## Smith Training Census Workers

A four-day school of instructor for census enumerators will be conducted next week in Iowa Park by China B. Smith, crew chief of the western part of Wichita county. Smith will conduct the course in two sections: 17 enumerators will study their duties in a morning session, and the other 17 will attend an afternoon session—each of the four days, March 28-31.

Smith has arranged to conduct the training school in the Iowa Park Presbyterian church.

Smith said this week he has been fortunate in securing enumerators who know their areas and should have little difficulty in counting all the people living in the area.

Census sheets were mailed out this week. Smith requests heads of families to fill them out and keep them in a safe place until an enumerator calls for them. Please do not mail them or try to hand them to an enumerator until called for.

Smith announced the census will be recorded as of April 1. A special trip will be made to hotels and motels the night of March 31 for recording all guests that night.

Then on April 8 the missions and jails will be visited for census purposes.

Word reached here this week that Fort Worth and Denver Railway company has applied for authority to discontinue its agency at Iowa Park; to establish Iowa Park as a prepay station in the freight tariffs for carload shipments only; and to discontinue passenger service to and from Iowa Park.

A hearing has been set up by the Railroad Commission of Texas to be held at 9:00 a.m. April 12 in the City Hall. The commission will at that time hear all evidence and statements that may be presented in favor of and in opposition to the granting of the application.

All Iowa Park area folk who are interested are invited by Bert Van Horn, mayor, to attend the hearing and present evidence and statements on this important question.

## Hawks Win Stephenville Meet

Iowa Park Hawks went to Stephenville last Saturday and competed against 26 other Class AA, A and B schools in the Tarleton College Relays. The Hawk team won first place in the meet.

The 440-yard relay team composed of Tom Pierce, David Parkey, Donald Thompson and Tony Waters finished second behind Ft. Stockton. The Hawks ran 44.6 seconds, the best time in the state this year for a Class A team. Ft. Stockton is AA.

Bobby Gilbreath was second in the high hurdles and broad jump and won the 180 low hurdles with a time of 20.2 seconds. This is the best time in the state this year for Class A schools.

Waters, who was suffering from a bout with the flu, placed third in the broad jump. He was unable to compete in the 100 and 220 yard dashes.

Donald Thompson was 4th in the 220 dash.

Lyndell Glenn placed second in discus and 4th in shot.

The Hawks were in second place with one event to go. They needed first place in the mile relay to win the meet. The team of David

Parkey, Jimmie Gard, Donald Thompson and Bobby Gilbreath won the event. Their time of 3:32.6 was the best in the state this year for a Class AA or A mile relay team.

Every boy who made the trip helped score points. Bobby Gilbreath was high point man. The coach received a wrist watch for having the winning team.

This Saturday the Hawks will be in a meet at Glen Rose.

Iowa Park thinclads split into two groups Saturday. One team went to Stephenville and the other went to Lockett.

The team scored 23 points in the Lockett meet to place 5th.
