Dr. Richard Carver, vice-president, presided during the July meeting of Chamber of Commerce directors Tuesday night.
Reporting on Industrial Development Corporation, he said the brochures costing \$2200 have been received and are being distributed.
It was voted to recommend to IDC that signs be erected on the Expressway east and west of Iowa Park for promotion of the city.
L. W. Teel jr., chairman of commercial activities, recommended that the Chamber sponsor a trip to Six Flags for a family of four, and the group voted to accept his recommendation. Certificates will be given at local businesses for drawing the last of August. Other members of the committee are Donald Schram, A. K. Settle, Harrel Sullivan.

A comprehensive long-term plan is available at City Hall. It may be borrowed to be returned in two weeks. This plan will come up for referendum Sept. 13.

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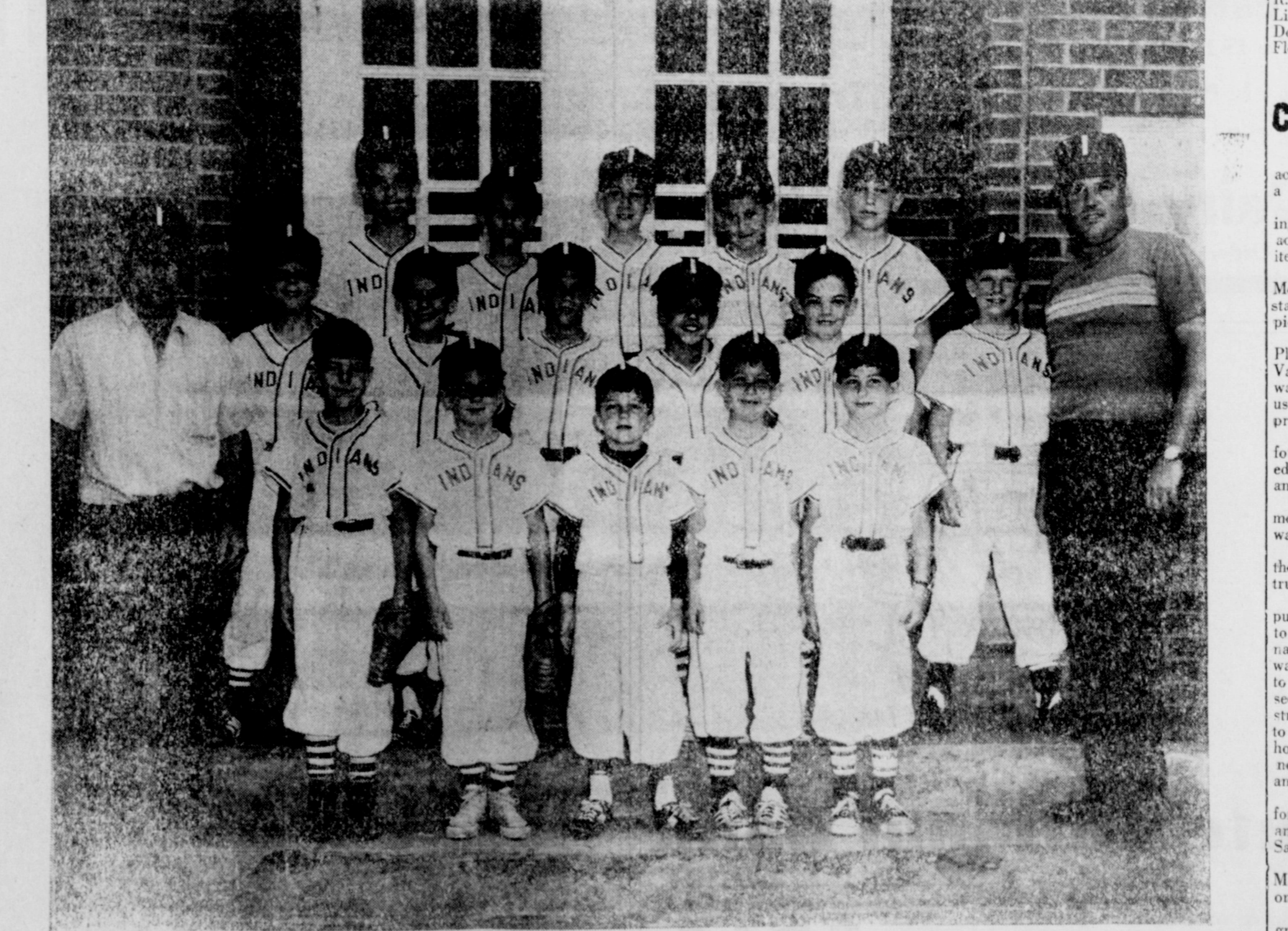
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City Council

With Mayor E. F. Soell presiding, the group considered or took action on a large number of items.
Permission was granted Jim McClenon to put a Liquid Feed station on the site formerly occupied by Williams Lumber Yard.
A mobile home play in Western Plateau addition was approved. Variance from the plumbing code was granted to all the owner to use Class 200 PVC pipe on his property.
Council members voted to buy four quick chargers to be mounted permanently on fire trucks; and lights for the new police car.
Mutual aid fire fighting agreement between cities in the district was approved.
Shaw Motor Co. was awarded the bid for a street department truck.
It was voted to purchase a new pump for the city water plant; to amend the Mobile Home ordinance; to replace a section of water line on East Aldine street; to install YIELD signs at intersection of Jefferson and Jackson streets; to permit W. M. Owens to build curb and gutter at his home 710 North Jackson; to renew Workmen's Compensation and General Liability insurance.
A motion was passed calling for an election on Urban Renewal and Zoning Ordinance the second Saturday in September.
L. W. Teel was appointed by Mayor Soell to replace Jerry Lane on the planning commission.
Problems at the City dump ground were discussed.

With theme "Help the Handicapped—Hit a Hole in One" the Wichita Falls Junior Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring an all-day miniature golf tournament to benefit North Texas Rehabilitation Center.

All proceeds from the event will go to building fund of Center which is planning to add to the facility at 516 Denver.

Tournament will be held from 8:00 to midnight Saturday, July 19, at Put-Put Golf Course at 3806 Kemp. The course, operated by Jerry McDonald and managed by Charles Harmon, is being furnished free of cost for the tournament, and all proceeds of the day will go to the building fund.

Ed McCluskey, Jaycee president, said tournament play will be divided into brackets, including a children's division, teenage division, men's division, women's division.

Trophies will be awarded and there will be prizes—all donated

for low scores and for those making holes-in-one.

There will be no entry fee for the tournament and participants will be able to buy a ticket for a round of play at a special low rate.

Mrs. Marion Jones's Recipe Published in 'Air Force Times'

Recipe for "rinderrouladen"—beef roll ups—which appeared in the Family Section of July Air Force Times was submitted by Mrs. Marion D. Jones, the former Christina Lerche of Brunschw, Germany. The prize winning recipe she received a cook book "Joy of Cooking."

Mrs. Jones was working in the finance office of Rhein-Main AFB in Frankfurt, Germany, when she met Marion, a native of Texarkana, who was serving in the air force. They were married in Texas and began life together at Perrin AFB. They are back in Texas for the second time.

She loves Texas and America but has nostalgia for her native country, where her parents, two sisters and grandfather live. She is presently employed at Iowa Park City Hall.

S-Sgt. Jones also loves Germany and is fond of German food. Christina says she didn't know much about cooking when she married, but because her husband likes German food she has learned some specialties.

- Her prize winning recipe:
- 4 or 5 slices bacon
 - 2 lb. sirloin tip roast
 - 4 or 5 teaspoons prepared mustard
 - Salt and pepper to taste
 - 1 small onion
 - 2 tablespoons cooking oil
 - Approximately 1 cup water
 - 2 beef bouillon cubes
 - 1 tablespoon flour
 - Paprika
 - 2 tablespoons sour cream

Method . . .

Cook bacon until crisp. Drain, crumble and set aside.

Cut roast into 4 or 5 half-inch thick slices. Pound meat thin with wooden mallet or edge of saucer. Spread each meat slice with teaspoon prepared mustard.

Now sprinkle each with salt and pepper to taste, crumbled bacon and finely chopped onion.

Roll up each meat slice and tie with twine.

Heat oil in pan; add beef roll-ups and turn to brown evenly on all sides. Add about 1/2 cup hot water. Cover pan and simmer for two hours or until tender, replacing water as it boils away. When meat is tender, remove from pan—saving liquid—and cut and discard string.

To make sauce, pour liquid in pan through a strainer, then bring to boil. Add two bouillon cubes to strained mixture. Mix flour with 3 tablespoons water in small bowl and add to boiling liquid.

Reduce heat to low and simmer for one minute. Remove heat, add a dash of paprika and sour cream—stir well and pour over beef.

Yield: 4 servings.

Housing Ordinance

ORDINANCE NO. 141

An ordinance establishing minimum standards governing the use, occupancy and maintenance of dwellings, dwelling units and accessory structures: establishing minimum standards governing supplied utilities and facilities, and other physical things and conditions essential to make dwellings safe, sanitary, and fit for human habitation: Establishing minimum standards governing the condition and maintenance of dwellings and accessory structures: Fixing certain responsibilities and duties of owners and occupants of dwellings: Creating a Housing Board of adjustments and appeals and fixing the duties and responsibilities thereof: Authorizing the inspection of dwellings and accessory structures and providing for the condemnation of all buildings and structures deemed unfit for human habitation and use: and Fixing penalties for violations.

Whereas, within the area of jurisdiction of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, there are or may

be dwellings, dwelling units and accessory structures which are unfit for human habitation and use due to inadequate maintenance, obsolescence or abandonment; containing defects which increase the hazards of fire, accident, or other calamities, and which by reason of the lack of maintenance, inadequate ventilation, light and sanitary facilities or other conditions render such dwellings and accessory structures unsafe, unsanitary and dangerous or detrimental to the health, safety, morals, and general welfare of the community; and,

Whereas, experience and accepted national housing surveys have clearly demonstrated that such conditions result in a large number, inadequate sanitary facilities, overcrowded conditions in residential occupancies, buildings and premises and from general neighborhood neglect; and,

Whereas, it has now become common knowledge that these conditions can be relieved, in a measure prevented and often

eliminated through planned and properly enforced minimum housing standards, resulting thereby in the upgrading of living conditions and an overall enhancement of the general health, safety and welfare of all residents and property owners of the community; and,

Whereas, the Southern Building Code Congress, a non-profit association, has developed and made available a set of minimum housing standards which have been recognized as being acceptable as a model housing code; and,

Whereas, it is provided by statutes that such model code may be adopted by reference;

Now, therefore be it enacted, that,

Section 1. The Southern Standard Housing Code, being particularly the 1969 edition thereof and the whole thereof, as heretofore amended, reference to which is here made for all purposes, and save and except such portions as may hereinafter be amended, of which not less than three (3) copies have been and are now filed in the office of the City Secretary of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, and the same are hereby adopted and incorporated as fully as if set forth at length herein, and from the date on which this ordinance shall take effect, the provisions therein shall be controlling in the use, maintenance and occupancy of all dwellings, dwelling units and/or structures within the area of jurisdiction of the City of Iowa Park, Texas.

Section 2. Nothing in this ordinance or in the code hereby adopted shall be construed to affect any suit or proceeding now pending in any court, or any rights acquired or liability incurred, nor any cause or causes of action accrued or existing, under any act or ordinance repealed hereby. Nor shall any right or remedy of any character be lost, impaired or affected by this ordinance.

Section 3. The invalidity of any section or provision of this ordinance or of the code hereby adopted shall not invalidate other sections or provisions thereof.

Section 4. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in force at the time that this ordinance shall take effect and inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 5. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon passage, the welfare of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, requiring it.

Introduced and passed to the first reading July 14, 1969.

WYNNE CHESTER SAYS:

Going Big Game Hunting? Start Planning Now

The above may seem rather surprising advice at this time of year. But if you intend to hunt big game this fall . . . grizzly, moose, sheep, goat, elk, caribou or antelope . . . it makes sense. Why? Because the hunting rules, regulations and seasons of the various states and Canadian provinces are so varied and complicated that you might well miss your chance by waiting too long to check on them.

In Nevada, for instance, only residents may hunt antelope. In Idaho residents and non-residents must apply for antelope permits by mid-July.

In Alaska, caribou season lasts from August 10th through March 31st. In Saskatchewan it's from November 4th to 30th.

In Alaska, a non-resident hunting license costs \$10. In Alberta it's \$150. In Montana, it's \$150 plus a \$25 permit to hunt grizzly.

If you take a sheep in Montana, you must wait 7 years before applying for another permit, while Arizona will let you take only one in a lifetime.

In certain places, you can't hunt on Sundays. Some places allow you to hunt only male animals, while others allow both sexes. Some . . .

Well, enough said. I'm sure you get the point. Contact the correct authorities in the area you want to hunt now!

Safety Stressed by Farm Bureau

County Judge Calvin Ashley has proclaimed July 20-26 as Farm Safety Week in Wichita County at request of Raymond Schroeder, county Farm Bureau president. The organization is coordinating activities for the special farm safety campaign.

Schroeder said the accidental death rate for farm residents is steadily increasing. "If this trend is to be reversed each of us must have renewed effort."

He emphasized that farming is one of the most hazardous occupations; but added, many present losses could be prevented with use of safety tools such as seat belts, fire extinguishers, SMV emblems, and tractor roll-guards and crush resistant cabs.

Ashley urged farm families "to become more safety conscious, not only during Farm Safety Week, but every day of the year."
