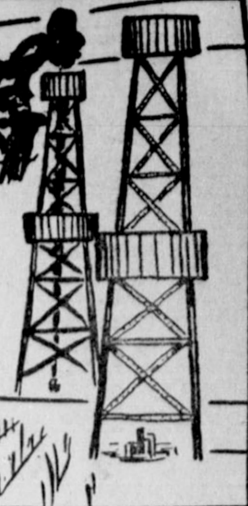

Small Fry Tame 6th Graders

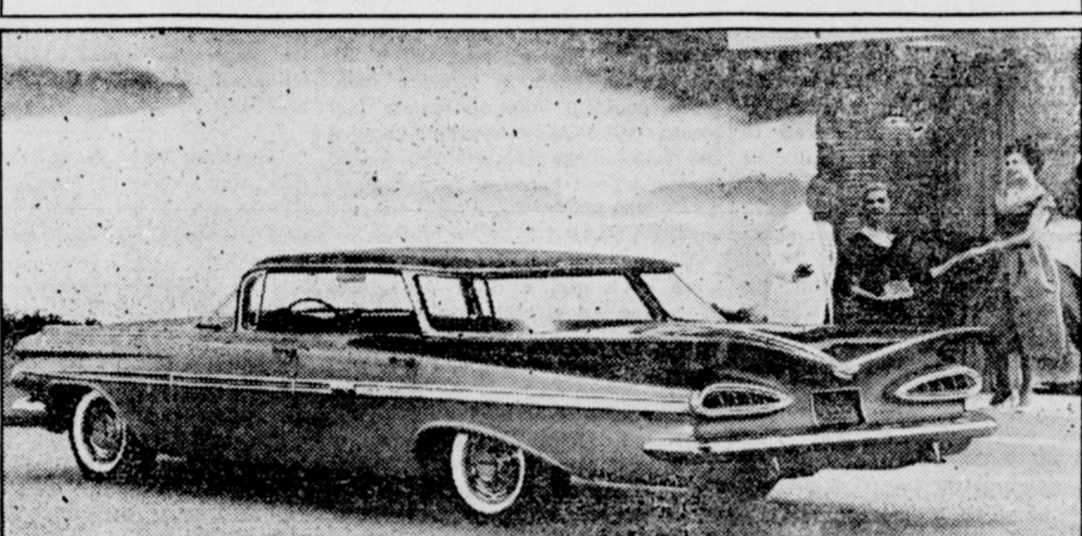

Iowa Park Hawks traveled in style to the Paducah game. They rode in a chartered bus provided through efforts of the Quarterback club.

The Dragons gave quite a scare in the first quarter by driving to the Hawk 10 yard line before losing the ball on a fumble. The Hawks promptly drove the length of the field, mainly on passes from Malcolm Berry to Don Roy Klinkerman, Tony Waters and Herman Beavers. One pass was a TD but was called back.

John Woodall scored on a QB sneak from 3 yards out. The game was hard fought the rest of the way with Paducah getting to the Hawk 11 yard line in the final stanza, but strong defense stalled their drive.

Outstanding on defense were Mack Mills, Roy Boutwell, Jimmy Gard, Lee Holloway, Tony Waters, Jimmy Bank and James Paris. Offensive standouts were Berry, Klinkerman, Fred Boswell, Herman Beavers and Jackie Brooks. Hawks play Munday's Moguls here Friday night. This will be set aside as Dad's Night, and each boy will be escorted across the field by his father, who will be wearing the number that corresponds to that of his son.

Hawks are working on some new offensive plays and will attempt to run these Friday night. As a result of last Friday's victory at Paducah the Hawks are

now ranked No. 8 in the area for all Class AA and A teams.

Iowa Park played Archer City there on Friday night, Oct. 10. Tony Waters returned a punt 82 yards for the only touchdown of the game, and Jimmy Banks went off-tackle for the two extra points to give the Hawks an 8-0 victory. The Hawks drove to Archer City's 15, 10 and 1 yard lines later in the game but failed to score because of fumbles.

Outstanding for the Hawks on offense were Malcolm Berry, Jim Banks, John Woodall and Bobby Gilbreath.

Hawks who played best on defense were Lee Holloway, Roy Boutwell, Paul Parkey, Jimmy Gard and James Paris. The Hawks made 15 first downs to 4 for Archer City; and gained 325 yards to 95 for the Wildcats.

Mr. Wilson was born Jan. 25, 1887 in Cooke county. He was married July 2, 1906, to Miss Dottie Bluhm at Wellington and they moved to Wichita county in 1916. They lived in Clara community until 1925, when the family moved to Iowa Park. In 1937 the family moved to Wichita Falls.

Mr. Wilson was well known as an oilfield driller in this area. Survivors are the widow; two daughters: Mrs. James R. Davis of Midland and Mrs. Walter C. Klein of Sheffield, Ala.; a brother Walter of Amarillo; and three grandchildren: Bobby Davis of Midland and Martha and Janette Klein of Sheffield.

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REASON AND REVELATION

by GLENN OWEN

"The Works of the Flesh"

"Now the works of the flesh are manifest, which are these: adultery, fornication, uncleanness, lasciviousness, idolatry, witchcraft, hatred, variance, emulations, wrath, strife, sedition, heresies, envyings, murders, drunkenness, revellings, and such like: of the which I tell you before, as I have told you in time past, that they which do such things shall not inherit the kingdom of God" (Gal. 5:19-21).

The Bible is not an encyclopedia of wickedness, but it does point out and describe all kinds of sin. Its main theme is not wickedness but salvation. The works of the flesh that Paul here describes should be carefully observed by all who are trying to live the Christian life. As we study this list of vices we should not be thinking of our brethren but ourselves. Instead of looking for the ones that our brethren are guilty of, we should look for the ones that we practice. One of our brethren may be charged with adultery and we have much to say about that; another may be charged with drunkenness and he is an outstanding problem to the church. But while this may be true, are we guilty of hatred, wrath, strife, envyings, or revellings? What we need to know is not how a thing looks in the eyes of men, but how it looks in the eyes of God. The impenitent drunkard and adulterer will go to hell. So will the man who practices envy or hatred or revellings. And after it is over with, what is the difference?

Here are seventeen vices that must be crushed out of our lives. But how can we do it? It looks like a big job. But Paul tells us how to do it. "This I say then, Walk in the Spirit, and ye shall not fulfill the lust of the flesh" (Gal. 5:16). If men keep their feet on the right path, they will miss the pitfalls of the devil. The devices of Satan are not found in the "narrow way." They may be found close to it, but certainly never in it. If a man walks after the Spirit, as the Spirit directs through the word of the living God, he will not be guilty of the sins of the flesh.

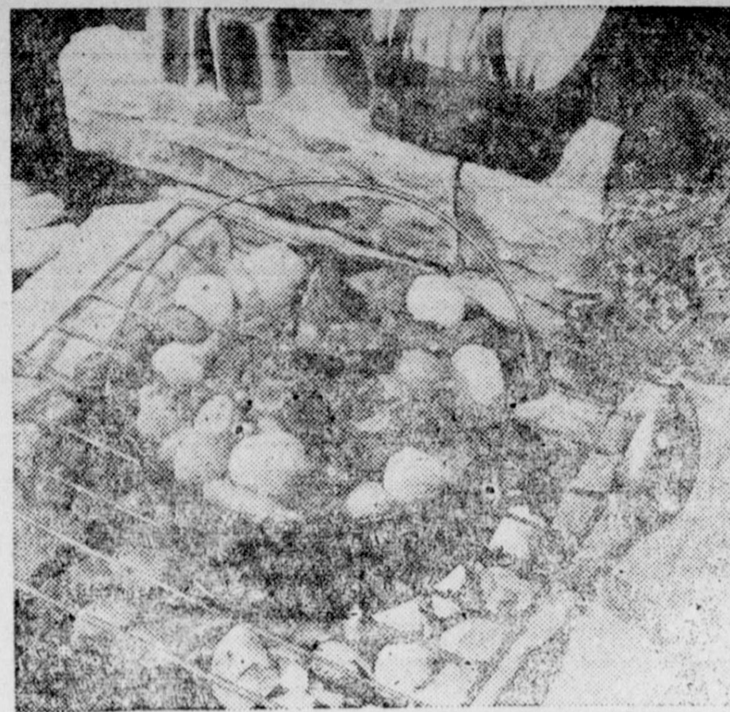
Plans were made for a Halloween party Oct. 31.

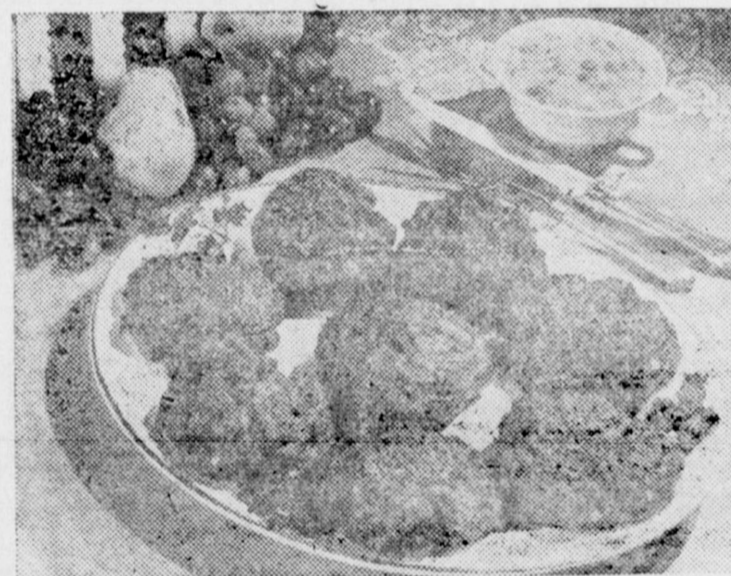

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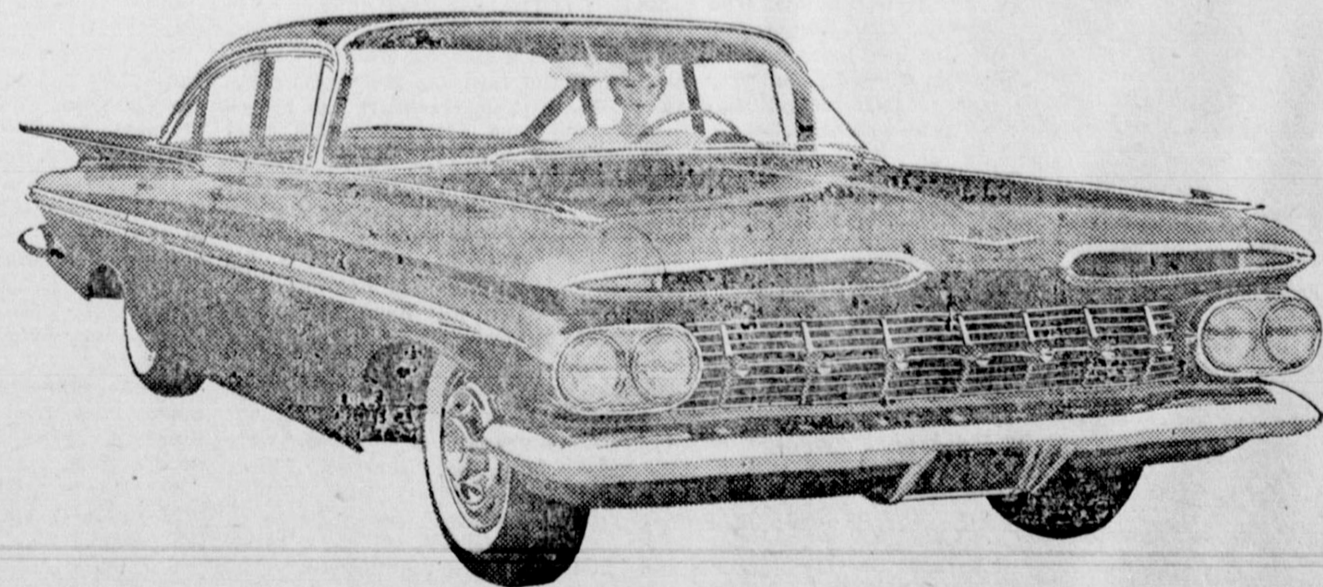

YOU MUST HAVE LOVE

Six months before I was born, my mother was called to a neighbor's home to pray for their little child.

At that time Francis Engles was 5 1/2 years old. He had taken the flu, which extended into pneumonia. His voice was raspy and the child rattled and wheezed, so inflamed were his lungs. His father never expected him to live through the night.

The boy was healed that night, at about 8:30 or 9 o'clock. His high fever left him immediately. He had not eaten for three days, but within ten minutes after prayer he was sitting up and asking for food. The next morning he joined his family for the first time in several days at the breakfast table. With childlike faith he accepted the healing of God offered to him, and his recovery was rapid.

So many people do not know how to accept the love of God because they do not know how to have childlike faith. We complicate things as we grow older.

Mr. Engles recently visited the Abundant Life International Headquarters in Tulsa, Oklahoma, for the first time. He is now 45 years of age, weighs 205 pounds and towers 6 feet 2 inches in height.

Since his healing 40 years ago, he has enjoyed excellent health. He has retained and lived by his original childlike faith in the goodness of God and in the power of the Saviour of us all, Jesus of Nazareth.

Mr. Engles is a successful paving and grading contractor at Seaside, California. With his wife and two

young daughters, he lives at Pacific Grove, California. He is a trustee in his church.

Before his visit to Oklahoma, my parents visited him in California. They had not seen each other for 38 years, and it was a grand reunion. Francis' mother, Mattie May Engles, lives at San Jose, California. She is now 66, but her faith in God is as young as ever. She has never forgotten that 40 years ago my mother prayed for the deliverance of her son. While my mother visited her in 1958, Mrs. Engles had an opportunity to return the honor of prayer.

A car door slammed on my mother's left hand, crushing it badly. The pain was so great that both women cried, but my mother said, "Don't cry, Mattie, Let's believe God. Pray for me."

They went into the house and Mrs. Engles prayed. The loving, healing hand of Jesus touched the swollen, bleeding, pain-racked hand of my mother. The pain left it, and she fell asleep. There was no more pain. The injury cleared up gradually, and within a week there was no sign that the hand had ever been crushed. Did not Jesus say, "They shall recover?"

Our lives are interwoven with the lives of each other, and it is necessary that we pray for one another. More especially, it is necessary to love one another.

In love, my mother prayed for her neighbor's child, and in love the neighbor prayed for her. In love God healed them both.

God is love, and if you are to have God, you must have love.
