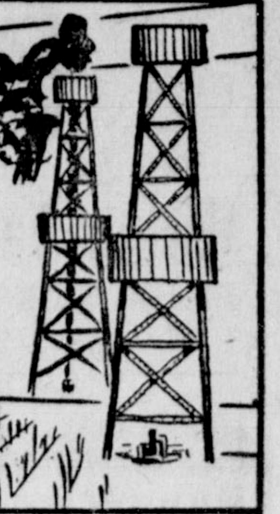

Moffett Asks for Re-election

Sen. George Moffett of Chillicothe has authorized the Herald to announce his candidacy for re-election in this district, which is composed of Archer, Baylor, Cottle, Foard, Hardeman, King, Knox, Wichita, Wilbarger and Young counties. In announcing his candidacy, Senator Moffett said:

"I want to thank the people of the 23rd Senatorial District for the confidence they have shown in me. I have sincerely tried to justify that confidence by advocating sound governmental practices in this state. If re-elected, I expect to continue to do so.

"This state's rapidly growing population demands a continuation of useful and necessary state services without unnecessary taxation.

"The next legislature must give thoughtful consideration to the expanding needs of our educational system, including both public schools and colleges. Texas certainly should be higher than 31st among the states in its support of public schools. Due attention must also be given to the growing needs of our state hospital system, which now houses over 25,000 inmates. The needs of our older citizens, state highways, health, and public safety agencies must likewise be properly recognized.

"Apparently, the State Insurance Commission, which is charged with the duty of establishing proper insurance rates, has made some mistakes, which deserve early correction.

"I believe that by hard work and conscientious service the next legislature can properly meet these problems. Although the answers will not be simple, I pledge my very best, I will not only appreciate your support in the coming Democratic primary election, but also value your counsel and advice in the interest of better government in Texas."

Senator Moffett, a lifelong resident of Hardeman county, is the first native of the 23rd Senatorial District to represent it in the state senate. He is well experienced in legislative matters, having served in both houses of the Texas Legislature. At the last regular session, he authored the bill which makes Midwestern university at Wichita Falls, a state university.

At a former session, he sponsored the bill which transferred a surplus in the Confederate pension fund to the construction of a state office building, which has resulted in a saving to the state of nearly \$250,000 per year.

Senator Moffett has been chairman of the committee on agriculture and livestock in the state senate for many years. He has vigorously supported scientific research for new and expanded uses of cotton and other farm products as the best long-range solution to the farm surplus problem.

He was recently selected by the Texas Faarm Bureau as the "Man of the Year" for outstanding service to agriculture.

Many of our readers know Senator Moffett as "Cotton" Moffett.

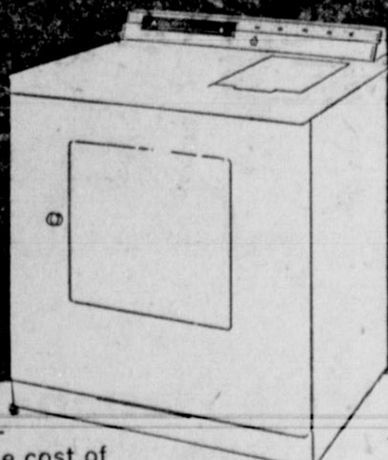

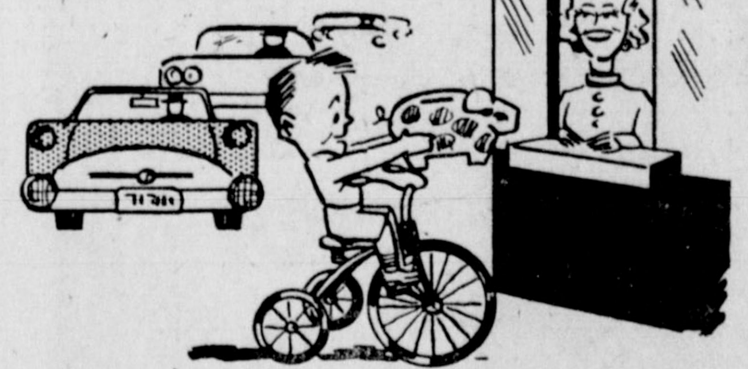
