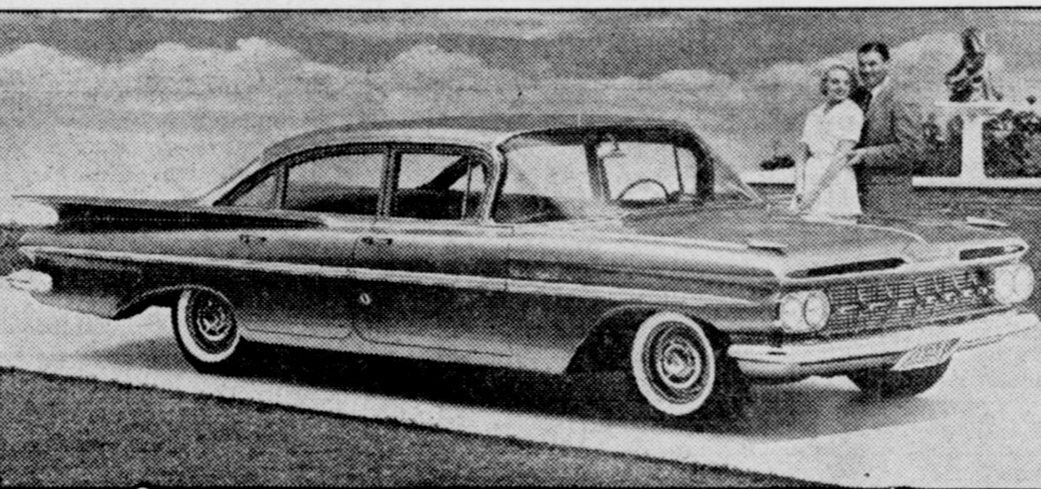

Importance of Casting Heavy Vote Pointed Out by Cotton Moffett

The Herald has received the following statement concerning the general election next Tuesday from Sen. George Moffett of Chilocco:

"It is of considerable importance that a large number of citizens turn out and vote next Tuesday.

"The law provides that the number of votes cast (for the governor) at the general election this year will determine how many delegates and votes each county in Texas will have in the Democratic state convention in May, 1960.

"This 1960 state convention will choose the delegates from Texas to the National Democratic Convention, which will nominate the party's candidate for President in November 1960.

"If you want to increase your county's voting strength in choosing the delegates which will pick the next President of the United States, come out and vote on Nov. 4, 1958."

Do You Know the Signs of Life?

WHEN DRIVING visibility is poor, and you can distinguish only the outlines of traffic signs, your safety may depend on recognizing the meaning of their shapes.

Regulation road sign shapes have been uniformly adopted throughout the country so that motorists traveling from state to state can quickly identify them. Known as the "Signs of Life," they are posted for your protection. Recognize them—and respect them!

- An octagon-shaped sign means come to a full stop and be sure the way is clear before proceeding.
- The triangle is the newest of the standard signs and reads "Yield Right of Way." It requires drivers to slow down or stop if necessary to give right of way to cross-traffic at intersections.
- The rectangle or square-shaped sign states traffic regulations such as speed limits, parking restrictions, etc.
- Diamond-shaped signs tell motorists to slow down, and warn of dangerous or unusual road conditions ahead, including curves, bumps, bridges, intersections, hills, school zones, etc.
- The round sign indicates a railroad crossing 300 to 500 feet ahead.

BARBECUED CHICKEN . . . A WONDERFUL TREAT!



Take a chicken outdoors to the barbecue grill and treat the family to elegant eating. Flavored throughout with tangy sauce and accompanied by charcoal grilled corn, tossed salad and garlic bread warmed over the coals, this is one meal not soon to be forgotten.

Charcoal Grilled Barbecued Chicken
Allow time for gray ash to cover charcoal briquets, about 45 minutes. Spread coals 1/2" apart with poker or long stick. Shake off outer ashes just before, and occasionally during barbecuing. Brush grill with fat to keep meat from sticking.

Brush chicken broiler pieces with Barbecue Sauce or marinate in sauce while getting the fire ready. Drain off excess sauce. Set chicken on grill 6 to 8 inches from coals. If distance has to be less, watch carefully to avoid charring. Keep turning chicken every 5 minutes, basting with sauce, 30 to 60 minutes, depending on size.

Barbecue Sauce
1 cup tomato puree or catsup
1/2 cup water
3/4 cup lemon juice
3/4 cup soft butter
1 medium onion, finely chopped
Mix all ingredients and bring just to boil. If sauce thickens on standing, dilute with water to good spreading consistency.

Charcoal Grilled Corn
Discard outer husks. Strip inner husks to end of cob; do not tear off. Pull out silk. Soak in ice water 20 minutes. Drain corn on towel; leave husks wet. Spread corn generously with butter. Rewrap in husks; then in double thickness of heavy duty aluminum foil. Cook on ash gray coals 10 to 15 minutes, turning once.

REASON AND REVELATION by GLENN OWEN

"Is Bible Baptism by Sprinkling?" The simplicity of God's word is one of its most outstanding features. It was given in such a way that all can understand what they must do to be saved. The misunderstandings in the religious world today do not come from what the Bible says, but rather from what it does NOT say. By accepting only what the Bible says, we can all achieve the ultimate end of obedience to God, that is, the home of the soul. Let us consider one of the outstanding questions in the world of religion today, "Is sprinkling taught by the Bible as one form of baptism?" It would be easy to rest on some man's sayings, but let's turn to God's book. Here is a little test that you can make for yourself. It is easy to see that if sprinkling is baptism, then baptism would be sprinkling. If they are equal to one another, then they are equal to the same. If that were true then your Bible would read like this in Rom. 6:3-4: "Know ye not, that so many of us as were SPRINKLED into Jesus Christ were SPRINKLED into his death? Therefore we are buried with him by SPRINKLING into death: that like us Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life." You say, "My Bible doesn't read like that." No it doesn't, but if the word "sprinkle" meant the same as "baptism," it could without harming the meaning of the verse. But you can see very clearly that it just won't fit. This same principle would also apply in the following verses: Galatians 3:27, 1 Corinthians 12:13, and Colossians 2:12. Make the comparison for yourself and you will see that it just can't be done.

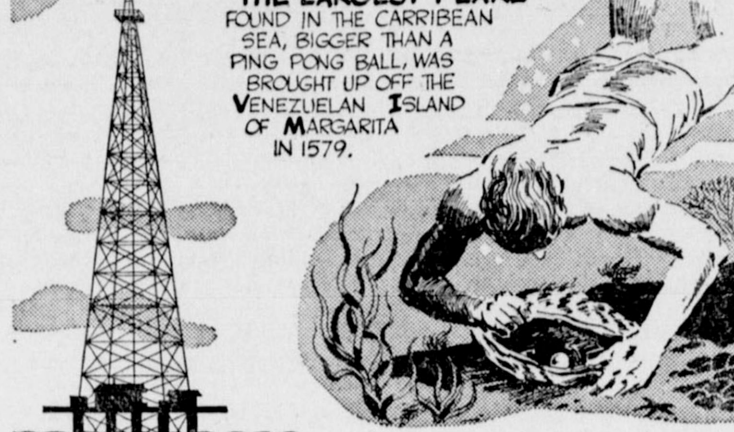

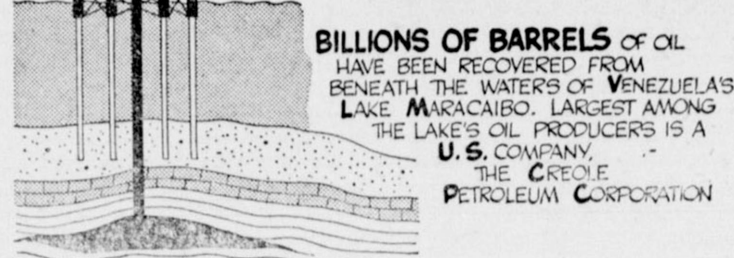

BE FIT TO SPEAK

Solomon John Mattar, keeper of the garden tomb of Joseph of Arimathea, where Jesus was buried and rose from the dead, recently visited our International Headquarters in Tulsa.

While addressing our office staff, he said, "You know, dear friends, we can easily speak about the Lord Jesus, but it is another thing to be fit to speak. My prayer and the prayer of my wife every morning in the garden tomb is that the Lord will make us fit to be witnesses in this place or any other place."

He gave three things as being especially necessary to be fit to speak the name of the living Son of the living God:

Compassion.
 Consecration.
 Service.

This incident illustrates the famous keeper's own fitness to witness for Jesus Christ anywhere, including one of the holiest places in the Holy Land, the garden tomb.

About 10,000 people a year visit the tomb. They usually come in small groups, sometimes only one or two at a time. On each occasion, Mr. Mattar takes them first to Golgotha Hill where he begins the narrative of the crucifixion and death of our Saviour.

Then they proceed to the sepulcher, which really consists of five tombs, only one of which was ever completed.

One day five elderly ladies came into the tomb. They were well-dressed and well-to-do. They were polite and conservative. They did not speak or smile while the keeper related the beautiful story of Mary Magdalene and the disciples who came with precious oil to anoint the body of Jesus only to learn that he had risen.

The keeper observed his listeners as he spoke. They appeared unmoved, even by the story of the tender meeting of Jesus and Mary, and he began to feel very sorry for them.

"Something came into my throat," Mr. Mattar said, "and I couldn't speak so good, and so my tears began to come down because they were getting along in age, yet they did not appear interested in the things of God."

When the elderly ladies saw the falling tears of the tomb keeper, they were stirred. That is why compassion is so important. They knew the keeper's tears were not only for the story he was telling, but also for each one of them personally.

They knew that the keeper was consecrated in the service of his Lord and Saviour, but when they saw his compassion, they were moved. It was the compassion of Jesus which had drawn Mary Magdalene, and it was her compassion at the tomb which drew Jesus back to her.

One of the ladies said, "We were moved because you never moved, and we feel we can never forget this experience in the tomb."

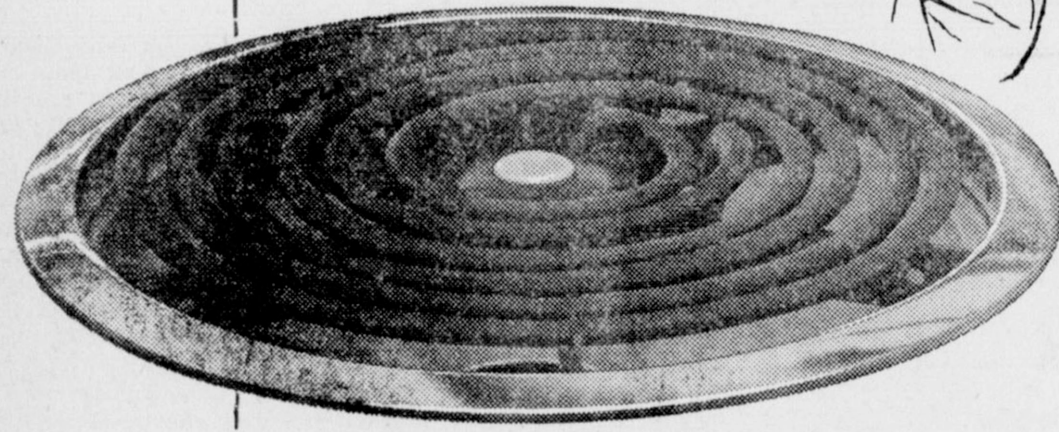
Compassion for those he serves makes Mr. Mattar fit to serve them.

Hospital Vote Due in Archer

The people of Archer county will have two elections next Tuesday—the general election for congressman, senator and state officials, and a Hospital Bond election in the sum of \$200,000.

The general election is open to all qualified voters, and the importance of giving your favorite candidates your vote and encouragement cannot be overemphasized.

The bond election is restricted to voters who have rendered property to the county tax assessor on or before May 1, 1958.

Proponents of the hospital bond issue are headed by J. L. Prideaux, a rancher who has lived in Archer county more than 50 years. Prideaux, in a meeting of the Holiday Civic club on Oct. 14, stated Archer county has approximately 7,000 people and that the State Board of Health reported recently that Archer county should have a first-class hospital to serve its people.

Mr. Prideaux told the folk present that other counties in this area have modern hospitals while Archer county has to send patients to other counties for hospitalization and treatment.

Mr. Prideaux pointed out that Archer county is one of the richest counties in North Texas, having no bonded indebtedness and with a surplus of over \$200,000. He said the proposed bonds can be retired without an additional tax levy by setting aside 10c of the present \$1.25 tax levy for that purpose.

Mr. Prideaux further reported to the people of Holiday that the Commissioners Court will appoint a six-man hospital board to manage and operate the hospital, thus relieving the court of that responsibility.

Certain members of the Civic club pointed out that Holiday is in need of a medical doctor and facilities to serve the Holiday and Mankins and Dundee areas, and Mr. Prideaux stated that if the bond issue passes, he was certain the hospital board will do all within its power to assist the people of Holiday in establishing a doctor in that community.
