Paducah was held to 3 first downs, 8 yards rushing and 13 yards passing.

Hawks ground out 173 yards on running plays.

Bobby Glibreath made a trap play pay off for 45 yards and the first TD. Lyndell Glenn ran the conversion.

Glenn made the trap play again for a 70 yard run in the second quarter. Tony Waters ran the conversion.

Weather conditions were so bad both teams ran the ball on fourth down instead of kicking, because they could have no control over a kick. At one time the Hawks elected to run instead of kick from their own 12 yard line.

Fire Prevention Is Year Round Task

Fire Prevention Week, Oct. 4-10, was observed in 1922 for the first time on a national basis. It is an outgrowth of Fire Prevention Day used in 1911 to mark the anniversary of the great Chicago fire on Oct. 9, 1871, when 250 lives were lost and property damage totaled \$175,000,000.

Iowa Park is observing Fire Prevention Week under sponsorship of the Chamber of Commerce. Richard Hill, chairman, with his committee, has placed posters in business houses; and fire prevention literature has been given to students of the school. Lessons on fire prevention are being taught in the elementary grades.

The Iowa Park volunteer fire department has made 81 fire runs since January 1. Three were for homes and one was a garage.

The leaking ammonia tank was the most serious crisis here, when several persons had to leave home because of noxious fumes.

Fire Chief Roy Crabtree has had several articles in the Herald the past few weeks on Fire Prevention Throughout the Year.

Here are some startling facts: Every 37 seconds a fire breaks out in some city of the United States, damaging or destroying property and endangering lives.

Every two minutes fire damages or destroys a home in a United States city.

Every 46 minutes a person dies as a result of a fire in the U.S.

Fire claimed 11,500 lives during 1958.

SAFETY CHECK LIST

Each of the following questions, when answered "No," points to a fire hazard. Study your "No" answers and take steps to correct the fire hazards found.

Do you keep matches in metal containers away from children?

Do all members of your family know that it is the vapor of gasoline rather than the liquid itself which burns or explodes?

Do all members of your family know that gasoline should be kept in approved metal containers and never in bottles or open containers?

Have all members of your family been instructed never to bring gasoline into the home, nor to use gasoline to cleanse clothing or anything?

Have all members of your family been instructed never to use kerosene to start or quicken a fire?

Are your heaters and stoves of the approved type and listed by Underwriters' Laboratories, Inc.?

Do all members of your family know that fuel gas is toxic and involves a health as well as a fire hazard?

Do you know that installation, alteration and repair of gas lines in buildings should be done only by men fully experienced in this work, and the gas should be turned on only after the system has been tested for leaks?

Where flexible tubing is used, is it of an approved type?



Do gas burning appliances have clearance of at least 18 inches from woodwork and other combustible materials?

Do you keep closets, storerooms and attic free from rubbish, oil, rags, old papers, broken furniture?

Is an adult present during the entire time trash, leaves etc. are burned out of doors, and is the fire completely extinguished when he leaves it?

Have dead weeds and grass, dried leaves and rubbish been removed from your vacant property and vacant property adjacent to yours?

Do you know approximately two-thirds of all fires occur in the night?

Did you know your local fire marshal will make a Fire Safety inspection of your home upon a request from you?

Newman to tell of Christian wills

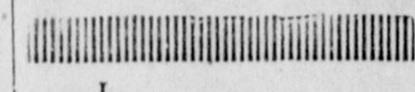

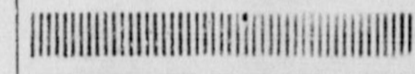

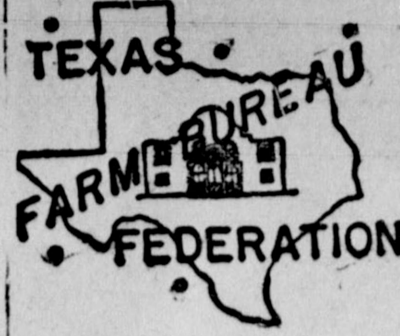

There were 31 members present.

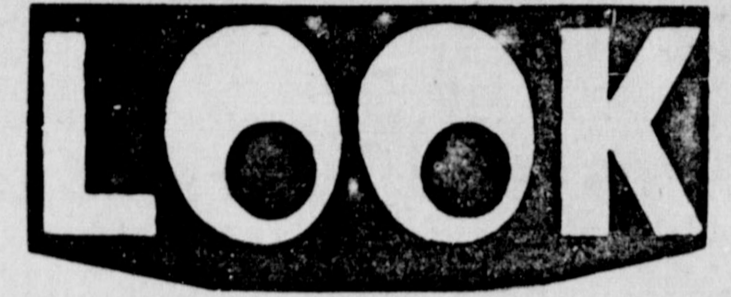

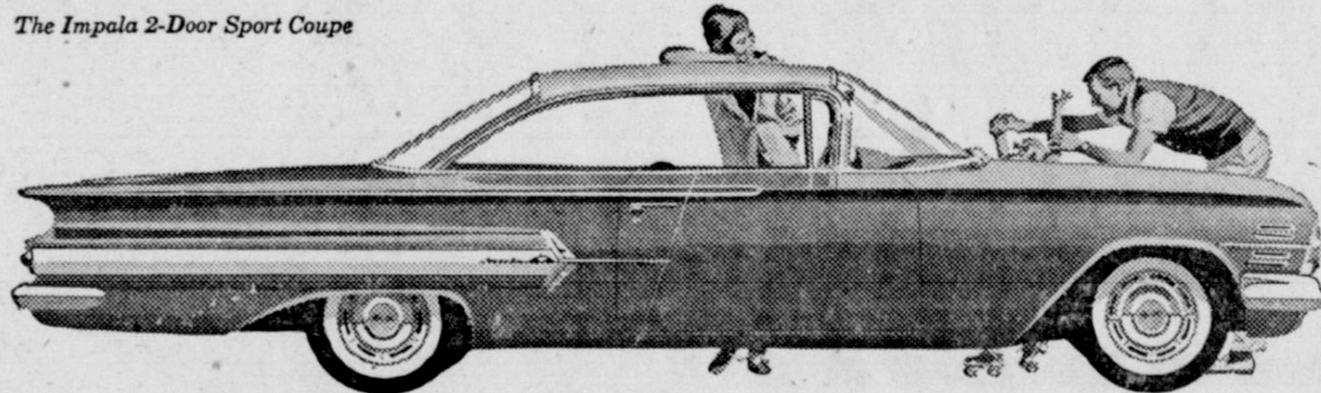

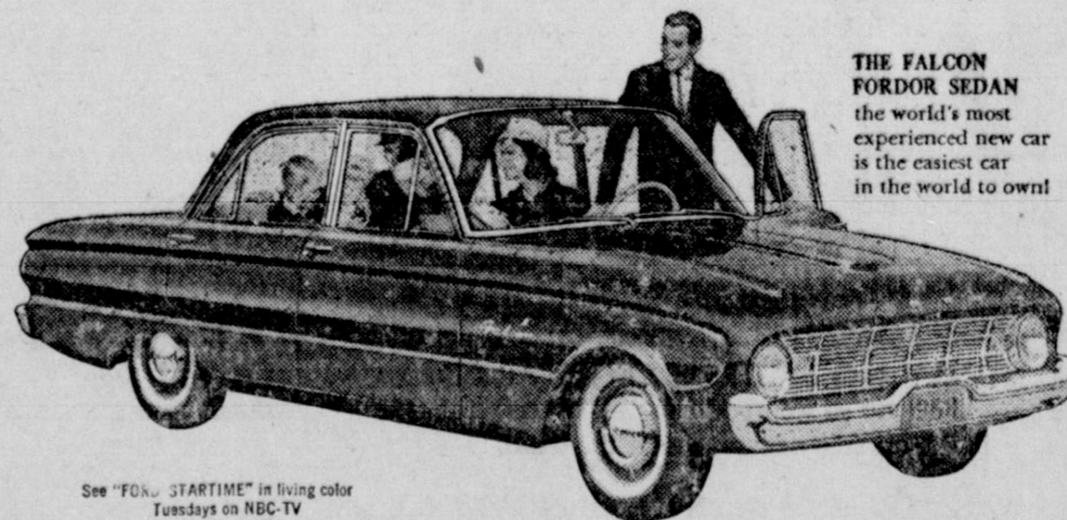
