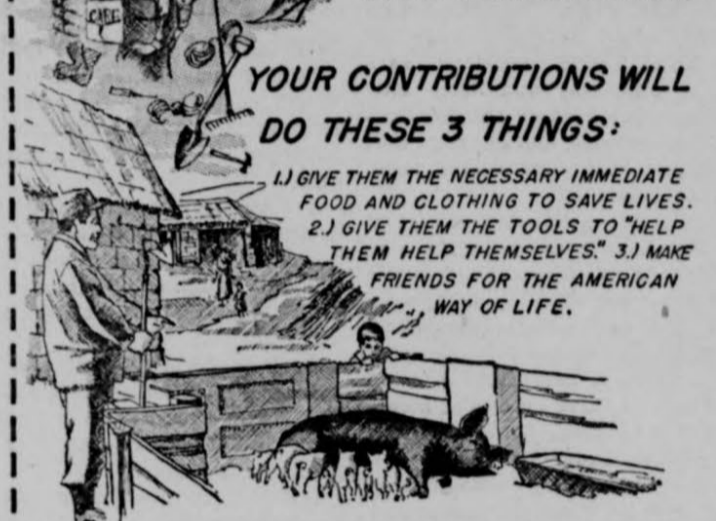

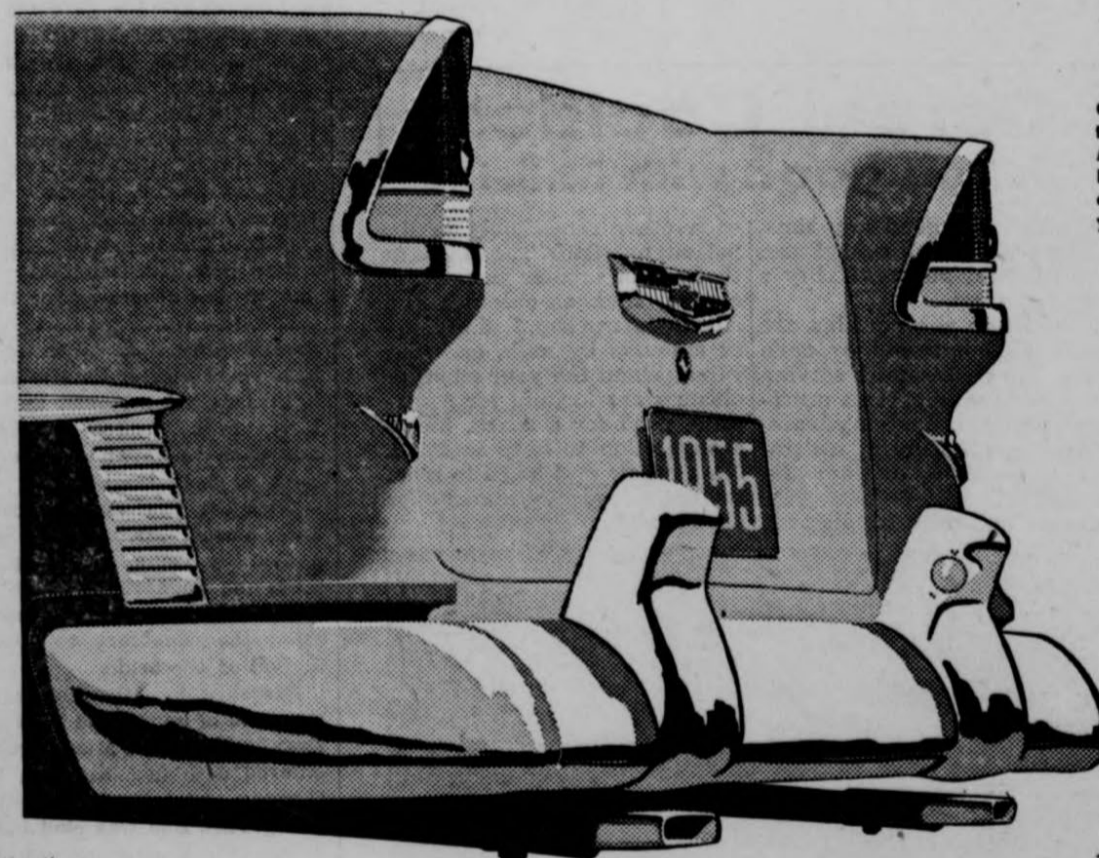

MEAT BALLS

- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1/2 lb. ground pork
- 1 cup nonfat dry milk solids
- 1 1/2 cups soft bread crumbs
- 1/4 cup chopped onion
- 1 slightly beaten egg
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1/2 cup water

Combine ingredients in order given. Form into balls. Bake for 40 minutes at 350° F. Pour mushroom sauce over meat balls and bake 20 minutes, basting once during baking. Serves 6 to 8.

MUSHROOM SAUCE

- 1/4 cup butter
- 1/2 lb. sliced fresh mushrooms

- 1/4 cup chopped onions
- 1/4 cup flour
- 1/2 cup nonfat dry milk solids
- 2 cups water, broth or bouillon**
- 1/4 cup cream
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- Paprika

**2 beef bouillon cubes and hot water may be used

Melt butter in 1 1/2 quart sauce pan. Add mushrooms and onions. Cook gently 5 minutes. Remove from butter. Remove pan from heat. Add flour and nonfat dry milk solids. Mix well. Gradually stir in liquid. Return to heat. Cook until thick, stirring until smooth. Stir in cream. Add seasonings, mushrooms and onions. Pour over meat balls.
