Revenue Will Retire Indebtedness

WATER IMPROVEMENTS. Filtration Plant, estimate of cost, \$135,000 (Will increase our supply 1,200,000 gallons per day). Overhead Storage — 250,000 gallons, \$58,000 (Plenty for fire protection and pressure).

SEWER IMPROVEMENTS. Sewage Treatment Plant (estimated cost \$100,000. State grant of \$30,000 has been promised. This new plant will double our present treatment capacity).

Under the current proposed improvement and enlargement program, all sections of the City will receive direct and immediate benefits. Basic provisions will also be made for expected future growth.

The Need Is Urgent

By E. L. ANDREWS City Engineer. A predicted water rationing program for Iowa Park has not yet been necessary, due to the timely showers received. However, a long hot and dry weather period this summer will necessitate some type of water rationing program, even though the supply is ample.

The water and sewer improvements proposed in the program are urgently needed. The proposed method of financing the improvements is simple and desirable. The revenue bonds will be payable only from water and sewer revenues, and no tax money can ever be imposed for payment of the bonds.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1960.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4 proposing an Amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, increasing to three and one-half percent (3-1/2%) the maximum permissible interest rate on bonds hereinafter issued by the Veterans' Land Board; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended by adding thereto the following:

"The foregoing notwithstanding, bonds hereinafter issued by the Veterans' Land Board pursuant to the authority of this Section 49-b of the Constitution may bear a rate or rates of interest not to exceed three and one-half percent (3-1/2%) per annum.

"This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1960, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas by adding thereto a provision authorizing the Veterans' Land Board to issue the bonds authorized under such Section to bear interest at a rate or rates not to exceed three and one-half percent (3-1/2%) per annum.

"AGAINST the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas by adding thereto a provision authorizing the Veterans' Land Board to issue the bonds authorized under such Section to bear interest at a rate or rates not to exceed three and one-half percent (3-1/2%) per annum."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said Amendment, the Governor shall issue a proclamation to that effect, which shall become effective from the date set forth in said Amendment, and the Governor shall issue a proclamation in keeping therewith.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of the state.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1960.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas allowing an annual salary of not to exceed Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem allowance of not to exceed Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature as the maximum compensation for Members of the Legislature; limiting the Regular Session to one hundred and forty (140) days; and prescribing the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereinafter to read as follows:

"Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days.

"In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat now or hereafter to be established, no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra Session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of a Regular or Called Session."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 8th day of November, 1960, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment allowing an annual salary of not to exceed Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem allowance of not to exceed Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Session of the Legislature as the maximum compensation for Members of the Legislature and limiting the Regular Session to one hundred and forty (140) days."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment allowing an annual salary of not to exceed Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem allowance of not to exceed Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Session of the Legislature as the maximum compensation for Members of the Legislature and limiting the Regular Session to one hundred and forty (140) days."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and the same shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Section 1: That an election be held on the 20th day of August, 1960, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this resolution and order, at which election the following propositions shall be submitted to the resident qualified electors of said City, who own taxable property therein and who have duly rendered the same for taxation:

PROPOSITION NUMBER 1

PROPOSITION NUMBER 2

"Shall the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, be authorized to issue Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$300,000) of revenue bonds of said City, for the purpose of constructing improvements and extensions to the City's Waterworks System; said bonds to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed Thirty-Five (35) years from their date, and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed Five Per Centum (5%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually; said revenue bonds to be special obligations of the City, payable as to both principal and interest solely from and secured by a first lien on and pledge of the revenues of the City's combined Waterworks and Sanitary Sewer System, after deduction of reasonable operation and maintenance expenses, as said expenses are defined by statute?"

PROPOSITION NUMBER 3

"Shall the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, be authorized to issue Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000) of revenue bonds of said City, for the purpose of constructing improvements and extensions to the City's Sanitary Sewer System; said bonds to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed Thirty-Five (35) years from their date, and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed Five Per Centum (5%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually; said revenue bonds to be special obligations of the City, payable as to both principal and interest solely from and secured by a first lien on and pledge of the revenues of the City's combined Waterworks and Sanitary Sewer Systems, after deduction of reasonable operation and maintenance expenses, as said expenses are defined by statute?"

Section 2: That said election shall be held at the City Hall in the City of Iowa Park, Texas, and the entire City shall constitute one election precinct.

Section 3: That the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of the election, to-wit: Mr. Fred Parkey, Presiding Judge

T. E. Greathart, Judge
Mrs. E. R. Brubaker, Clerk
Mrs. E. E. Wallis, Clerk

Section 4: That said election shall be held under the provisions of and in accordance with the laws governing the issuance of municipal bonds in cities, as provided in the General Laws of the State of Texas, and only resident qualified electors, who own taxable property in the City, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote.

Section 5: That the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V.A.T.C.S., Election Code, as amended, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following:

PROPOSITION NUMBER 1

"For the issuance of \$88,000 Wa-

terworks and Sewer System Revenue Bonds, and pledging the revenues of the City's combined Waterworks and Sanitary Sewer System to the payment thereof.

"Against the issuance of \$88,000 Waterworks and Sewer System Revenue Bonds, and pledging the revenues of the City's combined Waterworks and Sanitary Sewer System to the payment thereof."

PROPOSITION NUMBER 2

"For the issuance of \$300,000 Revenue Bonds for waterworks improvements and extensions and pledging the revenues of the City's combined Waterworks and Sanitary Sewer System to the payment thereof."

PROPOSITION NUMBER 3

"For the issuance of \$75,000 Revenue Bonds for sanitary sewer system improvements and extensions and pledging the revenues of the City's combined Waterworks and Sanitary Sewer System to the payment thereof."

"Against the issuance of \$300,000 Revenue Bonds for waterworks improvements and extensions and pledging the revenues of the City's combined Waterworks and Sanitary Sewer System to the payment thereof."

"Against the issuance of \$75,000 Revenue Bonds for sanitary sewer system improvements and extensions and pledging the revenues of the City's combined Waterworks and Sanitary Sewer System to the payment thereof."

As to each of the foregoing three propositions, each voter shall mark out with pen or pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his or her vote on the three propositions, respectively.

Section 6: That a copy of this resolution and order, signed by the Mayor of the City and attested by the City Secretary shall serve as proper notice of said election.

Section 7: In the event the said revenue bonds submitted under Propositions 1, 2 and 3, above, are authorized to be issued by a majority of the resident qualified electors of said City, who own property therein and who have

duly rendered the same for taxation, voting at said election, and the same are issued and sold, the holder or holders of such bonds shall never have the right to demand payment thereof out of any funds raised or to be raised by taxation; and each bond issued or executed in pursuance of such election, shall contain this clause: "The holder hereof shall never have the right to demand payment of this obligation out of any funds raised or to be raised by taxation."

Section 8: That notice of said election shall be given by posting and publication of a copy of this resolution and order, at the top of which shall appear the words: "Notice of Election for the Issuance of Bonds." Said notice shall be posted at three public places in said City, one of which shall be at the City Hall, not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date on which said election is to be held, and be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Iowa Park, Texas, the first of said publications to be made not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date set for said election.

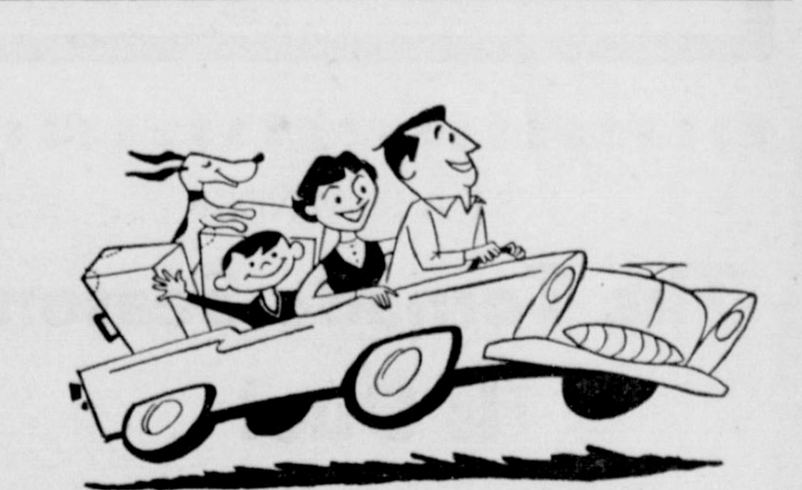
