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Bill Carnes Seeks County Tax Job

W. H. (Bill) Carnes of Wichita Falls announces his candidacy for election to the office of County Tax Assessor-Collector, subject to the May 7 Democratic primary.

In asking for a promotion to the elective office, he cites his long record of service in this tax office, his office management and accounting in private industry, and his varied activities in civic and community affairs as bases for his qualifications for the office.

Education
Carnes, 45, a lifelong resident of Wichita county, was born and reared on a farm near Burk Burnett, son of a pioneer family, Mr. and Mrs. Roy E. Carnes. He was graduated from Burk Burnett high school, attended Draughton's Business college, and completed higher accountancy courses through the Southern Methodist university.

Experience
Bill has worked a total of 10 years in the tax office of Wichita county, being familiar with the many different phases of the three departments. He held a position as office manager and accountant for a large Class I Motor Carrier, remaining there for 13 years. He is a past president of Texas Oil Field Haulers Accounting Council. While serving in that capacity he prepared and delivered a paper on Cost Accounting at a meeting of the National Accounting Council of American Trucking association in Omaha, Neb.

Civic and Church Work
In December 1940 Carnes volunteered his services to the Texas Defense Guard on the night it was organized in Wichita county. In 1942 the name was changed to Texas State Guard. He progressed to the rank of major, serving without any remuneration, until the battalion was mustered out in the fall of 1946.

He is a past president of the Wichita Falls Sertoma club, and was cited by Sertoma International for outstanding leadership during his tenure of office. He is a member of the Woodmen of the World fraternal organization. For several years he was a member of the Junior Chamber of Commerce. He worked with Boy Scouts for several years, serving as assistant scoutmaster of Troop 16 at the First Baptist church. He serves on United Fund and other civic drives.

Carnes is an active member of the First Baptist church, serving on the board of deacons, teaching a men's Bible class, and is an assistant director of an adult Training Union department.

Bill and his wife the former Lorene Rainey reside at their home, 1705 Monroe street. Their daughter Gloria and her husband W. R. 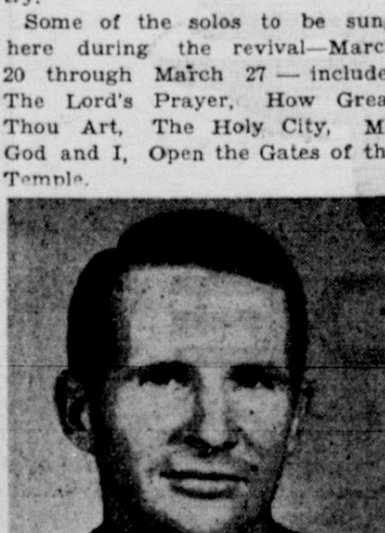

Mr. Matthews was a retired carpenter and painter.

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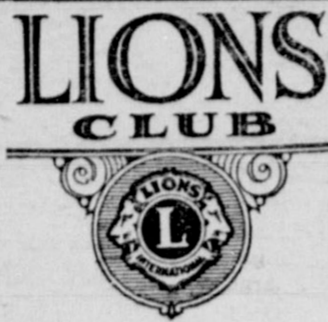

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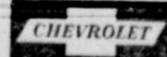

Garden Hints

from the Iowa Park Garden Club
If you are not already doing so, begin now to keep a garden record book. Record the dates of sowing seed, planting and transplanting for each variety. Note the time of bloom of each annual, perennial and shrub. Keep notes where and when plants and seeds were purchased and the results obtained. Such a record book, kept over a period of years, is invaluable.
Before spring work gets too heavy, repair all fences, arbors, lattice work and garden furniture. Repainting should be done before the vines start to grow.
Do not be too hasty in uncover-

ing protected shrubs or perennial and bulb beds.
The best time to plant roses is in the spring. Dormant roses will produce a large crop of blooms in the first season if properly planted, mound earth around them until growth starts.
Garden perennials will benefit from an early feeding.
Hardy chrysanthemums and most other late flowering perennials may be divided when they start to grow. Have the beds prepared, so they can be planted as soon as the divisions are made.
This is the time for pruning fruit trees but much less cutting is practiced now than in former years. The important trimming consists of removing broken or dead branches and those that rub against each other.
Wounds made by pruning, unless small, should be painted over. White lead and linseed oil paints, free from turpentine with a little lampblack added to darken color are satisfactory.
Do not sow Bermudagrass seed until warm weather is established.
Make the first planting of gladiolus corms, but continue until July. They may be left in the ground several years, but good growers dig them up each fall when the foliage turns yellow, storing them for the winter. Discard the large thin corms.
Prune early-flowering shrubs after they finish blooming, before growth starts, and they will not suffer any set-backs.
Roses should be cut back. The weaker plants should be cut more severely. Tea roses and old fashioned types need only to have dead and ungainly shoots removed.

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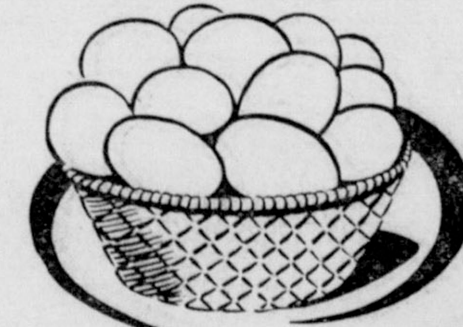

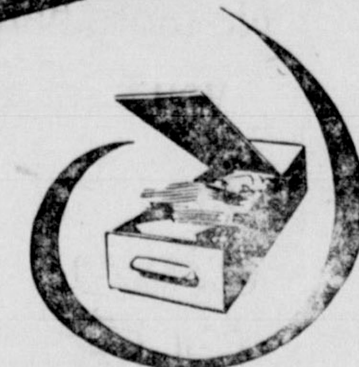
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
