School Board Adopts Rules on Hair Styles and Clothing

Iowa Park school trustees have set up rules and regulations for grooming of students and intend that they be observed by all.

Their statement follows:

GROOMING

There is a strong relationship between how one is dressed and how one acts. Good grooming and proper dress are encouraged at Iowa Park public schools. In this day, many institutions of education have lost prestige and respect of those who once held them in high esteem. It is intended that reasonable line of regulation is held at Iowa Park public schools.

Iowa Park high school is a responsible educational institution, and for the good of all concerned, some definite guidelines are necessary for students to follow concerning grooming and proper dress. The following policy is for all students at Iowa Park high school:

HAIR

Hair must be well above the eyebrows if combed forward.

Hair must not be long enough that it overhangs the ears.

Hair must be trimmed to look neat in the back and on the sides. The hair in the back should not extend into or over the shirt collar.

Sideburns must not be lower than the bottom of the ear.

Boys will be clean-shaven; no beards are permitted.

Any one in violation of this pol-

icy will be suspended and will not be readmitted until they have complied with this policy.

STUDENT DRESS

Student dress is also a matter of good taste. The dress of all students in Iowa Park public school should be in keeping with modesty and decency. Girls are to wear dresses or skirts and blouses to school. No culottes, wrap-around skirts, mini skirts, or extremely low-cut necklines are to be worn.

Boys will wear full length slacks or jeans at all times. Boys will wear shirt tails tucked in, with the exception of sport shirts that are cut straight around the bottom. Shirts must be buttoned up to the top button below the collar. No slogan sweatshirts or T-shirts are permitted. Neck medallions or ornament medals should not be worn by boys. Use your good taste. A school classroom is a formal situation.

Dress regulations apply at any school activity unless otherwise advised.

Violation of the policy concerning dress is grounds for dismissal.

The 5th, 6th, 7th, and 8th grade work will be departmentalized with the following teachers: Mrs. Elma Wilson, science and health; Mrs. Carolyn Kent, mathematics; Mrs. Bob Dawson, language arts; Butch McLemore, coach and P.E.

Buried Here

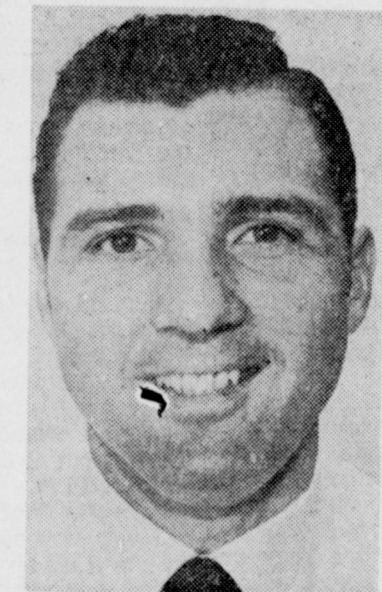

Principal animals to be controlled in this district are coyote and bobcat. Coney pointed out that he works with farmers and ranchers to keep wild animal population in balance so they will not damage the livestock and crops of the area.

Coney gives each patron his choice of methods of kill. He demonstrated for the Lions some of the guns and bombs used in his work. He also displayed signs he uses to warn people of the presence of these devices.

Local football fans will probably be proud to learn that Hawks kill more rabbits than Coyotes kill! He also brought out that gray fox and jack rabbit have recently been added to the list of predatory animals.

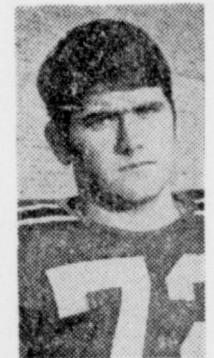
All elementary students who are new to our school district are requested to call the school offices for instruction.

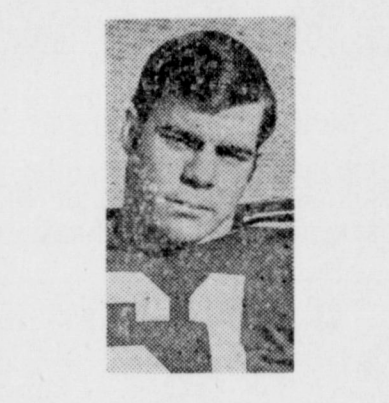

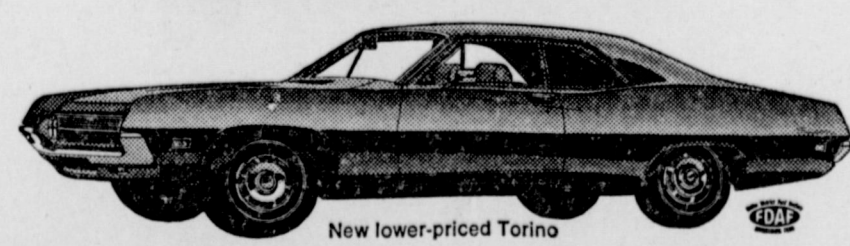

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR15)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 1-d, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 1-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops rather than upon the value of such lands and the crop growing thereon."

Sec. 2. The foregoing con-

stitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the Legislature to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops."

At the regular City Council meeting at the City Hall, Aug. 12, a hearing will be open to the public on the following ordinance:

ORDINANCE 157

An ordinance annexing the hereinafter described territory to the City of Iowa Park, Texas, and extending the boundary limits of said city so as to include said hereinafter described property within said city limits; and granting to all the inhabitants and owners of said property all of the rights and privileges of other citizens and binding all inhabitants by all the Acts, Ordinances and Regulations of said city: Providing a severability clause; and providing for the effective date of said ordinance.

Whereas, the City of Iowa Park, Texas, has heretofore adopted the provisions of Title 28 of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas of 1925, as provided in Article 961 of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas of 1925, and by virtue thereof, among other things, is empowered to annex territory and extend the corporate limits of said city; and

Whereas, the land hereinafter described in Section One (1) of this Ordinance adjoins the present city limits of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, and the members of the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, have concluded that said area, being contiguous to and with the South and East of Park Plaza Subdivision, a subdivision of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, and being within the extra-territorial jurisdiction of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, should be annexed and made a part of the City of Iowa Park, Texas;

Now, therefore, be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas:

Section 1. That the following described territory be and the same is hereby annexed to the City of Iowa Park, Texas, and the boundary limits of the City of Iowa Park be, and the same are hereby extended to include the following described territory within the City limits of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, and the same shall hereafter be included within the territorial limits of said City, and the inhabitants thereof shall hereafter be entitled to all rights and privileges of other citizens of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, and shall be bound by the acts,

ordinances, resolutions and regulations of said City; that the territory to be so annexed is more particularly described as follows, to-wit:

Beginning in the East Boundary Line of a 60 foot Draining Ditch being the East Boundary line of Park Plaza Subdivision at a point bearing South 45 degrees 21 Minutes West 111.45 feet from a point in South right-of-way line of U.S. Highway No. 287; Thence South a distance of approximately 759 feet, more or less, to a point; Thence West a distance of 150 feet, more or less, to a point being the Southeast corner of Park Plaza Subdivision; said point being in East line of above mentioned Draining Ditch; Thence in a North easterly and Easterly direction following the East line of said Draining Ditch, a distance of approximately 890.14 feet, more or less, to the place of beginning, and containing 2.12 acres of land, more or less.

Section 2. That it is not the intention of the City of Iowa Park to annex any territory not legally subject to being annexed by said City, and should any portion of the above described territory not be subject to legal annexation by the City of Iowa Park, Texas, such fact will not prevent the City from annexing such territory which is above described and is subject to legal annexation by the City, and it is the intention of the City of Iowa Park to annex only such territory as may be legally annexed by it within the limits of the above described area.

Section 3. That this ordinance shall be effective as of the date of its adoption.

Passed by the City Council on First Reading on the 10th day of August, A.D. 1970.

Workshops offered during the week included such subjects as

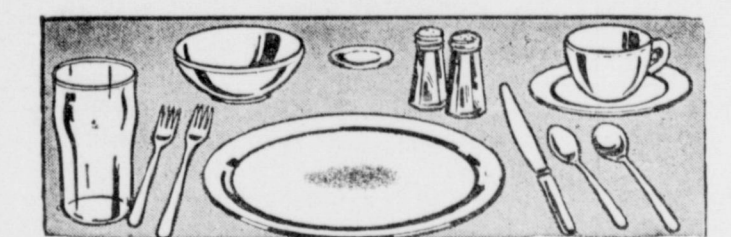

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR 16)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 64, Article III, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 64. (a) The Legislature may by special statute provide for consolidation of governmental offices and functions of government of any one or more political subdivisions comprising or located within any county. Any such statute shall require an election to be held within the political subdivisions affected thereby with approval by a majority of the voters in each of these subdivisions, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may require." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for consolidating governmental offices and functions and allowing political subdivisions to contract for performance of governmental functions in any county."
