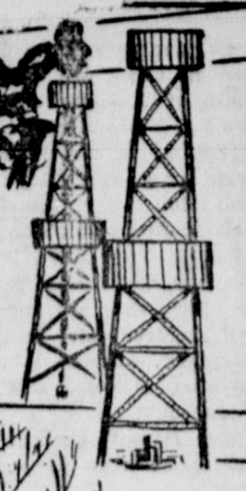

When the raiding party reached the trysting place, they were rewarded by finding some 25 or 30 men, apparently engaged in doing what they suspected all the time!

The result was that some 25 or 30 men were hauled off to the City Hall and fined varying amounts of coin of the realm. A husband of them were carried to Wichita Falls and there incarcerated till they could make arrangements for fine money.

Now, we suspect, residents in that part of town won't be bothered with that type of goings on in Our Town.

Incidentally, Iowa Park received much publicity by radio, television and the metropolitan press, so we believe the gamey gentry will seek other climes for their recreation.

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Garland Lehman Reports on Trip to Chicago and Grain Market

Garland Lehman has written for us the following report of his trip to Chicago, where he attended the 4-H Grain Marketing Clinic.

We left for Chicago on Jan. 10 for a three-day 4-H Grain Marketing Clinic and Tour. The place was Chicago Board of Trade, 141 W. Jackson Boulevard.

Those participating were: approximately 14 State and County Agents and sponsors with two state winners from Colorado, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Michigan, Missouri, Nebraska, North Carolina, Ohio, Oklahoma, Texas and Wisconsin. We were guests at the Conrad Hilton, the world's largest hotel and the best in the United States.

At 8:30 on Jan. 12, which was 'Cash Market Day,' we assembled for mass interview in Room 660. T. W. Thompson, service director, National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work, and Robert C. Liebenow, president Chicago Board of Trade, made the introduction and welcome to Chicago and to the Board of Trade. Then we went to the Visitor's Balcony to witness the opening of grain trading.

After the Story of the Market, with emphasis on cash transactions was presented, we proceeded to the laboratory. Here they demonstrated use of a thermometer in testing the temperature of corn and how three types of barley look after it is shelled and ground.

From here we boarded a chartered motor coach at Board of Trade at the Sherman Street entrance for a trip to General Mills plant, E. 104th and Calumet River, South Chicago. On the tour we saw the operations of the elevator and making of cereals and flour. We saw how they pack cereals and the way they pack them in the storeroom, which is done by machines.

I especially enjoyed seeing the wheat processed for cereals and cake mixes. Better still were the laboratories where these mixes are tested and baked.

We returned to the hotel by motor coach where we were dinner guests of Chicago Board of Trade. After dinner we went over to the Board of Trade for tape recording and pictures.

Second day of our tour was designated Future Market Day. Mr. Irwin E. Johnson guided us on a tour of the Trading floor. I especially enjoyed reading the ticker tape and the future market prices.

Early Wednesday morning we delegates from Oklahoma, Colorado and Texas were presented on a television program.

Wednesday and Thursday we heard lectures about Speculators and Speculation, Importance of the Future Markets to the Economy, Transportation of Grain, the Background of the 4-H Grain Marketing Program, the Importance of the 4-H Grain Marketing Program.

The speakers were respectively: Ardin P. Buell, partner, John G. McCarthy Co. and director of the Board of Trade; William R. Donne, Shearson, Hammill & Co. and president of Commodity Club of Chicago; E. M. Upland, general grain agent, Chicago and North Western Railroad; T. W. Thompson, service director, National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work; John W. Banning, associate leader, 4-H Club and YWm Programs, Federal Extension Service, USDA, Washington 25, D.C.

Wednesday evening we were the guests of Conrad Hilton hotel at 'West Ho' an ice show. Our activities for the final day were: a trip to the Observatory on the 44th floor of Board of Trade. Fog interfered with the view of the Windy City, and a final look at the opening of trading from the Visitors Balcony. I understood a little more about sign bidding and the future markets than I had on the first day.

On the last day of the Clinic we heard a panel discussion on How to Stimulate Interest, Participation and Co-operation in Our Country and State 4-H Grain Marketing Programs.

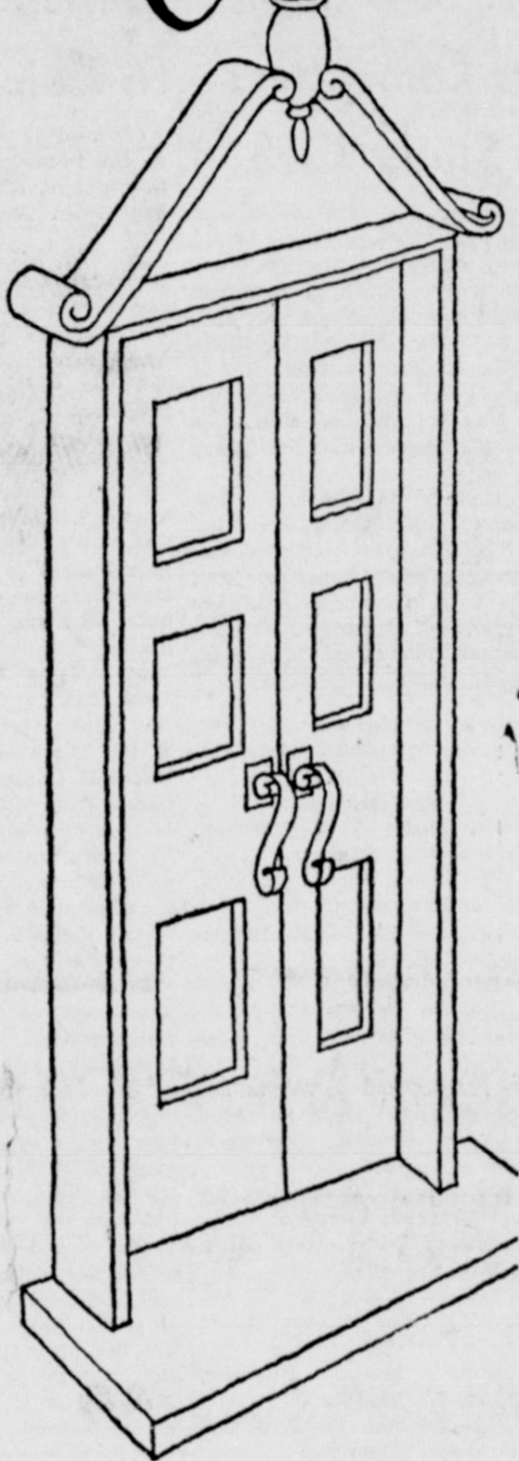

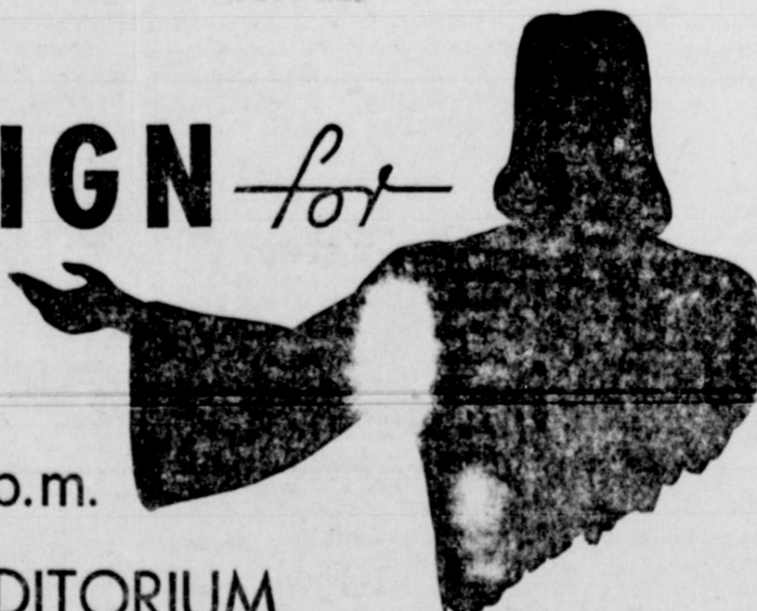


