G. B. Gauntt put up the building in 1917 or 1918, according to Mrs. Emma Gauntt. Her late husband W. H. Gauntt was partner with his father in the filling station and repair shop for which the building was erected.

G. B. Gauntt died in 1922 and the place became rental property, at one time being a car agency.

In 1936, W. C. Brown bought the property and operated a shop until his death several years ago. For quite some time Doyle Koonce used the location for his lawn mower repair and service business and his sign painting.

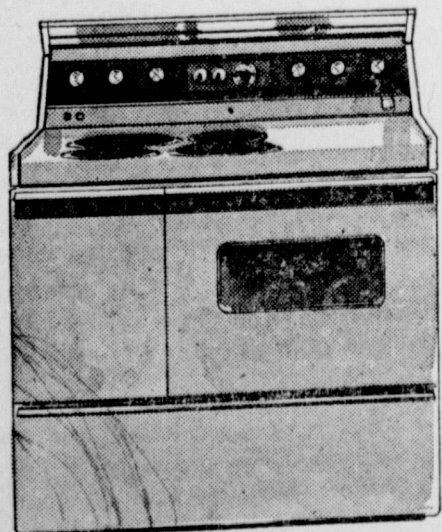
