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REASON AND REVELATION

by GLENN OWEN

"What Meanest Thou, O Sleeper?"

"What meanest thou, O sleeper? Arise, and call upon thy God if so be that God will think upon us, that we perish not" (Jonah 1:13). This was the language of a man of the world to a servant of God—a heathen's rebuke to a preacher of righteousness. A violent storm was raging and Jonah was the cause of it. He knew that he was the cause of it, and said to those who questioned him, "I know that for my sake this great tempest is upon you."

Jonah was on the wrong road and knew it. It is bad for one to be ignorantly wrong; it is worse for one to be wrong and know he is wrong. The Lord had sent Jonah to Nineveh, but he was on the way to Tarshish. It was a time of great distress. ~~But~~ ~~Jonah~~ ~~know~~ ~~that~~ ~~the~~ ~~Lord~~ ~~would~~ ~~not~~ ~~hear~~ ~~him~~ ~~if~~ ~~he~~ ~~prayed~~. ~~Why~~ ~~stay~~ ~~awake~~? Why not go to sleep and (forget) it? There are many people now who are in the same kind of boat that ~~Jonah~~ was in. They are in the wrong boat. It is going to the wrong place. They know that they are wrong and yet they try to pacify their conscience with spiritual sleep.

In the days of Israel's distress, Isaiah observed the indifference of God's watchmen and said, "His watchmen are blind; they are all ignorant, they are all dumb dogs, they cannot bark; sleeping, lying down, loving to slumber" (Isa. 56:10). When the world is full of wickedness, it takes courage to face it and oppose it. Instead of being active, some just lie down and go to sleep, waiting for things to get better. But a degenerate world is not improved by sleep. The foolish virgins did not help their cause by sleeping.

Some of us are like Jonah in that we are afraid to face reality. We will not discuss our religion because some may see that we are not really dedicated to what we claim to believe. We are afraid to study the Bible because we might find that we might be wrong. This kind of spiritual sleep will not change the fact that hell is prepared for the disobedient. It will not change that "God is a spirit, and those that worship him, must worship Him in spirit and in truth." Let us not be like Jonah in this respect, but let us be like him in his later decision, to find the thing God desired and give ourselves to the accomplishment of it. ~~Never~~ ~~be~~ ~~afraid~~ ~~to~~ ~~examine~~ ~~the~~ ~~truth~~ ~~of~~ ~~God's~~ ~~word~~. It is the only way that man can know what he must do to be saved. . . .




