Public Relations Study To Be Offered Here By A & M Specialist

A four-day course in public relations will be presented in Iowa Park beginning July 5 and running through July 8, according to Mrs. Lella Grace Livingston, secretary of the local Chamber of Commerce.

This course will be given in four evening sessions from 7:30 to 9:00 and will be open to all interested. Enrollment fee will be \$2.

Sponsored by the merchants committee of the local C of C, the four day event will feature E. A. Willeford, a representative of the extension division, University of Texas, in co-operation with the Texas Education Agency. Mr. Willeford is expected in Iowa Park shortly to make final arrangements for the course. Announcement of the place where the course is to be conducted will be made at that time.

The merchants committee has had favorable comment from persons who have seen this course presented, and feels it would be worthwhile to those of our community who desire to improve their manner of approach in daily contacts, regardless of their occupation.

MOLDED PRUNE FLUFF

1 package orange-flavored gelatin
1 cup hot water
¾ cup prune juice
2½ cups seeded cooked prunes
18 marshmallows

Dissolve gelatin in hot water. Add prune juice and chill. Arrange 6 prunes and 6 marshmallows in bottom of 2-quart mold. Dice remaining prunes

and marshmallows. When gelatin is slightly thickened, place in bowl of cracked ice and water and whip with rotary egg beater until fluffy and thick like whipped cream. Fold in diced prunes and marshmallows. Turn into mold. Chill until firm. Unmold. Garnish with orange slices and prunes stuffed with marshmallows, if desired. Serve plain or with Vanilla Pudding Sauce. Makes 8 servings.

VANILLA PUDDING SAUCE

1 package vanilla pudding and pie filling mix
3 cups milk
Combine pudding mix and milk in saucepan. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture comes to a full boil. Remove from heat. Cool, covered, or stir occasionally while cooling. Chill. Makes 2¾ cups sauce.





Need a new snack idea? Here 'tis!

This combination served with a fruit salad at lunch is wholesome eating, too, and there's no doubt that seconds will be called for.

Oatmeal is just one of the many cereals that can be used in a variety of recipes, and ice-cold milk is a fortunate companion to serve with any cereal dish. Cereal and milk are an unbeatable team nutritionwise because the two foods complement each other remarkably.



OATMEAL NUT BREAD

2 pans, 4 1/2 x 8 1/2
2 loaves
350°, 1 hour

2 eggs, beaten
1 cup sugar
2 cups buttermilk
3/4 cup dark molasses
3 cups sifted flour
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon baking powder
2 teaspoons baking soda
1 1/2 cups quick rolled oats, uncooked

1 1/2 cups chopped nut meats
1 1/2 cups chopped dates

Beat eggs until light. Add sugar gradually, beating well. Stir in buttermilk and molasses. Sift dry ingredients together and add to egg mixture. Add rolled oats, nut meats, and dates, stirring only enough to combine. Bake in two 4 1/2 x 8 1/2 bread pans, which have been buttered, lined with waxed paper, and buttered again over the paper. Bake in a preheated 350° oven for 55-60 minutes.

Soil Conservation

Now that moisture is in the soil, range and pastureland with a poor cover should be rested from grazing. Elvy Sargent of the Soil Conservation Service said this week.

Hardland ranges with poor cover may not have been wet deeper than 14 to 16 inches. This was discovered by SCS technicians making moisture penetration borings. Depth of moisture penetrations is determined by cover and tightness of the land. Farmers and ranchers may increase the cover and prepare for the next rain by resting some of their pastures from grazing while moisture is available.

Extreme summer growths have killed some grass, but seedlings have been found on these areas this spring and need protection until they have survived one growing season.

Why not seed guar on layout acreage or any land that will not go to fall seeded crop? Seed are reasonable and only five or six pounds are needed in rows or 12 pounds drilled.
