Claud Reaves left here Wednesday morning to attend his brother's funeral service. Mrs. Lowrance was unable to go.

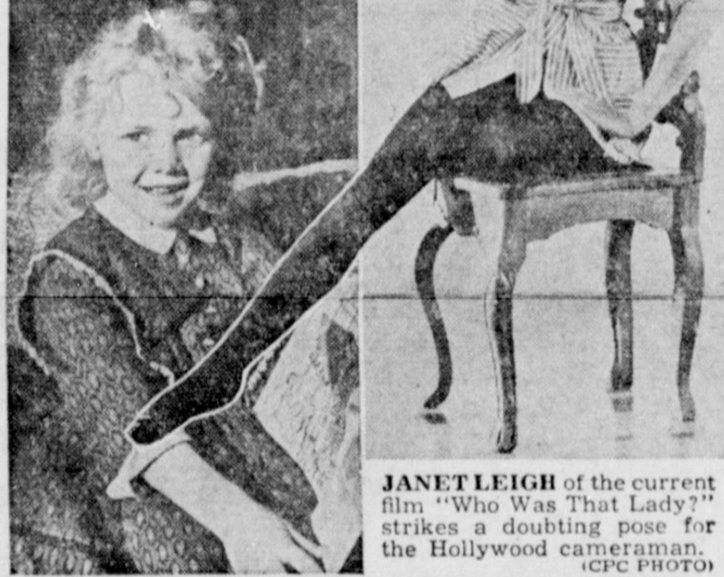

Mail Delivery Set For Iowa Park

Iowa Park will soon be taking another step forward. Through the efforts of Postmaster Floyd May and other interested citizens, we will soon have mail delivery service in the north part of town.

Effective date of this new service will be announced later. Street markers must be painted, houses numbered, and mail boxes put up.

There will be once a day mail delivery with two carriers. All houses and businesses in the city limits will get parcel post delivery but the house or business must be numbered to receive this service.

As soon as new additions and other parts of Our Town are built up more, mail delivery will be added.

This change will provide more post offices to those who have had to use general delivery because of not having enough boxes in the post office building.

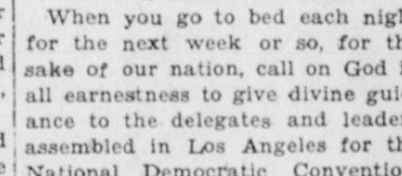
And when he described the kind of man America needs for the next eight years, surely no one fit that description like the Democrats' own Adlai Stevenson.

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

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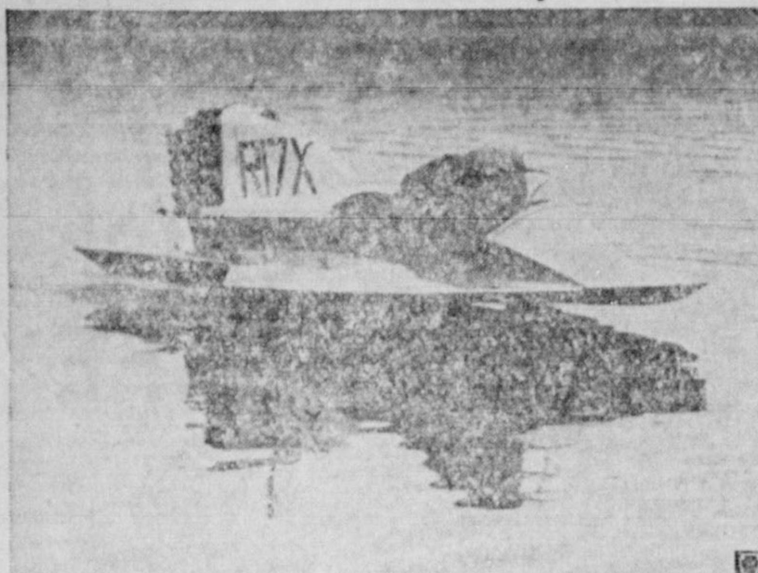
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Sets New World's Outboard Speed Record



SEATTLE, WASH.—A new world speed record for outboards is set by Burt Ross, Jr., Spokane, Wash., salesman, as he pilots this hydroplane powered by a production 60-cubic-inch Mercury outboard motor through a one-kilometer course on Seattle's Lake Washington at an average of 115.547 mph.

Ross, who went faster than any outboarder in history, eclipsed by almost eight mph the old internationally-recognized world record of 107.9 mph. He exceeded all but three of the largest inboard motorboat speed records set with engines at least 400 per cent larger than Ross' Mercury.

Ross' run establishes a new Union of International Motorboating (UIM) Class X outboard speed record. His 11-foot-hydroplane was built by Ted Jones, famed designer of Gold Cup speedboats. It is of streamlined three-point cab-over design with the pilot placed well forward in the hull. At full speed (above), the entire hull rides out of the water

with just the lower half of the propeller biting below waterline.

Ross also betters the National Outboard Association's speed mark of 114.6 mph set recently by a specially-modified 50-cubic-inch engine which had 50 per cent greater displacement than the 60-cubic-inch Mercury. The NOA unlimited class speed marks, not recognized internationally, allow engines of any size, while official UIM international rules limit displacement to 81 cubic inches.

The new official international record was timed and observed by American Power Boat Association officials. Following the run, and in accordance with UIM and APBA rules, the engine was inspected by officials and found to be a stock Mercury Mark 75H.

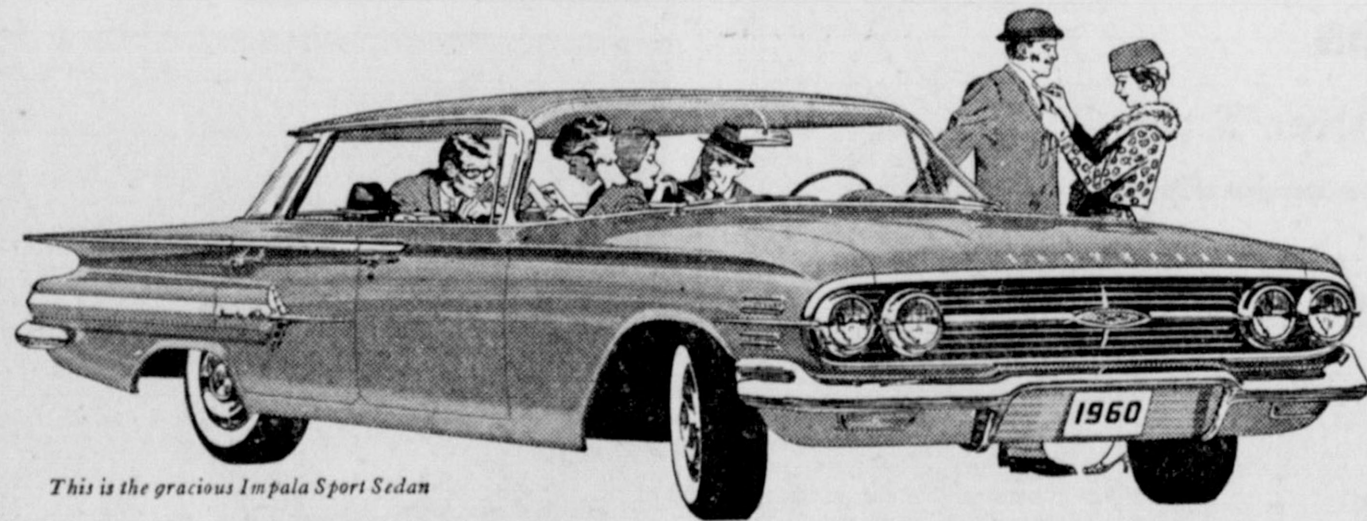
