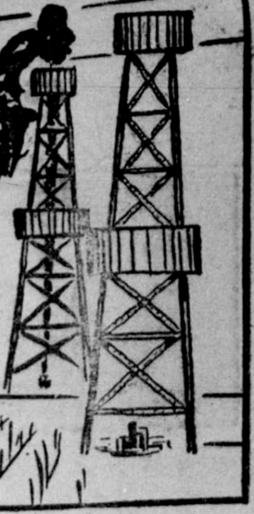

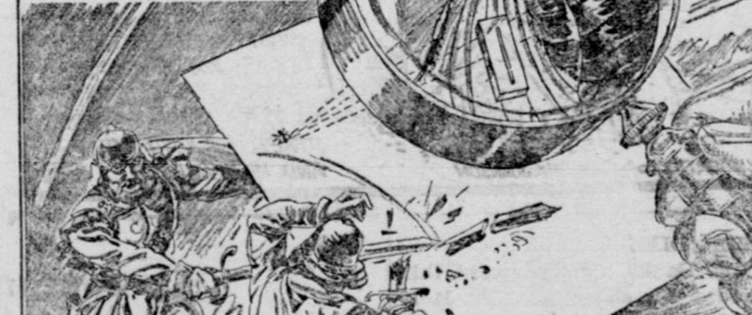

Sound & Fury Subsides

Democrats of Texas had their primary election last Saturday and the results were about what was expected.

The governor was renominated so he could have a second term. The lieutenant governor was assured his fifth term.

John C. White of Wichita Falls had an easy victory for re-election as state agriculture commissioner. Alcorn took Dimmitt in their statewide race. Don't recall off-hand what the job was!

Only statewide run-off was the supreme court job, place 1, which will pit Smith against Hamilton for the nomination. The run-off primary is scheduled for Aug. 23.

And of course Ralph Yarborough was renominated U. S. Senator. In the county races everybody won clean victories except J. B. Walling and Jack Connell jr. These candidates for the state legislature have another three weeks of campaigning.

Big upset of the primary was the defeat of County Judge Guy McNeely by hard working Temple Driver. The younger man campaigned longer and harder, and harvested a heavy vote of about 75 to 50.

Deno Tufares failed in his comeback attempt against Vernon Stewart.

Prof. A. F. Edwards got votes all over the county to snow Edw. Beebe in the county chairman race.

The only purely local competition was between Will Spruiell and Dr. Gordon G. Clark, for chairman of Precinct 82 of the Democratic party. Spruiell took the victory 200 to 140.

In the county commissioner's race, Precinct 4, Cricket Low failed to unseat the veteran Hayne.

In precinct conventions held at each voting place, the loyal Democrats took a commanding lead over their opposition, and named enough delegates to have control of the county convention, which is scheduled for 2:00 p.m. this Saturday in the Wichita Falls high school building.

Soil Conservation District Plans Field Trip to Wildlife Refuge

Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation district plans to make its annual tour of Wichita Mountain Wildlife refuge at Cache, Okla., Wednesday, Aug. 13, Fenton Dale, chairman of the board, has announced.

The district invites all men and women in the area to join this tour beginning at Refuge headquarters, Cache, at 9:00 a.m. This year the supervisors would like to encourage the wives to attend and are inviting co-operators of other Soil Conservation district to share the day's activities with them.

Julian Howard, superintendent of the Refuge, will be official host and will have biologists on hand to lead groups and discuss the wildlife. The district will have the assistance of J. B. Harlan of Henrietta, Frank Duncan of Vernon and Elvy Sargent of Iowa Park, all work-unit conservationists for SCS, to aid in grass identification and range sites and condition.

Large herds of buffalo and longhorn cattle can be seen under native conditions of near a century ago. Deer, elk, antelope and turkey may be seen.

To take full advantage of the day's activities, those making the arrangements suggest you wear field clothes and drive an automobile or pick-up that you don't mind using on unimproved roads. Use of cameras and binoculars will add to your enjoyment of the trip.

Each person will be expected to bring his own lunch and the group will eat under the massive trees of Sunset Pool.

A Youth Day at the Refuge will be conducted August 27, when 4-H and PFA grass judging teams will study grasses.

Reflections from the Bible

There is nothing any lower than a scandal monger. Things work out so that the Scandal Monger puts his own brand upon himself, and then is forced to wear it as long as Eternity. There are certain kinds of beighted souls who are dead sure the scandal they are telling is true. When truth has been vindicated, he alone bears the hurt he sought to inflict upon others.

Friendship should mean more than just pleasant association. If friendship means anything at all we should be willing to defend those of our friends when they are slandered in our presence.

What kind of friendship could it be when a friend is allowed to be slandered? Should not a real friend rise to his defense, and make it unnecessary for him to defend himself? Should not one guilty of such slander be properly silenced and shown the error of his way?

Occasionally I hear someone make some sort of sneering remark about baptism. These remarks often border at least on foul-mouthed blasphemy. I could not be a friend of my Lord if I did not challenge such enemies of his. I could not conscientiously stand by and hear his wisdom questioned, his veracity denied, and his speech slandered.

And the same goes for any other false doctrine. If friends would defend friends from slander, surely the Lord's friends must do the same.

A Personality

Mrs. Beulah Moore, 37, who lives on Star Route, Holiday, and works with the O'Donohoes, has the distinction of being the first Negro to pay a poll tax and vote in Archer county. She voted in the Geraldine voting precinct.

Archer county was founded in 1850 and organized in 1880, receiving its name from Dr. Branch Tanner Archer. The population in 1950 was 6,860.

Mrs. Moore was born and reared in Paris, Tex., where her parents still reside. She was an only child. Her parents are hard working, church going and good citizens in their community. They adored the daughter and taught her early in life to work and appreciate the good things of life. They always paid their poll taxes and voted, feeling it to be a privilege. This too they taught their daughter.

Beulah's uncle and aunt Erath and Mattie Wortham worked many years for the O'Donohoes and she spent many summers on the ranch with them. After working in laundries at Paris and Las Vegas, she was offered the job vacated by the Worthams.

Mrs. Moore started work with the O'Donohoes three years ago. She is happy doing the things she loves, cooking, and you can tell by the cleanliness and neatness of her cottage near the ranch house she enjoys housekeeping. Her hobby is raising pot plants, of which she has many, some quite rare. She loves the O'Donohoe children and transports them to and from school in Archer County daily.

Mrs. Moore is conservative and in 1945 she bought a lot in Paris. This past Mother's Day she moved a house on the lot and little by little she is furnishing it. Every vacation is spent on the yard and improvements on the house.

Mr. and Mrs. Kaspar and the boys report a wonderful trip.

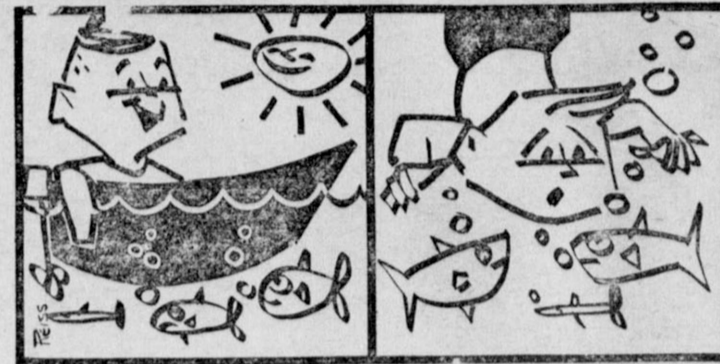

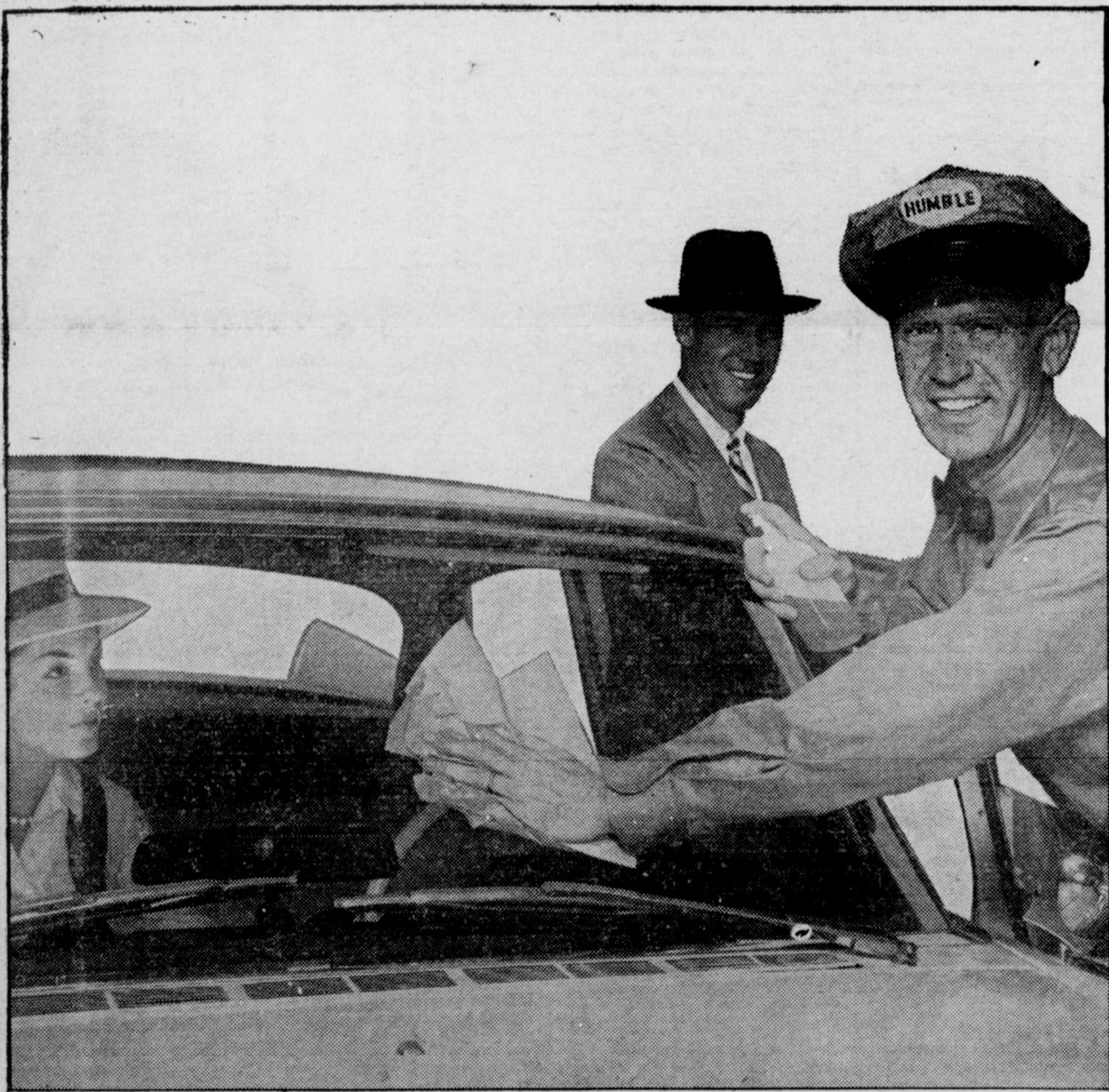

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3 proposing an amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 5, to provide that the Legislature may authorize the creation of a Hospital District coextensive with the incorporated limits of the City of Amarillo, Texas; authorizing the County of Potter to render financial aid to and participate in the operation of such Hospital District; authorizing the Commissioners Court of said county to assess and levy taxes on property outside the incorporated limits of such city; further authorizing a countywide Hospital District for Wichita County, Texas; and authorizing the creation of two districts in Jefferson County, and further providing that any enabling acts shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto another section to be designated as Section 5, which shall read as follows:

"Section 5. (a) The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of two hospital districts, one to be coextensive with and have the same boundaries as the incorporated City of Amarillo, as such boundaries now exist or as they may hereafter be lawfully extended, and the other to be coextensive with Wichita County.

"If such district or districts are created, they may be authorized to levy a tax not to exceed Seventy-five Cents (75¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation of taxable property within the district; provided, however, no tax may be levied until approved by a majority vote of the participating resident qualified property taxpayers who have duly rendered their property for taxation. The maximum rate of tax may be changed at subsequent elections so long as obligations are not impaired, and not to exceed the maximum limit of Seventy-five Cents (75¢) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation, and no election shall be required by subsequent changes in the boundaries of the City of Amarillo.

"If such tax is authorized, no political subdivision or municipality within or having the same boundaries as the district may levy a tax for medical or hospital care for needy individuals, nor shall they maintain or erect hospital facilities, but the district shall by resolution assume all such responsibilities and shall assume all of the liabilities and obligations (including bonds and warrants) of such subdivisions or municipalities or both. The maximum tax rate submitted shall be sufficient to discharge such obligations, liabilities, and responsibilities, and to maintain and operate the hospital system, and the Legislature may authorize the district to issue tax bonds for the purpose of the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of improvements and initially equipping the same, and such bonds shall be payable from said Seventy-five Cents (75¢) tax. The Legislature shall provide for transfer of title to properties to the district.

"(b) The Legislature may by law permit the County of Potter (in which the City of Amarillo is partially located) to render financial aid to that district by paying a part of the expenses of operating and maintaining the system and paying a part of the debts of the district (whether assumed or created by the district) and may authorize the levy of a tax not to exceed Ten Cents (10¢) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation (in addition to other taxes permitted by this Constitution) upon all property within the county but without the City of Amarillo at the time such levy is made for such purposes. If such tax is authorized, the district shall by resolution assume the responsibilities, obligations, and liabilities of the county in the manner and to the extent hereinabove provided for political subdivisions having boundaries coextensive with the district, and the county shall not thereafter levy taxes (other than herein provided) for hospital purposes nor for providing hospital care for needy individuals of the county.

"(c) The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of a hospital district within Jefferson County, the boundaries of which shall include only the area comprising the Jefferson County Drainage District No. 7 and the Potter-Arthur School District, and such boundaries shall extend to the first day of January, 1959, with the power to issue bonds for the purpose of purchasing a site for, and the construction and initial equipping of, a hospital system, with the power to levy a tax not to exceed Seventy-five Cents (75¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation of property therein for the purpose of paying the principal and interest on such bonds.

"The creation of such hospital district shall not be final until approved at an election by a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting at said election who have duly rendered their property for taxation upon the tax rolls of either said Drainage or said School District, nor shall

such bonds be issued or such tax be levied until so approved by such voters.

"The district shall not have the power to levy any tax for maintenance or operation of the hospital or facilities, but shall contract with other political subdivisions of the state or private individuals, associations, or corporations for such purpose.

"If the district hereinabove authorized is finally created, no other hospital district may be created embracing any part of the territory within its boundaries, but the Legislature by law may authorize the creation of a hospital district incorporating therein the remainder of Jefferson County, having the powers and duties and with the limitations presently provided by Article IX, Section 4, of the Constitution of Texas, except that such district shall be confirmed at an election wherein the resident qualified property taxpayers who have duly rendered their property within such proposed district for taxation on the county rolls, shall be authorized to vote. A majority of those participating in the election voting in favor of the district shall be necessary for its confirmation and for bonds to be issued.

"(d) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the general election to be held the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to create a Hospital District coextensive with the incorporated limits of the City of Amarillo, Texas, and authorizing Potter County to lend financial aid to and participate in the operation of said Hospital District, and further authorizing the Legislature to create a countywide Hospital District in Wichita County, Texas, and Hospital Districts in Jefferson County, Texas."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to create a Hospital District coextensive with the incorporated limits of the City of Amarillo, Texas, and authorizing Potter County to lend financial aid to and participate in the operation of said Hospital District, and further authorizing the Legislature to create a countywide Hospital District in Wichita County, Texas, and Hospital Districts in Jefferson County, Texas."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the constitution and laws of this state.

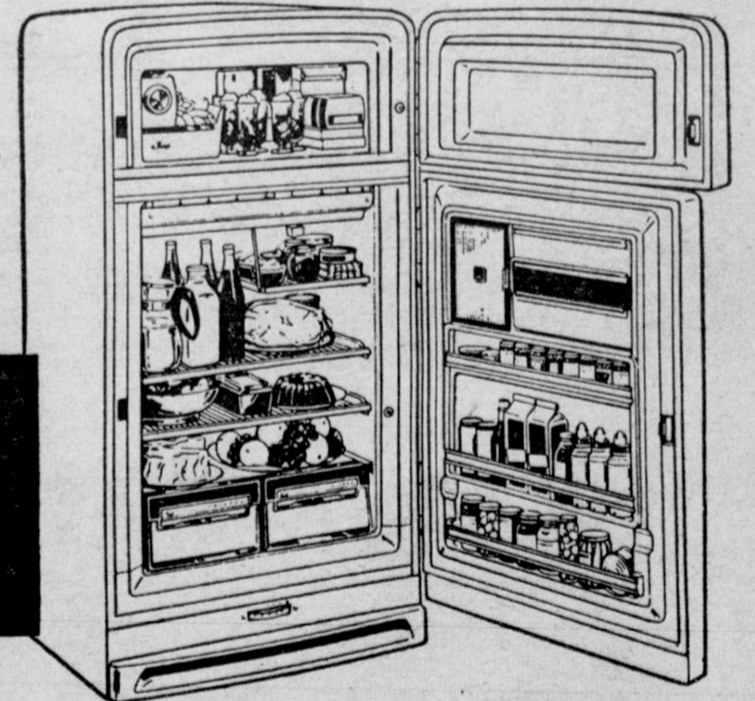

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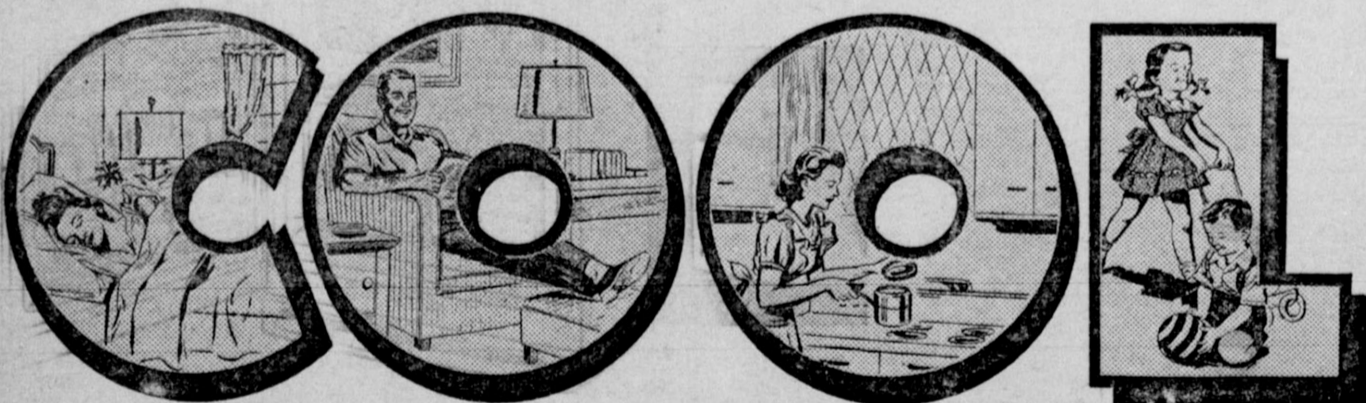

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 36 proposing an amendment to Section 61a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new subsection to be known as (b); giving the Legislature the power to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient for assistance on behalf of persons eligible for Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind and Aid to Dependent Children as provided in Section 61a of the Constitution of the State of Texas; providing for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of such recipients; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the State of Texas for such payments; providing that the payments for such medical care shall be in addition to the payments of such recipients; providing that the amounts paid out of State funds shall never exceed the amounts of Federal funds (i. e. such purposes); providing for the necessary sections, form of ballot, production, and publication.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 48 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that a home rule city may provide by Charter Provision and a general law city operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, both elective and appointive, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby; providing for an election, a form of ballot and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

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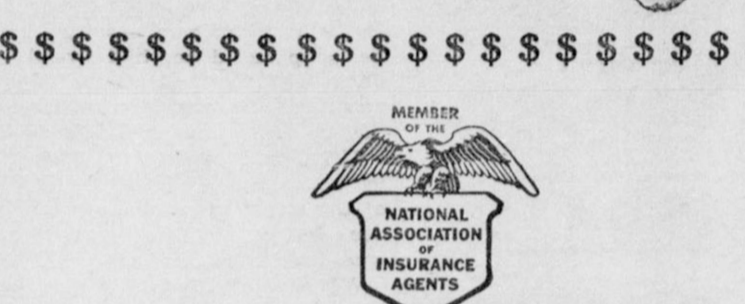
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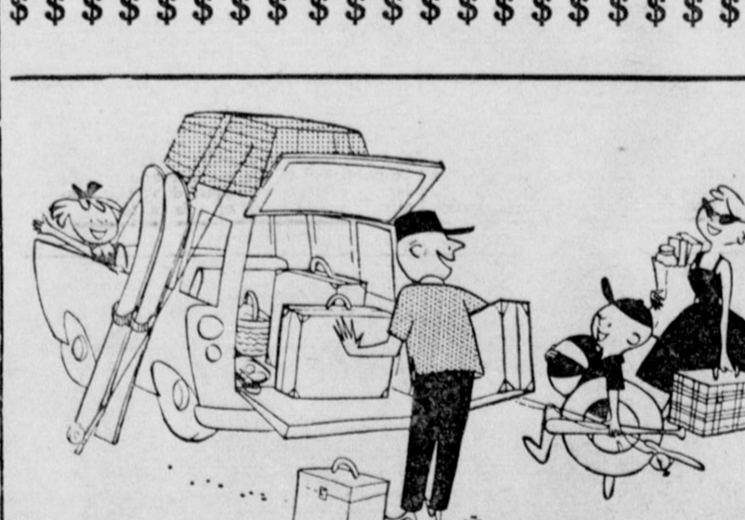
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
