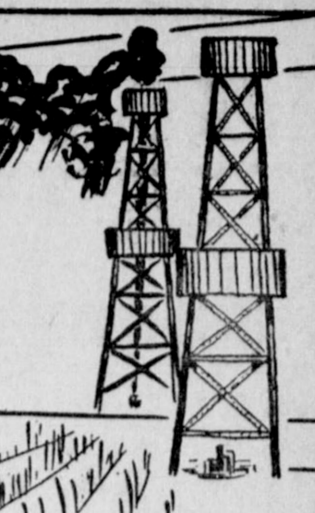

### HOW TO DEFEAT AN INFERIORITY COMPLEX

According to an old legend a certain Greek city lay under the heel of a cruel king. But the old men of the city kept up the hopes of the people by telling them the story of the face of a man that was cut out in the rock mountain that looked down on the city. "Some day a conqueror will rise up among our people. He will look like the man in the mountain. He will deliver us."

A little boy believed this story. Each night he would pray to God to make him look like that man in the mountain. One day when he was a grown young man, it came in his heart to deliver these people. The people gathered to hear him speak of the coming liberation. While he spoke, the old men cried out, "Look! He looks like the man in the mountain." They followed him to victory.

If you will tell me what you are thinking about most, I will tell you what you are and what you are increasingly becoming. You think about what you believe and in believing there is creative power. That creativeness is dedicated toward bettering or worsening the affairs of life.

Many people suffer from an inferiority complex. That is because they believe they are inferior. They have a sense of inadequacy, of not being able to compete, or be on a par with others. Others feel that their physical ugliness cannot be remedied. But beauty and charm have an intangible quality. They come from inner resources.

Mrs. J. D. said that for years she had felt "quite plain" around her sisters. They were so charming and she felt unattractive. But one day a friend said, "You are not ugly. And if you will pray for God's help, you can really become the attractive person that you want to be."

And so this young lady began to think and believe positively. She tried to be friendly and thoughtful of others. Right thinking and radiant living was a continuous ambition of her life. She painted a mental picture of her hopes and continued to affirm them over and over, believing that these would come into being. And, of course, in her prayers she asked God to help her.

These things happened as she wished them. Today she is married, happy and very popular. Something wonderful can also happen to you. You may be sick, crippled, ugly, afraid or badly worried. But get a faith-image in your heart of what you want to be. Continue to visualize this and tell yourself over and over that through God's help the things you need and desire will happen to you.

Then believe them. If you can't believe too forcibly at first, believe as much as you can. Your faith will grow. And as you keep the image in your heart, that reality will begin to take place in your life. Jesus said, "According to your faith, so be it unto you."

### Maudie Owens, Loved Teacher, Buried in Birthplace, Buffalo, Mo.



### Tributes to a Great Soul

Mrs. O. R. Owens, a former member of the Iowa Park school faculty, died at 1:00 p.m. Monday, March 30, in a Mena, Ark., hospital after a long illness.

A short funeral service was held Tuesday afternoon in the Gyer Funeral chapel in Mena with Rev. T. M. Moore, pastor of the Christian church there, officiating.

The body was shipped to Buffalo, Mo., for services to be held Thursday afternoon in the First Christian church with Dr. LeRoy Carter, former pastor of the Iowa Park Christian church and now of Springfield, Mo., officiating. He was assisted by Rev. Tipps, pastor of the Buffalo Christian church, and cousin of Mrs. Owens. Burial was in the Buffalo cemetery.

Born Sept. 21, 1896, Maudie Hunt in Buffalo, she was graduated from high school there and received the BA degree from the University of Missouri.

She taught approximately 30 years in Missouri and Texas before she retired year before last. Of the 30 years, 21 were in Texas and the last 12 years were in Iowa Park High School, where she had English, music theory and speech as teaching fields.

Maudie, as she was affectionately known to many, young and old, here, first came to Texas to teach in a large Gulf company school, called Isom Camp near Borger. She met and married Russ Owens, an employee of Gulf, some 24 years ago.

Mr. and Mrs. Owens moved to Panhandle from Isom Camp and to this district in 1945. They resided in Electra for a year before moving to Iowa Park.

Maudie served as teacher sponsor for many high school classes and activities, and was the first sponsor for the National Honor Society here. She organized and directed the Melody Maids of the local school.

Maudie was a Sunday School teacher and member of the official board of the local Christian church.

She was a sponsor and honorary member of Epsilon Eta of Epsilon Sigma Alpha here. Past president of Modern Music Study club of Iowa Park. Lift member of Iowa Park PTA.

Member of Delta Kappa Gamma, honorary society for women teachers.

Mrs. Owens was quite active in school, church and civic affairs all during her stay here, until ill health forced her retirement.

Mr. and Mrs. Owens moved to a beautiful farm home near Mena last year, and since that time many Iowa Park friends have visited with them.

Survivors are Mr. Owens and a brother John Hunt of Monett, Mo.

Those attending the services in Mena were Mr. and Mrs. T. M. Clark, Chauncey Weller and Rollin Roberts.

As she was reached in being a good teacher. For boys and girls, she lived. Her inspiration and love for them will never be forgotten. For those who worked with her, she inspired as well. Those of us who are teachers constantly strive to reach the goals which she attained.

"Though her golden character is gone, certainly her gifts to the lives which she touched will live forever."

**From Mrs. Rollin Roberts, chaplain of E.S.A.:**  
"There is a time when we each experience the feeling of a deep heartache because we have lost something that is very personal and endearing to us. This is the feeling we the members of Iowa Park's Epsilon Sigma Alpha have for Maudie Owens. Her death causes a great loss to our chapter but her devotion to the high spiritual values of life will forever be a challenge to meet in our daily living."

"It was in 1950 she was chosen as our sponsor. She not only opened up her heart to each of us, but also opened her home to us to use at any time. Surely no individual could leave each of us with a more sincere desire to live a more devoted Christian life as

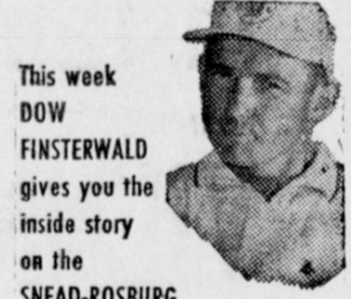
**From Maudie's minister, Dr. LeRoy Carter:**  
"Maudie Owens was one of those rare souls who forgot herself into immortality. Possessed of highly endowed faculties of mind and heart and a keen appreciation of the finer things of life, she found her greatest enjoyment in passing on to others the things that had made her own life rich. She loved people and lived for people."

**From Mrs. Glen Miller, a former student:**  
"It was my privilege to be a student of Maudie Owens for one year. During this year, I learned to love and respect her—a love and respect that will never cease. "Maudie was a good teacher. She tried to impress on all her students that good or better grades should be the goal of every student. But more important than what she taught us from the textbook were the high ideals she constantly stressed for us each to obtain. I remember her saying on so many occasions, 'Find yourself a place in the community and strive to make something of your life.'"

"Maudie was as interested in building our character as she was in developing our mental capacity. She was interested in each of us as individuals. She always had time to listen to our troubles—whether they were about school or personal affairs. She never hesitated to remind us of our moral obligations to our God, our parents, and ourselves."

"She always spoke of her former students as 'my children.' God didn't choose to give Maudie any children by birth—but through her great love she had many children. I sincerely hope that my own children will have such a teacher as Maudie to teach them, guide them, and love them as individuals."

**From James E. Elma, high school principal:**  
"In Memoriam to Maudie: The eloquence of such a life cannot be summed up in a few words, for we are not able to verbally express the attributes of such a person as Maudie Owens. ### This week DOW FINSTERWALD gives you the inside story on the SNEAD-ROSBURG ABC-TV ALL-STAR GOLF MATCH

Snead did it again. For the 8th time in a row, he collected his check for \$2,000 on All-Star Golf. This time, the victim was fighting Bob Rosburg, who shot a commendable 2 under par 69. This, however, was to no avail against Snead's brilliant 6 under par 65.

Snead's second eagle on All-Star Golf, plus his last victory at the DeSoto Lake Country Club in Sarasota, Florida, brings his total take to \$17,000 . . . and that's a lot of money to collect on TV, outside of an Isolation Booth. Rosburg, at the outset, looked like he might turn the trick when he came up with a birdie on the 2nd hole . . . but on the 3rd his 5-iron went into the trap and he was forced to take a bogey to even up the match.

Snead wasted no time going ahead when he sank a 40 foot putt for a birdie 2, on the par 3. No. 5 hole. His magic putter sank a 9 foot putt on the next green for a birdie 3, and on the 8th, he just missed his eagle 3 . . . rimming his putt for a birdie 4. Rosburg matched his birdie on the 8th, but he still was two strokes down to Sam Snead coming into the turn. On the 11th, a 472 yard, par 5 hole, Snead hit a 1-iron 220 yards, 25 feet from the pin, and then sank a beautiful putt for an eagle 3, and a bonus of \$500. Rosburg shot a very handsome birdie on this hole, but his achievement was somewhat dulled by Snead's heroics.

On the par 3, 12th hole, Snead put his 5-iron 6 feet from the pin for another birdie . . . and I really felt for Bob Rosburg who was shooting 2 under par golf, but still found himself 4 down. This was the margin at the end of the match, with Snead shooting a 6 under par, 65, and Rosburg a 2 under par, 69.

Snead racked up 5 birdies and an eagle . . . and this is the kind of golf that is virtually unbeatable. His 65 brought Snead's average on All-Star Golf down to approximately 67 strokes per round. If you had to single out one phase of Snead's game responsible for this achievement, you must give credit to a confident, sure putting stroke that never seems to miss an opportunity to break par.

Next week, as your Musing-wear Golf Reporter, I will cover Snead's match against Billy Maxwell. Who knows . . . perhaps this will mark the end of the Snead Dynasty on ABC-TV All-Star Golf.

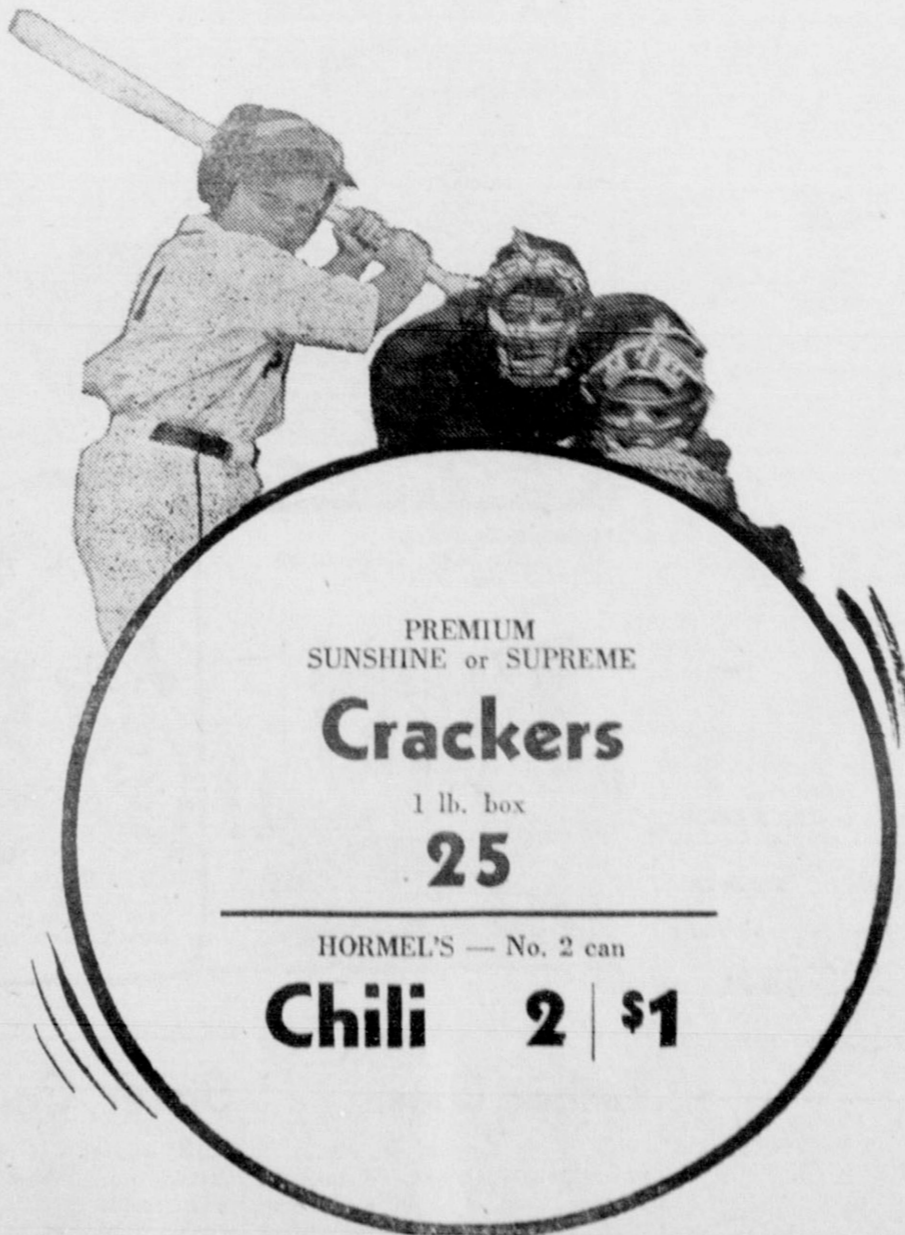

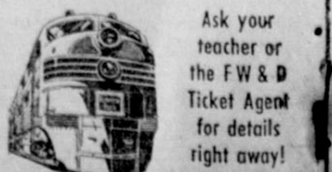

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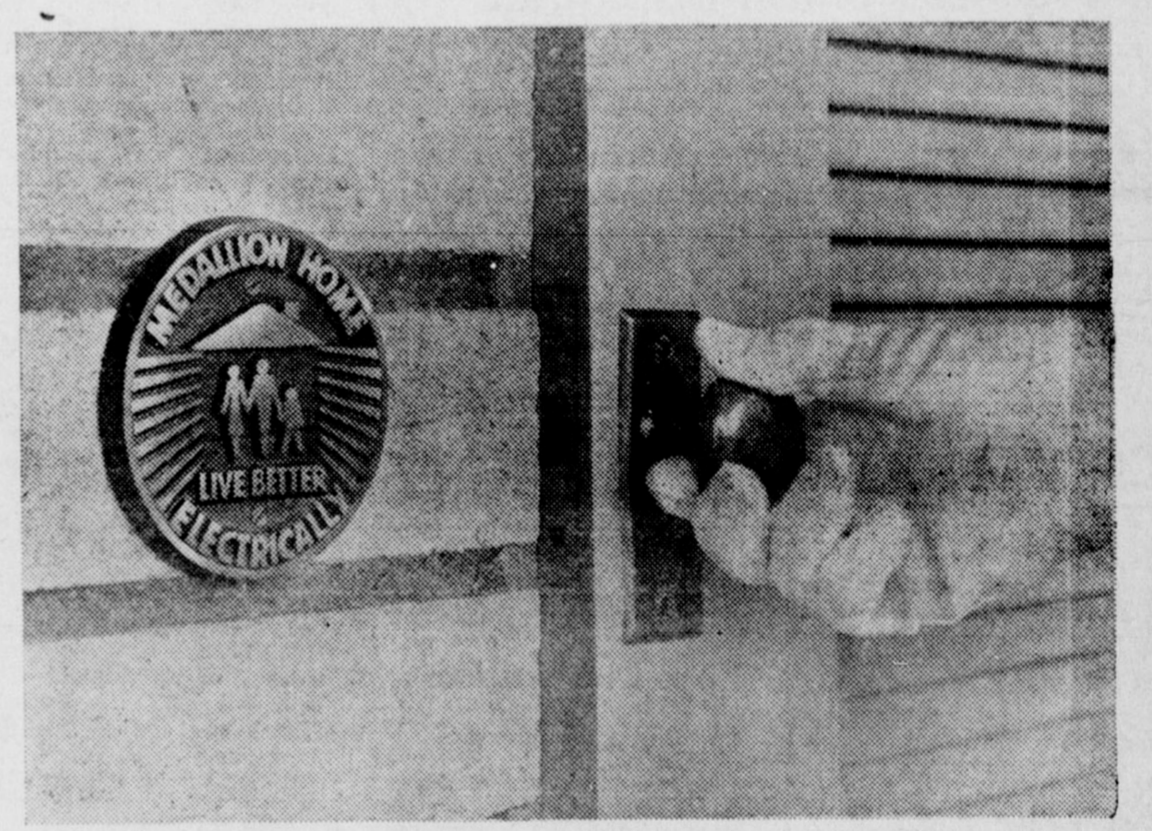
