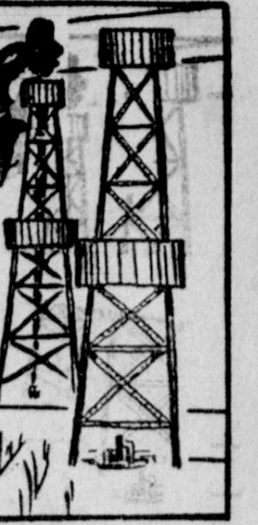

Hawks Win Meet; Gilbreath Stars

First Iowa Park Invitational Track and Field Meet was held last Saturday in a blowing dust-storm. Sixteen teams from Texas and Oklahoma entered and each scored at least one point.

Iowa Park Hawks won the team trophy by scoring more points than the next two teams combined. The totals were:

Iowa Park 35; Electra 16; Burk Burnett 16; Lockett 12½; Walters 11; Childress 10½; Henrietta 8; Olney 8; Archer City 7; Valley View 6½; Big Pasture 5; Chilli-cothe 5; Petrolia 3; Jackboro 3; Crowell 2; Wheeler 2.

The Hawks won the mile relay with a team of David Parkey, Donald Thompson, Tony Waters and Bobby Gilbreath.

Bobby Gilbreath won first in broad jump, 180 low hurdles and 880 yard run. 3rd in high jump, and ran on the mile relay team.

Don Roy Klinkerman won first in high jump.

Tony Waters ran second in the 100 yard dash and ran on the 440 relay and mile relay teams.

David Parkey ran on the 440 and mile relay teams and ran the century.

Donald Thompson placed 3rd in the 220 dash and ran on both relay teams.

Royce Caddell ran the 100 and 220 yard dashes.

Bobby Crabtree ran the 120 high hurdles and the 180 low sticks.

Gary May ran the 120 yard high hurdles and the half mile.

Jimmy Banks tied for second in pole vault.

Jackie Brooks entered the mile run.

ORDINANCE NO. 283

An Ordinance to Be Known as an "Arson Reward Ordinance."

Be it ordained by the City Council, Texas, adopt the following "Arson Reward Ordinance" to-wit:

Section 1. The City of Iowa Park, Wichita County, Texas, hereby offers a reward of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) for the arrest and conviction of any person or persons found guilty of committing the crime of Arson within the corporate limits of said City of Iowa Park, Texas. This reward is a standing offer, and shall be paid out of the General Fund of the City of Iowa Park, Wichita County, Texas.

Section 2. Placards eight inches by twelve inches in size, showing the above reward is offered, must be placed in wooden frames under glass, inside of at least six different public buildings. A certified copy of the Ordinance, a copy of one of the placards, and a list of the buildings where placards have been posted as outlined, must be furnished to the State Board of Insurance, Austin 14, Texas.

Section 3. This Ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency for the preservation of the public safety and shall take effect immediately.

Passed and Approved by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, in regular session this 9th day of March A.D. 1959.

\$125,000 School Bond Election Set for Tuesday, March 24

Supt. Keith Swim was the program Tuesday noon at Lions club, discussing the bills currently before the state legislature, and outlining probable needs of the local school district.

The speaker began by calling attention to the work done by local Lions on the Gilmer-Aikin Commission. They were O. N. Newman, C. E. Birk, Alan Berry, Lester E. Brooks and Curtis Sewell.

He reported that Roy Smith, mathematics instructor here, represented Iowa Park at a recent hearing on some of the bills affecting public schools.

Swim displayed preliminary pictures of the proposed elementary school, bonds for which are to be voted on next Tuesday.

Cost of the 8-classroom unit, the cafeteria, furnishings for the structures, and covered play area are estimated at \$207,000. Swim reported a balance of \$65,000 remains from the bond issue of 1955, and said an additional issue of \$125,000 is necessary to build the proposed elementary school.

1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup melted butter
1 1/2 cups (1 tall can) evaporated milk
1 1/2 cups shredded Cheddar cheese
2 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese
1 1/2 cups (4 3/4 ounce box) rice

1 tablespoon chopped parsley
Dash of cayenne
1/2 teaspoon oregano
1 1/2 cups water
1 can (1 pound) solid-pack tomatoes, drained and sliced
1/2 medium onion, thinly sliced
1 cup (7-ounce can) tuna drained and flaked
Paprika

Place Minute Rice, parsley, cayenne, oregano, water, and the remaining salt in a 7 1/2 x 11 1/4 inch baking dish. Stir to moisten all rice. Place two-thirds of the tomatoes on the rice. Top with onion and tuna fish. Spread on cheese sauce. Garnish with remaining tomato. Sprinkle with paprika. Bake in a moderate oven (375° F) 15 minutes. Makes 6 servings.

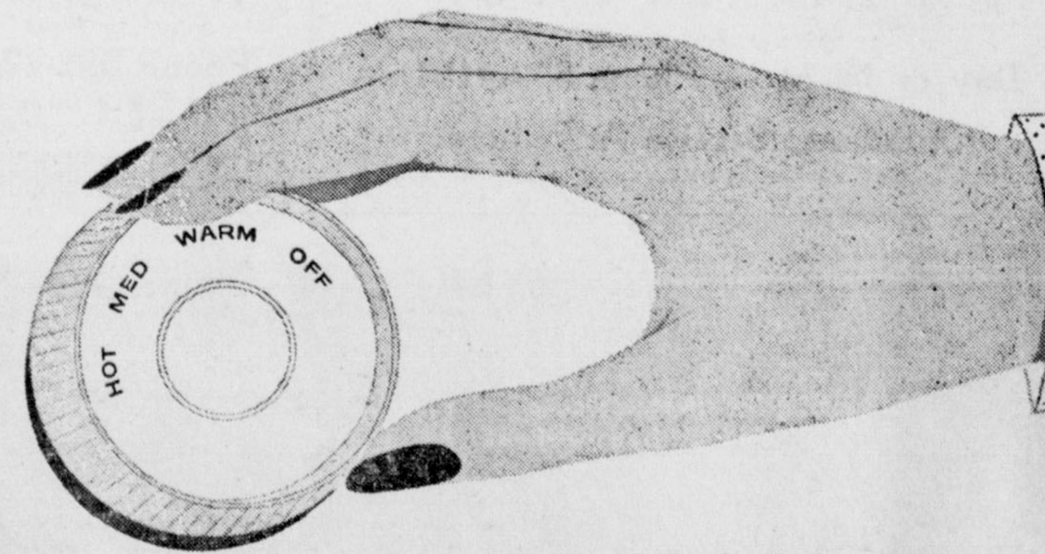

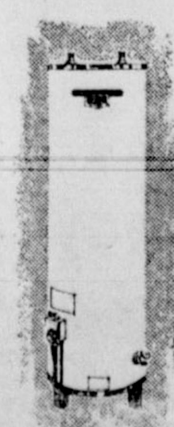
