other coaches studied film of the opponents and decided the Hawks could run around the ends whenever they wanted to. This they

did so well, they could even run through Klein when necessity demanded.

The coach could not say enough fine things about the defensive play of the Hawks. He feels that the defense was the making of the squad, and made the offense the power it became.

Of the 34 players this year, 19 are due to be back for further gridiron play—11 will be seniors, 7, juniors; 1, sophomore. All 34 squadmen played enough to earn varsity letters, and 33 Hawks were in the final game of the season.

Watkins pointed out that in the new district Iowa Park will have better crowds, stronger competition, and shorter travel. So the whole outlook is brighter.

In discussing the graduating seniors, the coach said most of them will have no trouble securing a bid to play football for the colleges of their choice.

Lions President Faris Nowell wound up the program by praising the coaches because they are "Making men out of boys."

Make Heating of Your Home Really Safe

Looks like it might be a cold winter, and your family's comfort depends on having heating equipment in proper condition.

Regardless of the type of heating equipment in our home, there are steps you should take for it to do its job—safely.

Fuel burning central heating systems should be inspected annually to see that vents have no obstructions, that the burner is properly adjusted, and that the unit is still sound in all respects.

The area around the unit must be kept free of clutter. A qualified heating contractor will make your inspection and furnish the service for a reasonable charge.

New filters should be installed each year and cleaned periodically. In most cases, removing them and shaking out the dust, or once over lightly with vacuum cleaner is all that is necessary.

Provisions are made to introduce air into central furnaces so they will have sufficient oxygen. Unvented heating equipment requires oxygen. A window left slightly open to bring in fresh air is a must.

Never use a match to check for a gas leak. Soap suds can be brushed on the suspected connection, and if bubbles appear, immediate action should be taken to stop the leak.

Free standing heaters should be equipped with guards to keep loose clothing away from the flame.

After all, safety is a simple matter.

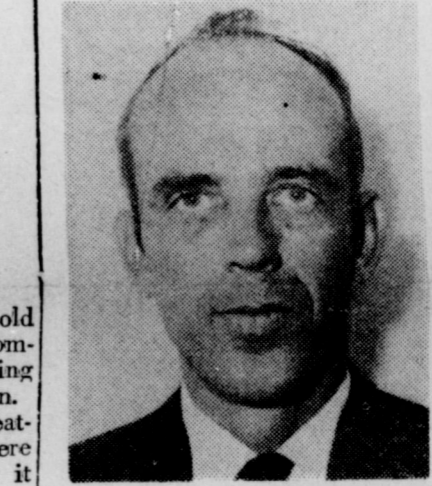

Mrs. J. M. Nall of Loving, mother of Mrs. Bill Robinson, has been admitted to the Graham hospital for observation.

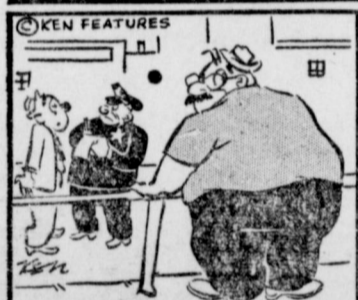

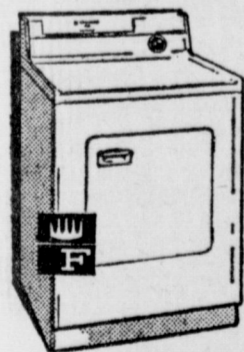
