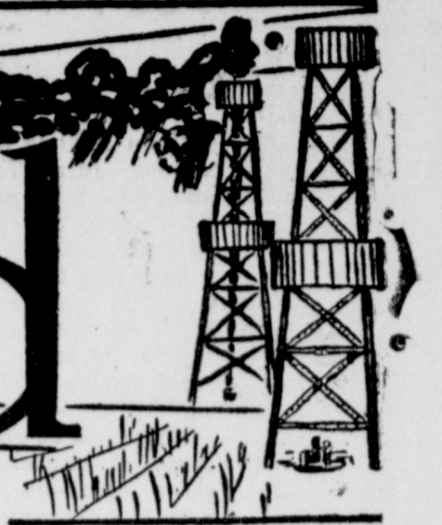

K. G. Wilks, city secretary, issued a statement late Wednesday there is plenty of water in City lakes, but the people are using it so fast during this hot weather the pumps cannot get it here and through the filtration plant.

Water Commissioner H. M. Mahler and Mayor E. F. Soell ask the people in even numbered houses to water lawns only on even numbered days; people in odd numbered houses to water lawns only on odd numbered days. This condition will exist until it rains or the weather gets cooler. Mr. Wilks emphasized there is no water shortage.

State tax equalization rate based on full market value of property
Transfer of F.M Road funds to State Highway Fund
Up to one per cent on chemical products produced in Texas

Farm Bureau recommends an increase in the State Sales Tax with current exemptions retained as method for raising needed money.

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ORDINANCE NUMBER 142

An ordinance providing for the calling and holding an election by vote of the qualified voters of the City of Iowa Park relative to the adoption of a "Zoning Ordinance" of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, for the benefit of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, in accordance with the provisions of Article 4.05 of the Election Code of the Civil Statutes of the State of Texas.

Whereas, The Planning Consultants in the preparation and delivery of the Comprehensive Plan for the City of Iowa Park have been fully aware of conditions within the City and have projected needs and recommendations for some twenty (20) to thirty (30) years for correcting of undesirable conditions and abusive land uses and control, and,

Whereas, It is deemed advisable for the present and future benefit of the City of Iowa Park to enact a "Zoning Ordinance," the same being a land use ordinance for the purpose of promoting the health, safety, morals, and general welfare of the community; lessening congestion in the streets, securing safety from fire, panic and other dangers; providing adequate light and air; preventing the over-crowding of land; avoiding undue concentration of population; facilitating the adequate provision of transportation, water, sewerage, schools, parks and other public requirements; conserving the value of buildings and encouraging the most appropriate use of land throughout the community; and promoting the development of the community in accordance with a comprehensive plan.

Now, therefore, be it ordained, by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, that an election shall be called and held on the 13th day of September, A.D. 1969, at Ethyle Kidwell Elementary School, 1200 North Third Street, and W. R. ORDINANCE NUMBER 143

An ordinance providing for the calling and holding of an election by vote of the qualified voters of the City of Iowa Park relative to the adoption of a locally administered "Neighborhood Renewal Agency" for the benefit of the City, particularly to renew and restore and otherwise control deterioration in the City of Iowa Park, Texas, in accordance with the provisions of Article 4.05 of the Election Code of the State of Texas as heretofore and hereafter amended.

Whereas, there is available to the residents and citizens of this City, Federal funds to which our residents and citizens have contributed for just such use, and,

Whereas, the residents and citizens of this City are as much entitled to the use of these funds as any other of the many cities of the United States who have made and who are making progressive use of such funds, and,

Whereas, there is included in the Comprehensive Plan prepared for this City by the consultants who have recently delivered the same to our City, plans encouraging the application for and use of such funds for the purpose of renewing the business houses and homes of the City, and,

Whereas, it is the belief of the City Council that the need for such funds is urgent and beneficial to the City, we do hereby certify to you that in order for such funds to be available for renewal to our community, there must be passed an ordinance authorizing an agency under the direction of the City Council to perform the duties of City Government in this respect.

Now, therefore, be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, that an election shall be called on the 13th day of September, A.D. 1969, at Ethyle Kidwell Elementary School, 1200 North Third Street, and W. R. Bradford Elementary School, 300 South Texowa Street, in the City of Iowa Park, Wichita County, Texas, for the submission of the question: "Do the qualified

voters of said City, voting at an election held in regard to the adoption of a local 'Neighborhood Renewal Agency' for the benefit of such City in accordance with the provisions of Article 4.05 of the Election Code of the State of Texas, and as heretofore and hereafter amended, wish to adopt a locally administered Neighborhood Renewal Agency?" Notice of such election shall be given by causing a substantial copy of the ordinance calling for the election to be published on the same day of the two successive weeks in the Iowa Park Herald, and the date of the first publication to be given at least 21 days prior to the date set for such election.

The ballot at such election to have printed on it the following:

FOR the adoption of an ordinance creating a locally administered 'Neighborhood Renewal Agency' within the City.

AGAINST the adoption of an ordinance creating a locally administered 'Neighborhood Renewal Agency' within the city."

The election shall be conducted in the manner provided by law for other municipal elections, and if a majority of the votes cast in such election be in favor of the adoption of a "Neighborhood Renewal Agency," the same shall be effected in the City of Iowa Park, Texas, immediately.

Mobile Homes and Parks

Stripped of much legal verbiage, we are publishing for benefit of Iowa Park folk the following outline of Ordinance No. 137, which is now the law here:

The ordinance regulates maintenance of Mobile Home Parks and provides for permits and licenses and defines requirements for location of mobile homes. It also sets for penalties for violations.

I. Definition:

A. House trailer, mobile home or trailer means any vehicle or structure designed to permit occupancy as sleeping and living quarters for one or more persons, or the conduct of any business or profession, so designed that it is or may be mounted on wheels and used as a conveyance on highways or city streets, propelled or drawn by its own or other power, excepting a device used exclusively upon stationary rails or tracks.

Such structure shall be considered as a prefabricated building when its wheels are removed and when mounted upon permanent foundation, and as such will be required to conform to all requirements of building, electrical and plumbing codes and all other applicable codes and ordinances of the city.

B. Dependent Mobile Home shall mean a mobile home which does not have a flush toilet and bath or shower.

C. Trailer Park means any site or tract of land maintained for purpose of supplying a location for house trailers and shall include all buildings used as part of the equipment, whether charge is made for use of trailer park or not. Trailer park shall not include sales lots on which unoccupied trailers are parked for purposes of inspection and sale.

D. Trailer Space means a section of ground in trailer park of not less than 3200 square feet of unoccupied space in an area designated at location for only one automobile and one trailer, or one trailer.

E. Owner means individual, group partnership or corporation legally responsible for or owning a Trailer Park.

F. Recreational Vehicle shall mean a travel trailer, motor home or pickup camper less than 9 feet in width used principally for recreational purposes, with wheels and used as a conveyance on highways or city streets, and propelled by its own or other power, not to be a permanent residence.

II. Permit and License:

A. In Iowa Park and within its planning extraterritorial jurisdiction boundaries, any owner desiring to construct a trailer or mobile home park will be required to obtain a permit, except no parks shall be allowed in the No. One fire zone. There will be an annual permit fee required. Initially a \$100 permit fee will be charged, thereafter \$50 per year payable on or before Jan. 1. Fee for transfer of such permit shall be \$25. Upon application by said persons, a complete plat by Licensed Engineer shall be submitted to City Planning Commission, showing location, space size (minimum 3200 sq. ft.), number of locations (minimum of 10), water, sewer and other utility connections on each space. Parks on arterial streets must have internal streets with entrance-exit to the arterial street.

B. Request for permission to construct mobile home parks will be administered in manner similar to land subdivision request. Plans and specifications will be reviewed by City Planning Commission and at least one public hearing held. Final plans shall be submitted. City Secretary, at the direction of City Council shall issue a permit good for one year and renewable from year to year.

III. Duties of park owner or manager and maintenance of the Park:

A. Keep register of all mobile home owners and occupants located within the park.

B. Maintain park in clear, orderly and sanitary condition.

C. See that provisions of this chapter are complied with and report to proper authorities any violation.

D. Report to City Health Officer all cases of persons or animals suspected of being infected with any communicable disease.

E. Prevent the running loose of dogs, cats or other animals or pets.

F. Maintain in convenient places approved by fire department, hand fire extinguishers in ratio of not less than one to each four trailer spaces.

G. Prohibit the lighting of open fires on the premises.

H. Prohibit use of any trailer by a greater number of occupants than that which it is designed to accommodate.

I. Each Mobile Home Park owner, on Jan. 1 shall report to the proper taxing agency the trailers in said park. He will collect from each mobile home owner a sum of money equal to taxes due for taxable year and place it in an escrow account with taxing bodies.

IV. Trailers Outside Trailer Parks:

A. It shall be unlawful for any person to park any trailer on any street, alley or highway or other public place or any tract of land owned by any person, occupied or unoccupied, within the city, unless such mobile home shall be placed on piles, blocks or on concrete slab, with wheels removed and have a separate water, sewer, and other utility connections. Furthermore such trailers must with the approval of the City Planning Commission, conform to or blend with, the surrounding dwellings.

B. Emergency or temporary stopping or parking is permitted on any street, alley or highway for not longer than five hours.

C. No person shall park or occupy any trailer on the premises of any dwelling or on any lot which is a part of the premises of any dwelling either of which is situated outside an approved trailer park, except no more than one camping or travel trailer or hauling trailer per family living on the premises shall be permitted, and said trailer shall not exceed 24 feet in length or 9 feet in width; and further provided that said trailer shall not be parked or stored more than 48 hours unless it is located behind the front yard building line.

A camping or travel trailer shall not be occupied either temporarily or permanently within the city limits except in a Mobile Home Park.

D. An individual site for a mobile home will be considered a city lot of 50x142 feet or 50x90 feet, depending upon location. Such individual mobile home owners will be required to obtain a permit from City Secretary, same basis as building permit.

E. Liquefied petroleum gas will be prohibited.

V. Additional Construction:

It shall be unlawful to have any additional structure attached to a mobile home or travel trailer except awnings and portable prefabricated temporary rooms for the express purpose of increasing living area, commonly called "cabanas," which meet the following requirements:

Of metal only, fire resistive, double wall, mechanical joint panels.

2. Strength of materials and structure to meet minimum standards of City Building Code.

3. Capable of being dismantled when moved.

4. Such rooms shall be removed from site at time mobile home is moved.

5. Finish and appearance to be as near the same as possible to mobile home or travel trailer.

6. Length must not exceed that of mobile home or travel trailer.

7. Only one such room per mobile home or travel trailer shall be permitted.

VI. Nonconforming Trailers and Trailer Parks:

A. Any house trailer parked, used, or occupied outside a trailer

park on June 23, 1969, shall be considered a nonconforming trailer. Such trailer shall not be eligible for the issuance of any permit for work thereon under the building, plumbing or electrical codes of the city and no work on such trailers requiring such a permit shall be performed.

X. Penalties:

Mobile home parks and trailers that would be considered nonconforming by the City Planning Commission will be given written notice to conform to the ordinance or be subject to fine of \$10 to \$200. Each day will be a separate offense.

The full text of Ordinance No. 137 should be consulted by anyone planning to go into the Home Trailer Park business or by anyone planning to locate his own Mobile Home or Travel Trailer within the jurisdiction of Iowa Park City Council.
