### 989 Students

Iowa Park schools are like all other schools — bulging at the seams.

At the end of six weeks last year the elementary school had 518 enrolled. At the end of two weeks this year there is an increase of 22 or 540. Miss Ethyle Kidwell reports more students are entering school each day.

James Elms reports junior high had an enrollment last year at the end of six weeks of 179. Wednesday the enrollment was 194, an increase of 15.

Senior high last year at the end of six weeks had 208 students. On Wednesday the enrollment was 235 for an increase of 27.

Total for all schools last year at the six weeks report was 925. At the present time the school system has 989 students.

Garnett Kemper, a former Iowa Park resident, was one of 16 driv-

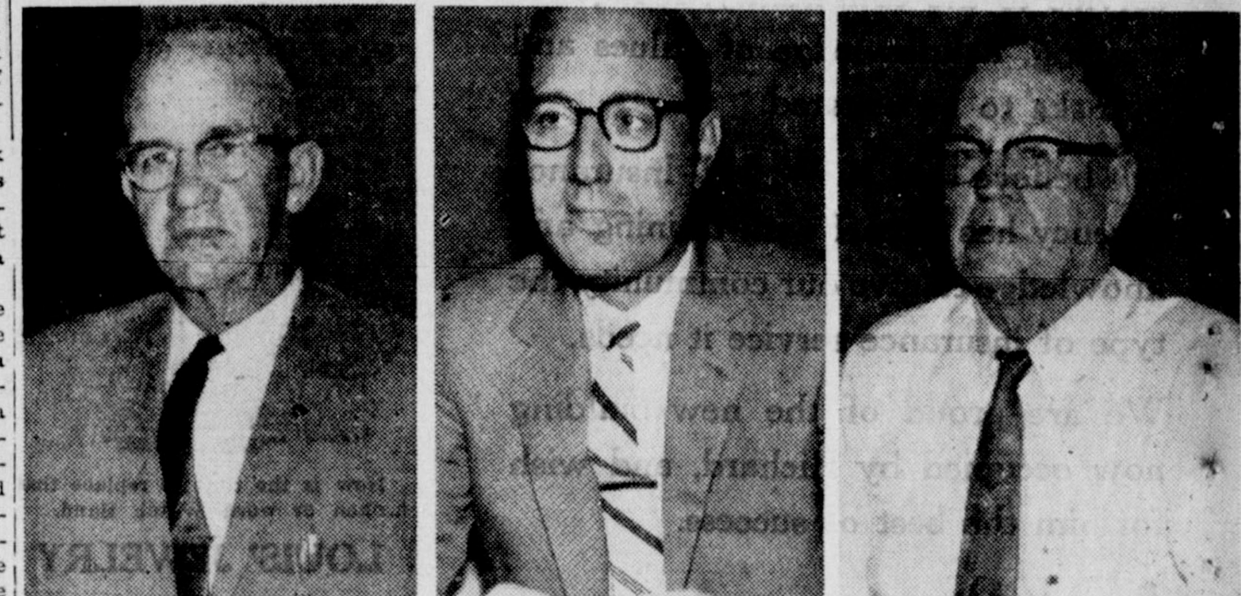
ers for Continental Baking company in Washington, D.C. to receive a safety award pin and plaque for two years.

**Farmers Union**

"One of the most erroneous impressions being spread today is that farm organizations are not working together," stated Alex Dickie Jr., president of Texas Farmers Union, at a recent meeting of farm organization leaders. "The only dissident 'farm organization' that is not working hand-in-hand with other farm groups is an organization headed by leadership that is working with other reactionary groups whose principal motives seem to be destruction of family farms and reduction of family farmers' economic status to that of peons," continued Dickie.

These issues will be discussed when James G. Patton, president of National Farmers Union, addresses West Texas Farmers at Ralls on Sept. 22. Patton is noted for his vigorous attacks on the destruction of family farm economy and eventual elimination of family farmers from the scene of American democracy.

Patton's address will constitute a major pronouncement of the present and continued policy of FU to fight the forces of reaction whenever and wherever its traces are discovered in the rough economic sea which is trying to engulf American agriculture.

"Texas farmers have expressed a fervent desire to continue in a concentrated effort to fight to improve farm prices and income in order to achieve a parity with other parts of economy," said Dickie.

A separate meeting will be held on Sept. 23 at the Caprock hotel in Lubbock at 10:00 a.m. A large group of local FU members plan to attend the Lubbock meeting.
