Vernon Stewart Asks Re-election

To the Citizens of Iowa Park: Once again the time approaches when the people of Wichita county must decide which candidates are best qualified to fill the various elective offices.

I am a candidate for re-election as your State Representative, in Place 1. I know of no better way to ask for your support than to place my record before you in order that you may determine for yourself whether or not I have the kind of record that you expect of the person whom you send to represent you in our legislative halls in Austin.

Here is my record: Co-sponsored the bill making Midwestern university a State school. We passed this bill out the House of Representatives, but it failed to pass in the Senate. I will continue the fight to pass this bill into law. It will mean lower tuition for our children as well as expanded educational facilities.

Sponsored and guided through the Legislature a bill establishing the Wichita county probation department. As a result, there has been a 25 per cent reduction in juvenile delinquency cases for the first six months of 1958 as compared with the same periods in 1956 and 1957. Child support collection before the Department was established averaged \$16,000 per month; now it is \$27,000. This department is hailed as a major means of fighting the rise in juvenile delinquency in Wichita county.

Supported all teachers' salary raises.

Supported increased pensions for our senior citizens.

Supported all major insurance reforms.

Sponsored a bill which requires those persons requesting a retail beer permit to give notice by publication in the newspaper.

Until this bill was passed, it was possible for you to wake up some morning and find a tavern opened up next door or across the street without your knowing in advance so that you could have a chance to protest against it.

I sincerely hope that this record meets with the approval of my many friends in Iowa Park. I am sorry space will not permit the listing of other important bills and my votes on them; however, I hope you will feel free to ask me about them during my visits to Iowa Park.

Promoted

Brig. Gen. Daniel Edwin Hooks, a native of Iowa Park, assumed command of the Air Force Missile Development center, Holloman AFB, N.M., recently at official ceremonies.

Hooks was born in Iowa Park Dec. 11, 1908, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Dan Hooks, a pioneer couple of the area. He was graduated from IPHS in 1925.

He received the BS degree in physics from Texas Christian university in 1929 and the MS in physics from Harvard university in 1932.

Appointed a flying cadet in July 1932, Hooks entered flight training at Randolph Field. The next June he was commissioned a second lieutenant at Kelly Field.

He became a flying instructor at Randolph Field in 1935 and four years later became supervisor of primary flying schools at Dallas, Ft. Worth and Bonham.

In Jan. 1942, Hooks was a staff officer in the Air Corps headquarters in Washington, D.C. From June of that year until Feb. 1944 he was at Kelly Field as assistant chief of the sub-depot section of an Antonio Air Depot.

Assuming command of the 55th Air Depot Group there in 1944, he subsequently took it to Wheeler Field, Hawaii. He went to Guam in January 1945 and was chief of personnel and services.

From March 1946 to June 1947, Hooks took post-graduate work in nuclear physics at Ohio State university. He was then assigned to Kirtland AFB at Albuquerque, N. M. In June 1948 he became chief of research and development, Field Office No. 4, Atomic Energy Commission.

Then he went to the air war college at Maxwell AFB, Ala., in Aug. 1949. After completion of this course he was made deputy chief of staff for research and development of the Air Force Special Weapons command at Kirtland.

He became chief of staff in 1951 and vice-commander in 1953.

In 1954 he returned to Washington to assume command of the 1009th Special Weapons Squadron.

Hooks is holder of the Bronze Star with one oak leaf cluster, and the Air Medal. He is rated as a command pilot.

NOKES CONFIDENT

George Nokes this week predicted he will win a big majority over the incumbent lieutenant-governor who is now seeking a 5th term. Nokes said: "The people of Texas agree with me that it is time for a change, and are not going to elect a man for a 5th term as lieutenant governor."

Nokes, a Waco attorney, came out strongly against secret sessions in the state senate.

Funeral services were conducted for Mrs. Emily Houser, 55, of Burk Burnett and former resident here, Tuesday, July 22, in the First Baptist church of Burk Burnett. The rites were conducted by Rev. Leroy Meyer, pastor. Burial was in the Burk Burnett cemetery.

Mrs. Houser was killed Sunday afternoon in a head on automobile collision east of Cache, Okla. Her husband Arthur was seriously injured and taken to a Lawton hospital. He has had surgery and is reported improving.

Mrs. Houser was born May 3, 1903 in Bluffton, Ind., daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Charles Schock, also former Iowa Park residents. The Housers moved from Iowa Park several years ago and have resided near or in Burk Burnett since that time.

Survivors are the widow; a daughter Mrs. Kathryn Johnson of Dalhart; four grandchildren; an aunt Mrs. John F. Quick and a cousin Louis Quick, both of Iowa Park.

Several friends from Iowa Park attended the funeral services.

Reflections from the Bible

"Then Agrippa said unto Paul, almost thou persuadest me to be a Christian." Acts 26:28.

Religiously speaking, what are you? When someone questions you as to your religious belief, or your religious affiliation, what is your reply? Whatever your reply may be, it certainly indicates what you have been taught, because you are the result of that which you have received in doctrine.

Agrippa told Paul that he was almost persuaded to be a Christian, not some kind of a Christian; just a Christian. Neither was he almost persuaded to be some kind of a denominationalist such as is so very prevalent today. He was almost persuaded to be a Christian because that was the teaching he had heard. The gospel then and the gospel now, produces Christians and nothing else but Christians.

If a man becomes a Catholic, it is evident that he has been taught a Catholic doctrine. If he becomes a Baptist it is evident that he has been taught Baptist doctrine. If he becomes a Christian without handle or title of any kind it is because he has been taught the kind of doctrine that makes Christians without handle or title of any kind. God decreed in the beginning that everything "Produce after its own kind." This law will be true until the end of the world. adv

HOW TO LIVE IN A DANGEROUS WORLD

Our world is a fearful world. People are filled with fear and foreboding. Often it seems that nuclear warfare is very imminent. Many times I am asked what should be our attitude at a time such as this.

My answer is this: We are not to hide within ourselves. Neither are we to turn from the actual conditions of the world or from God himself.

When world conditions become serious, many people revert to childhood. When you and I were little and had to face unpleasant things, we immediately would run to our mother or father. We felt if we could withdraw ourselves from the older children who were trying to oppress us, or from conditions too great for us to comprehend, that it would all smooth out.

Sometimes we still do that. We withdraw into shells. We build a wall about ourselves and shut out the forces that should touch our lives.

An old fable says: When Adam was expelled from Eden he sat down under a tree and slept. While he slept the four spirits of Earth, of Water, of Air and of Fire, stole man's soul and made off with it.

Then the problem arose: How could they hide man's soul so that he could never find it?

Earth's spirit said, "I will hide it in my depths"; the spirit of the Waters said, "I will sink it in the deepest waters of the sea"; the spirit of the Air suggested, "Let me hide man's soul beyond the farthest star."

But the Fire's spirit said, "None of that will work. Man can dig into the earth. He can invent a ship to sail be-

neath the sea, and he will some day learn to fly through the air. So none of you can hide man's soul permanently. Let me have it, and I will burn and consume it in my flames."

To this the others agreed: They put man's soul into the flames, but after a little while the soul emerged again, unscarred and intact.

In despair the four spirits went to Satan and told him their problem.

"Fools! I will tell you where to hide man's soul so that he will never find it. Hide man's soul in himself!"

How cunning the devil is. He would get us to shut ourselves off from other people and from God, and hide everything within ourselves. But no person lives to himself or dies to himself. There is no single island or nation that is sufficient within itself. We all need God. When we have God, everything just has to come out right.

We must not shut out the Holy Spirit; we must not shut out prayer and faith in God; we must not shut out our Holy Bible; we must not be shut off from the Church of Jesus Christ. We must become a part of God's great program on earth. We must be witnesses for the Lord Jesus Christ and testify for him.

I believe in a very positive outlook toward life. I believe God is sitting on the clouds. I believe that we are more than conquerors through him that loved us and washed us in his own shed blood. I have a feeling of peace in my heart. I believe that now is a great time to be alive! It's the right time to trust in God completely!

Good Highways Lead To Safety

YOU CAN HELP make highways safe.

The new Federal-Aid highway program, for which Congress has authorized \$7 billion dollars, provides for public hearings in nearly every community where federal-aid roads are to be constructed. It's up to the citizens in these areas to attend the hearings and insist that new roads be constructed as safely as possible.

Here are some safety measures — proven effective in highway construction — that deserve your support.

Wide lanes: Recently when 244 miles of Illinois highways were widened from 9 to 11 feet, accidents decreased 39 percent. **Broad shoulders:** When shoulders are wide and firm, drivers need not fear running off into roadside ditches or obstructions. Safest roads have shoulders eight feet wide or more.

Good sight distance: Because cars travel at increased speeds these days, 475 to 600 feet seeing distance is needed for safety.

Grade separations: Underpasses and overpasses solve intersection accident problems.

Other safety features include easy curves, adequate lighting, proper channeling of traffic, skid resistant surfaces, and uniform signals and markings.

You can have "built-in" safety in your new highways if you speak up in favor of it, and if you support your state officials in their plans for safer roads. It's up to you.

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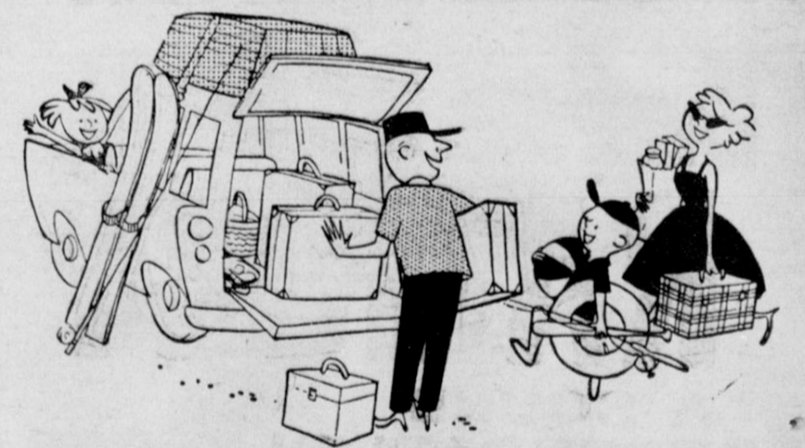
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
