Supt. Keith Swim has announced the school buildings are ready and waiting for the opening of school on Sept. 6.

All elementary students are to register at 8:30 a.m. Monday, Aug. 29. Those living in the city limits on Jackson street and west of Jackson are to report to the new Ethyle Kidwell building and also those who reside in Country Hills Estates. Those who live east of Jackson and outside the city limits report to the school on East Cash.

Bill Hall, junior high school principal, reminds all 7th and 8th grade students to report in the school cafeteria Monday morning, Aug. 29, for registration. At that time Hall will also discuss the policies of the junior high as a separate unit from the high school.

To enter school all students must have a doctor's certificate showing they have begun polio shots.

ABUNDANT LIFE

"I HAD SIX MONTHS TO LIVE"

Fred O'Dell of Oakland, California, came to the Oral Roberts Crusade in Jacksonville, Florida, on April 5, 1955. He came to be prayed for in the name of Jesus of Nazareth. "I have only six months to live," Fred said, explaining that he had incurable lung cancer.

Today—five years later—Fred O'Dell is very much alive. He was healed instantly, following the prayer of faith.

"The night before I left Oakland for Jacksonville," Fred told me, "the doctors told me, 'I had six months to live. When I was first stricken with cancer, I weighed 167 pounds. Within thirty days I lost 29 pounds. X rays showed my lung condition and medical science looked upon my condition as hopeless. 'The night I was prayed for the power of God surged through my body in a glorious way. I felt I was healed of the cancer. As a matter of fact, I was so sure of it that the next day I went before the crusade audience and testified that God had healed my body.'"

Fred is a living testimony of what God can do for those who have expectant faith. He went to the Jacksonville Crusade expecting God to heal him. He turned his faith loose and God healed him.

Today Mr. O'Dell weighs 172 pounds. He works untiringly every day without undue fatigue.

"Many people have asked me how to receive healing," Fred said. "I can tell them to do only one thing—just turn your faith loose and trust God. When I turned my faith loose, God healed my body."

"It wasn't anything that I did; it wasn't magic in Oral Roberts' hands. There was nothing that anyone could do. Medical science could do nothing with my case. God was my last resort; so I just turned loose and let go—God healed me."

If you have an incurable disease, remember that Fred O'Dell was as desperate as anyone could be. His back was against the wall; the doctors had given him up to die. But he had faith that God could do what no one else could. Fred O'Dell built strong faith and used it. Fred expected to be healed.

I believe that expectancy is an important step in receiving healing, because to expect is to believe and to believe is to release your faith. When you release your faith to God and trust in His infinite goodness, then the miracle of complete health and strength is worked within you. You will experience abundant life.

Bond Election

Saturday, Aug. 20, is the day for Iowa Park property owners to go to the polls and cast their votes for or against the \$463,000 Water and Sewer Revenue Improvement Bonds. The election will be held only in the City Hall with Fred Parkey as judge; T. E. Gibbreath, assistant judge; Mrs. R. R. Brubaker and Mrs. E. E. Wallis, clerks.

Polls will open at 8:00 a.m. and close at 7:00 p.m.

A small interested group of property owners gathered last Sunday afternoon in the City Park to discuss the proposed bond issue and to ask questions of the mayor, city councilmen and city engineer and city water superintendent.

Since planning for the program is not complete, decisive answers could not be given to some questions, but all attending were of the opinion that the bond issue is a must if Iowa Park is to continue its growth.

Present demand on the water filtration and pumping plant already exceeds its capacity. Only the mildness of the summer temperatures has kept the City from having to ration water.

It was pointed out that the supply of water in Lake Iowa Park is sufficient for present needs — the immediate requirement is more treating, storage and pumping facilities.

Summing up, he said because the state is so rich in resources, it could have many more industries which would be a money making device for our area and for all of Texas.

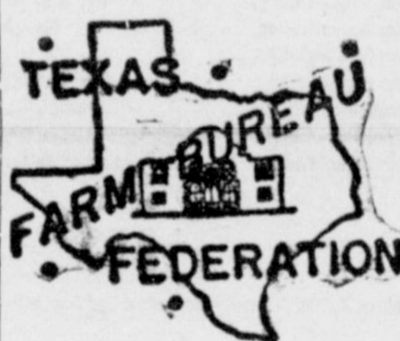
HIGHWAY 287 CARAVAN

Soil Conservation

One of the more important steps in soil and water conservation is that of working out with the farmer a co-ordinated plan covering each acre of land, and treating it according to the land class and potential, states James Park, farm and ranch planner of the Iowa Park work unit of Soil Conservation Service.

Park states the main tool for conservation planning is a range and soil survey on each acre. A range survey is best made while working with the land owner in making a forage inventory of grass found on a particular site, as certain land types produce different kinds of vegetation due to depth of soil, soil structure and moisture relationship.

A soils survey can assist in diagnosing farmland similar to a physician's diagnosis of a patient's illness. It will assist in pointing out hazards that might be unprofitable to farming of certain fields or areas due to soil depth, types of parent material underlying soil surface, slope of land and degree of erosion taking place, and the ability of a soil to absorb water.

The above items will govern the measures necessary to maintain each acre in accordance to the land needs and capabilities, and whether a rotation of high residue producing crops and proper management of residues are adequate to control erosion, or whether mechanical measures such as installation of terraces and waterways are to be recommended.

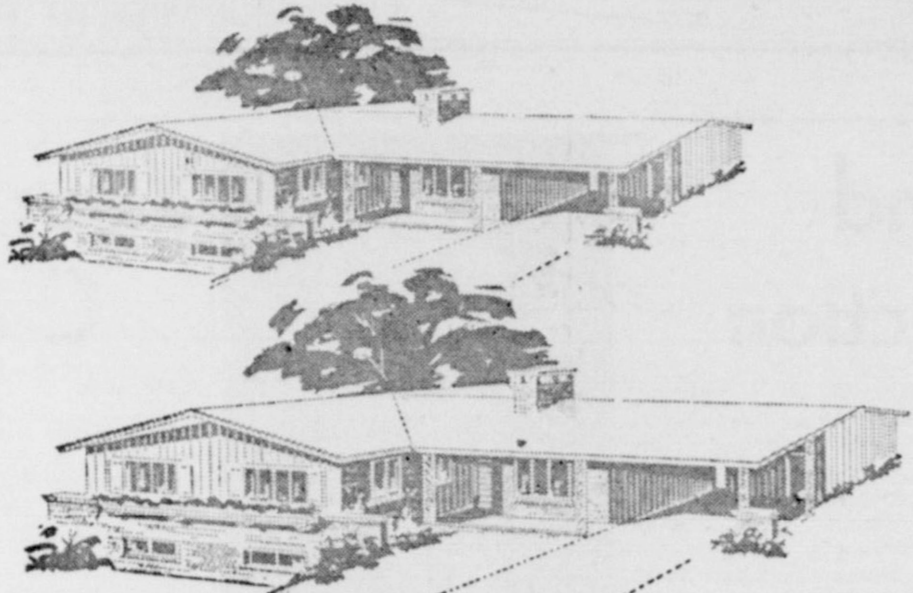

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1960.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4, proposing an Amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, increasing to three and one-half percent (3-1/2%) the maximum permissible interest rate on bonds hereafter issued by the Veterans' Land Board, and providing for the election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended by adding thereto the following:

"The foregoing notwithstanding, bonds hereafter issued by the Veterans' Land Board pursuant to the authority of this Section 49-b of the Constitution may bear a rate or rates of interest not to exceed three and one-half percent (3-1/2%) per annum."

"This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1960, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas by adding thereto a provision authorizing the Veterans' Land Board to issue the bonds authorized under such Section to bear interest at a rate or rates not to exceed three and one-half percent (3-1/2%) per annum."

AGAINST the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas by adding thereto a provision authorizing the Veterans' Land Board to issue the bonds authorized under such Section to bear interest at a rate or rates not to exceed three and one-half percent (3-1/2%) per annum."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the voters cast were in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and shall be effective from the date set forth in said Amendment, and the Governor shall issue a proclamation in keeping therewith.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of the state.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1960.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3 proposing an amendment to Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas allowing an annual salary of not to exceed Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem allowance of not to exceed Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature as the maximum compensation for Members of the Legislature; limiting the Regular Session to one hundred and forty (140) days; and prescribing the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days."

"In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two

Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county now or hereafter to be established; no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra days that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of a Regular or Called Session."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1960, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment allowing an annual salary of not to exceed Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem allowance of not to exceed Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Session of the Legislature as the maximum compensation for Members of the Legislature and limiting the Regular Session to one hundred and forty (140) days."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and the same shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Section 1: That an election be held on the 20th day of August, 1960, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this resolution and order, at which election the following propositions shall be submitted to the resident qualified electors of said City, who own taxable property therein and who have duly rendered the same for taxation:

PROPOSITION NUMBER 1

"Shall the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, be authorized to issue Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$300,000) of revenue bonds of said City, for the purpose of constructing improvements and extensions to the City's Waterworks System; said bonds to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed Thirty-Five (35) years from their date, and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed Five Per Centum (5%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually; said revenue bonds to be special obligations of the City, payable as to both principal and interest solely from and secured by a first lien on and pledge of the revenues of the City's combined Waterworks and Sanitary Sewer System, after deduction of reasonable operation and maintenance expenses, as said expenses are defined by statute?"

PROPOSITION NUMBER 3

"Shall the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, be authorized to issue Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000) of revenue bonds of said City, for the purpose of constructing improvements and extensions to the City's Sanitary Sewer System; said bonds to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed Thirty-Five (35) years from their date, and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed Five Per Centum (5%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually; said revenue bonds to be special obligations of the City, payable as to both principal and interest from and secured by a first lien on and pledge of the revenues of the City's combined Waterworks and Sanitary Sewer Systems, after deduction of reasonable operation and maintenance expenses, as said expenses are defined by statute?"

Section 2: That said election shall be held at the City Hall in the City of Iowa Park, Texas, and the entire City shall constitute one election precinct.

Section 3: That the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of the election, to-wit: Mr. Fred Parkey, Presiding Judge

T. E. Glibreath, Judge

Mrs. R. R. Brubaker, Clerk

Mrs. E. E. Wallis, Clerk

Section 4: That said election shall be held under the provisions of and in accordance with the laws governing the issuance of municipal bonds in cities, as provided in the General Laws of the State of Texas, and only resident qualified electors, who own taxable property in the City, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote.

Section 5: That the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V.A.T.C.S., Election Code, as amended, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following:

PROPOSITION NUMBER 1

"For the issuance of \$88,000 Wa-

terworks and Sewer System Revenue Bonds, and pledging the revenues of the City's combined Waterworks and Sanitary Sewer System to the payment thereof."

"Against the issuance of \$300,000 Revenue Bonds for waterworks improvements and extensions and pledging the revenues of the City's combined Waterworks and Sanitary Sewer System to the payment thereof."

PROPOSITION NUMBER 2

"For the issuance of \$300,000 Revenue Bonds for waterworks improvements and extensions and pledging the revenues of the City's combined Waterworks and Sanitary Sewer System to the payment thereof."

"Against the issuance of \$300,000 Revenue Bonds for waterworks improvements and extensions and pledging the revenues of the City's combined Waterworks and Sanitary Sewer System to the payment thereof."

PROPOSITION NUMBER 3

"For the issuance of \$75,000 Revenue Bonds for sanitary sewer system improvements and extensions and pledging the revenues of the City's combined Waterworks and Sanitary Sewer System to the payment thereof."

"Against the issuance of \$75,000 Revenue Bonds for sanitary sewer system improvements and extensions and pledging the revenues of the City's combined Waterworks and Sanitary Sewer System to the payment thereof."

Section 6: That a copy of this resolution and order, signed by the Mayor of the City and attested by the City Secretary shall serve as proper notice of said election.

Section 7: In the event the said revenue bonds submitted under Propositions 1, 2 and 3, above, are authorized to be issued by a majority of the resident qualified electors of said City, who own property therein and who have

duly rendered the same for taxation, voting at said election, and the same are issued and sold, the holder or holders of such bonds shall never have the right to demand payment thereof out of any funds raised or to be raised by taxation; and each bond issued or executed in pursuance of such election, shall contain this clause: "The holder hereof shall never have the right to demand payment of this obligation out of any funds raised or to be raised by taxation."

Section 8: That notice of said election shall be given by posting and publication of a copy of this resolution and order, at the top of which shall appear the words: "Notice of Election for the Issuance of Bonds." Said notice shall be posted at three public places in said City, one of which shall be at the City Hall, not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date on which said election is to be held, and be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Iowa Park, Texas, the first of said publications to be made not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date set for said election.

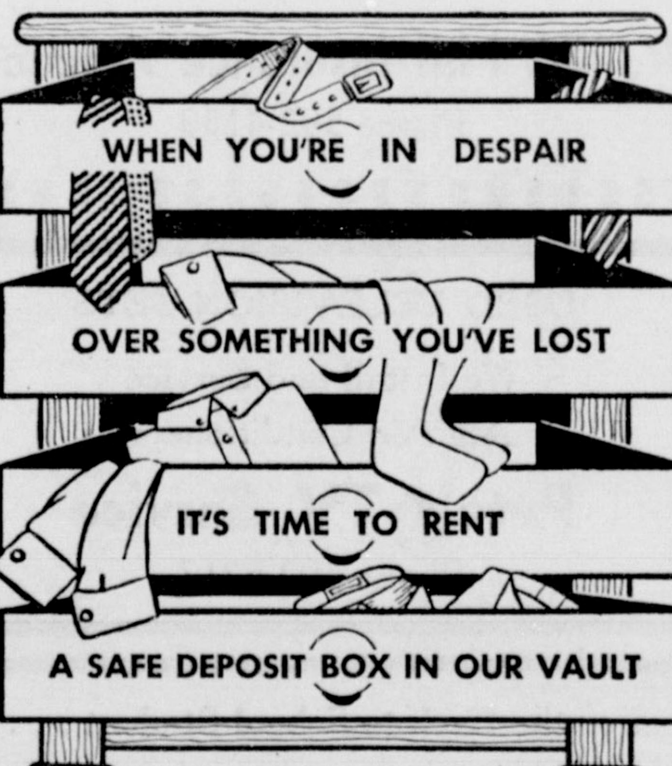

The Need Is Urgent

A predicted water rationing program for Iowa Park has not yet been necessary, due to the timely showers received. However, a long hot and dry weather period this summer will necessitate some type of water rationing program, even though the supply is ample.

Actual water consumption experienced on peak days has far exceeded the treating capacity of the plant, the elevated tank storage capacity, and the carrying capacity of the distribution lines. Storage has been low, pressures have been low, and not only inconvenience to the people has resulted, but fire hazards have existed at times.

Under the current proposed improvement and enlargement program, all sections of the City will receive direct and immediate benefits. Basic provisions will also be made for expected future growth.

A new 250,000-gallon elevated water tank is proposed, which will operate along with the existing 100,000-gallon elevated tank. The total capacity will provide adequate fire protection and will equalize pressures and supply throughout the City. Large mains are proposed to tie together and loop the two elevated tanks with the plant. Large mains are also proposed to be installed to eliminate long existing low pressure areas in all sections. A new large main is proposed to supply the South section with adequate pressures. Under the current program, addi-

tional facilities for mixing, settling, filtering, and pumping are proposed at the treatment plant. The additional facilities for treatment are urgently needed.

The existing sewage treatment plant is now so overloaded that effective treatment cannot be secured. Enlargement of the plant is proposed in the program. A federal grant under the Federal Anti-Pollution Law has been approved in the amount of \$33,989 to be applied on the sewage improvements provided the City undertakes the work.

The water and sewer improvements proposed in the program are urgently needed.

The proposed method of financing the improvements is simple and desirable. The revenue bonds will be payable only from water and sewer revenues, and no tax money can ever be imposed for payment of the bonds. The new issue of revenue bonds will not even require an increase in water or sewer rates because of the simple fact that current water and sewer revenues have been providing sufficient funds each year for extensive capital improvements to the system. The year to year improvements now need to be accelerated, and since the proposed overall program will eliminate the need for such year to year improvements for some time, funds now being spent on them will be used to retire the new bonds. Water and sewer revenues will also increase as the current building program develops.

Revenue Will Retire Indebtedness

REPORT TO THE PEOPLE:
 Your City Council expects to call an election for \$463,000 Water and Sewer Improvement Revenue Bonds.

We consider these improvements necessary to the future health and welfare of our City and request your support based on the following information:

1. No increase in water and sewer rates is required.
2. All bonds to be voted must be paid from Revenues and the law prohibits use of tax money to pay these bonds.
3. Present income will support the Revenue Bonds with wide margin of safety.
4. Present water and sewer facilities are operating at full capacity and water rationing will be required this Summer.
5. In the evening we have no storage pressure and a fire could be a serious calamity for our community.
6. The improvements are needed now and for our future.
