Vance Seeks Re-election as County Sheriff

Ham Vance, former sheriff of Wichita county, filed for place in the Democratic primary for sheriff recently.

"I feel that the experience and knowledge and my added maturity will tend to make me a better sheriff than before," Vance said.

Ham claims that during his three two-year terms as sheriff more arrests and investigations were conducted by his department than any other time in the history of Wichita county.

"It is my intention to organize a hot check department to assist merchants of the county in collecting these checks. This problem has become so serious that something has to be done. During each year of my tenure of office, I collected over \$10,000 in bad checks. Now these checks amount to almost twice that amount per year.

"In order to get law enforcement on a high scale, I realize more than ever the importance of cooperation. I pledge to the people that I will go all out in co-operating and helping the district attorney, county attorney, justices of peace, district judges and probation department. The commissioners court is the governing body of this county and I pledge my support to them, the city police of Wichita Falls, Burkburnett, Iowa Park and Electra. They will get all of my help and co-operation."

"During my regime as sheriff I answered all calls day or night both inside the city limits and outside the city limits, assisting the city police in their law enforcement. I have never failed to co-operate with all law enforcement agencies outside of Wichita county and always will."

Before elected to sheriff in 1947, Vance had served five years in the Marine Corps, mostly in the South Pacific. Prior to the war, he had been a Texas Highway Patrol officer from 1934 to 1942 when he joined the Marines.

Vance has resided in Wichita county 46 years and is a graduate of Burkburnett high school. He attended Amarillo college and West Texas State college at Canyon and played football at all three schools. He pitched for the Shreveport Sports in the Texas League in 1932-33.

He married the former Lois Marie Thompson and they parents of one son John, 10, and a daughter Carol, 13. The Vances reside at 1812 Hayes.

Vance promised that if elected he and his deputies will answer all calls made to his department. He will base his campaign for sheriff on his ability to maintain good law enforcement throughout the county.

Vance pledges himself to an "all-out effort to eliminate juvenile delinquency by working with youth and associating with youth, and going to the parents for assistance."

He further pledges to maintain accurate records of criminals handled by his department and all associated agencies and to keep prisoners confined as prescribed by law.

Ham Vance has been active the past 14 years in the citywide Kid Baseball program and has served as judge and referee in the Golden Gloves tournaments in Wichita county.

Iowa Park won the Region 11-A track and field meet held in Denton last Saturday. The Hawks scored 126½ points. Hughes Springs was second with 54.

The Hawks qualified eight contestants for the state meet to be held in Austin on Friday and Saturday of next week. Those who qualified, and the events, were:

Tony Waters—440 yard relay, 100 yard dash, 180 low hurdles, and broad jump.

Bobby Gilbreath—440 dash, mile relay, broad jump.
Donald Thompson—220 dash, 440 relay and mile relay.
Lyndell Glenn—Shotput, discus.
David Parkey—440 relay, mile relay.

Tommy Pierce—440 relay.
Jim Gard—mile relay.
Jackie Brooks—mile relay.

In order to qualify for the state meet a contestant must win either first or second place relay team in the regional meet.

In last week's meet Waters set a new regional record in the 180 low hurdles—19.8 seconds. He won the 100 yard dash, was on the record setting 440 relay team and placed second in broad jump.

Bobby Gilbreath ran the 440 in 51.2 seconds to set a new record, won the broad jump, ran on the record setting mile relay team, and placed third in the 120 high hurdles.

Lyndell Glenn put the shot 51.3 to set a new record, and won the discus throw.

Donald Thompson placed second in the 220 dash and was on both the first place relay teams.

David Parkey ran on both winning relay teams.

Jim Gard ran on the first place mile relay team.

Tommy Pierce tied for second in pole vault and ran on the 440 relay team.

Jackie Brooks qualified as an alternate on the mile relay team.

The 440 relay team set a new regional record—44.7 and the mile relay team set a new record 3:30.1.

The Hawks are one of the teams favored to win the state Class A meet. They will get topflight competition from Sundown, Anahuac and George West.

This is the second time Coaches Bill Carter, Bob Howington and Joe Warren have taken several boys to state.

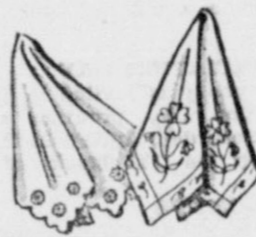

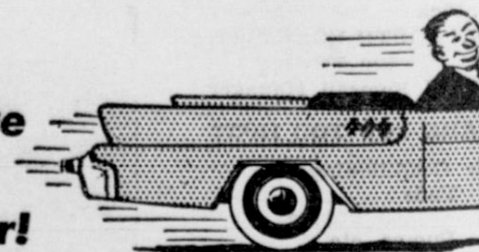
