Stanley C. Kirk Seeks D.A. Job

Stanley C. Kirk of Wichita Falls has announced he will seek the post of district attorney, subject to the May 7 Democratic primary.

Kirk is a graduate of Breckenridge high school and moved to Wichita Falls upon graduation from the University of Texas with bachelor of business administration and bachelor of law degrees. Since that time he has been associated in the practice of law with Jones, Parish & Fillmore, Walter Nelson Jr., James W. Dugger, and Carrigan, Hoffman & Carrigan.

At the present time he is practicing law by himself in Wichita Falls.

He was a Wichita county assistant district attorney four years, 1952-53 and 1957-59; and during his last term in office personally tried 219 cases and participated in the trial of 9 other cases. He also handled most of the office's administrative work and personally saw that restitution of over \$25,000 on hot and forged checks was made to Wichita county merchants and businessmen.

Kirk is a member of Floral Heights Methodist church where he is a Sunday school teacher and former member of the official board. He is a merit badge counselor for Boy Scouts and past cubmaster of the church's cub pack.

Kirk is a 38-month veteran of World War II and spent two years with the air force in Italy where he received five battle stars and the presidential unit citation.

He is married to the former Patsy Ballard, of Electra. They have three children: Karol 7, Cain 3 and Van 1.

In making the announcement, Kirk stated he would be a full-time district attorney, available at all times to assist citizens and law enforcement officials of Wichita county. He further pledges:

"To co-operate fully with all law enforcement agencies; disagreements and differences between such groups hurt the county and hinder the suppression of crime.

"To get better acquainted with the various communities' problems by having periodic meetings with law enforcement groups of this county. For example, the district attorney's staff should meet regularly with Iowa Park's police officials, grand jurors, and other interested persons to discuss their problems.

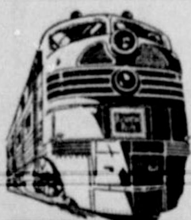

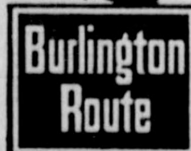

ABUNDANT LIFE

THERE IS UNLIMITED POWER IN PRAYER

The story of Helen Keller is familiar to all of us. She was without the power of sight, speech or hearing. In her childhood, Helen learned to communicate her thoughts to a world that she could neither see nor hear.

Miss Anne Sullivan went to the Keller home when Helen was just a child and undertook to teach her a language. Step by step Miss Sullivan brought Helen along dark, uncertain pathways until she could convey her thoughts by physical signs. She taught Helen about tangible things—a doll, a flower, a kitty.

And as the child mastered signs representing these objects one by one, Miss Sullivan was conscious that the time would come when she would have to tell Helen about God.

She dreaded the task, because it had been so difficult to teach her about tangible things. How could she ever get over to the little girl the idea of God?

Then one day when Helen was about 14 years old, Miss Sullivan took up the task. With Helen's sensitive finger placed along the side of her cheek, Miss Sullivan started to speak slowly, simply, almost painfully about God—the One who made us all and who loves us and wants to save us.

The deaf, blind girl sat with a blank look upon her face for a long time as her teacher spoke. Then suddenly the look of

blankness gave way to bright illumination. Reaching out, she grabbed her teacher's hand and spelled into it: "Oh, I am so glad you told me His name, for He has spoken to me many times!"

God could speak to Helen Keller, even though she could not hear audible sounds. Helen could converse with God, even though she could not speak. Prayer is communication with God in any form.

I have learned four secrets of answered prayer. Although everyone has had an answer to some prayer, he wishes to know the real secret of receiving more answers to prayers. Through years of experience I have learned these four things about prayer:

1. Learn to wait on God. This is the first step. We must learn patience. Prayers are not always answered immediately.
2. When God says no, He means He has a better way. If He says no, there is a larger yes that He wants to give you.
3. God may have something He wants you to do. It may be that you are not right in your spirit. We must learn to forgive one another.
4. A secret of prayer is expectation. If you want God to do something, expect Him to do it. God is able and willing to give us our heart's desire. When you pray, expect God to answer, for the power of prayer is absolutely unlimited.

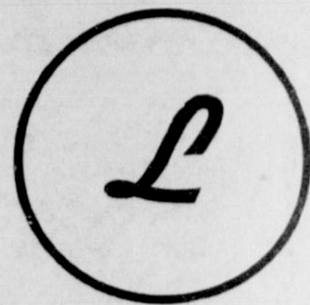

Chevrolet has added a new 2-door coupe to its Corvair line and shipments to dealers are now under way. The new model of the rear-engine compact car has the same basic dimensions as the 4-door Corvair sedan, but has its own distinct sporty styling motif. This is accented by a split front seat and a new roof design which features a large sloping rear window.



What's the outlook for the rest of 1960? This is a question received many times during January, says Thelma Wirges, county home demonstration agent.

The general picture is for continuation of rises in production, sales and retail prices of major household appliances and furniture. No radical changes or improvements in equipment design or function are expected.

Prospects for the passage of a federal Fair Trade Act during the next session of Congress are regarded as ranging from poor to good. Enaction of such legislation would largely affect prices of housewares and small electrical appliances which are currently being sold far below list prices.

The trend to upgrade items, that is, shift them gradually up the quality scale, may continue. Yesterday's deluxe or luxury item is today's standard model, but by tomorrow it may be obsolete.

Manufacturers and distributors now provide a great deal of information on furnishings and equipment. Information to guide consumers is available from county home demonstration agents' offices.

Trend in costs for both rental

and owner-occupied dwellings has been upward for some years. Expectation is that rents will continue to increase moderately, as costs to landlords increase. Likewise, costs for homeowners are likely to rise. Property taxes have been increasing steadily. Demand for rental and homeowner units will continue strong in most areas.

Home builders can expect increases in prices of building materials. Government supported mortgage rates have advanced to 6.25 per cent for FHA loans (including the 0.5 per cent insurance premium paid by the borrower) and 5.25 per cent for veterans' loans—the highest rates ever allowed in these programs. Mortgage interest rates will show some additional increase.

CHILLICOTHE MAYOR MOVES TO IOWA PARK

Dr. R. G. Warner, mayor of Chillicothe, has bought a home in Iowa Park and will move his chiropractic office and insurance agency here in 10 days.

His Chillicothe office will remain open and he will be available there each Saturday, he announced.

"It has been a source of real pleasure to be associated with and to serve the people of the Quana-Chillicothe area for the past 30 years, and I hope I find as many nice people in Iowa Park as I have here," Dr. Warner said in announcing the move.

Fellowships

Six research fellowships in atomic energy for graduate students in Texas colleges and universities will be awarded this summer by the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation and the General Atomic Division of General Dynamics Corp.

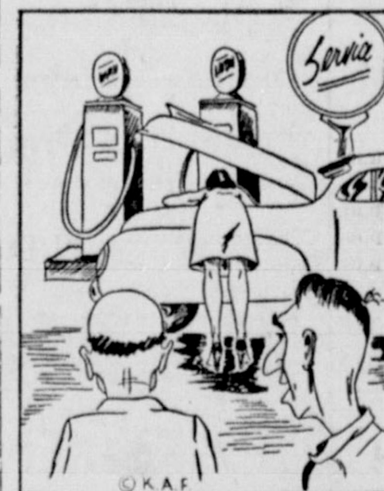
Texas Electric Service company is a member of the Foundation.

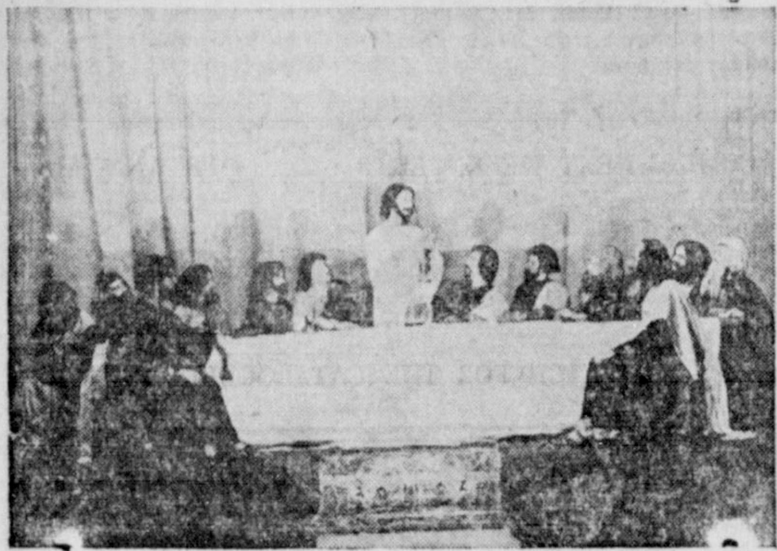

Farm Journal Item Features Parkans' Sod Inventions

The February issue of Farm Journal has an interesting article on the coastal bermuda sod harvester and seeder being manufactured in Iowa Park. Written by Charles E. Ball of the Farm Journal's southern field staff, the article says:

"When Mike Hartmangruber and his son Louis first hired out to plant coastal bermuda by hand on a Wichita county, Texas, ranch, they worked hard for a day-and-a-half and put in only one-third of an acre.

"There must be an easier way to do this," Mike told Louis. So they went to work in the rancher's shop and built a sod harvester.

"That machine worked so well that we decided to build another and go into the planting business ourselves," recalls Louis.

"That was four years ago. Last year, with both a sod harvester and a planter perfected, the Hartmangrubers soded more than 900 acres for other farmers and guaranteed a stand.

"Sod is so dependable that when good moisture is available, we can make the guarantee," says Mike. "Sod also stretches the planting season. You can safely plant it when the grass is dormant. We started Feb. 1 last year and didn't have to replant an acre."

"Elvy Sargent, local SCS conservationist, agrees. 'The average acre of coastal produces enough sod to plant 50 acres,' he says. 'Or if you buy it, the cost is \$5 to plant one acre—about the same as sprigs.'

The Hartmangrubers charge \$15 an acre for harvesting and sodding when you furnish the sod. They average 12 to 15 acres a day.

The sod harvester uses twin coulters, mounted seven inches apart, and a pointed knife to slice off and lift a ribbon of sod 1 1/2 inches thick. A chopping wheel with knives cuts the sod into squares, and a conveyor elevates the squares into a planter or truck.

"The sod planter uses a spiral conveyor at the front of the hopper to carry the sod squares out to each side and drop them into two

rows. The hopper holds three tons—enough to plant two acres—and has a hydraulic lift so it can be tilted while moving. Planting is semi-automatic—the planter's wheels press in the squares.

"For dryland planting or dormant sodding, we mount disk hillers just in front of the big wheels to cover the sod squares," says Hartmangruber.

"Thompson Tool Company, Box 547, Iowa Park, Tex., is now making the planter to sell for about \$2,250, and the sod harvester for about \$2,975.

"Farmers who've used Hartmangruber's services and machines are sold on sodding. It's mighty nice to get in 80 acres of coastal in one week," says R. A. King. "It's even nicer to have the stand guaranteed."

The Hartmangrubers said this week they are specially indebted to Elvy Sargent for assistance and encouragement in constructing the machines.
