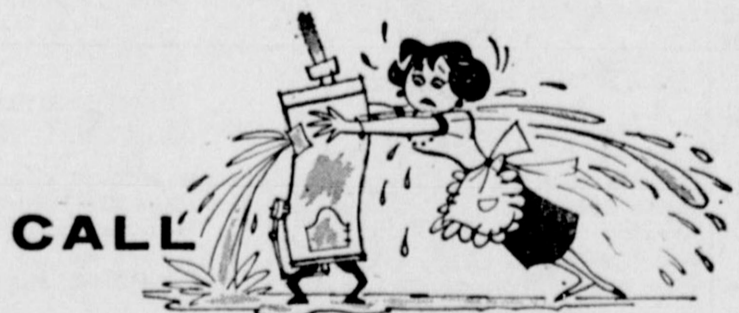

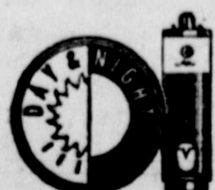

**MONUMENT TO A LITTLE BOY'S FAITH**

In a glass enclosure in our Abundant Life Building in Tulsa, Oklahoma, is a monument to the faith of a little boy. Here are displayed his built-up shoe and a pair of crutches—no longer needed because God healed the little crippled lad.

This ten-year-old boy's faith brought healing from God. Let me tell you about it.

Willie's hipbone was flat. One leg was 2-1/2 inches shorter than the other. For four years he walked in a built-up shoe and with the aid of crutches. He could not run and play like other boys and girls. Many times his little playmates took Willie's crutches away from him, leaving him standing at their mercy.

For four years, during Willie's school life in the state of Virginia, the only way the school children had ever seen him was on crutches and wearing that built-up shoe.

Willie's parents heard about our crusade in Roanoke. They told him that if he had faith when Oral Roberts prayed for him, God would completely heal him. Willie believed it. Before they came to the meeting Willie made his parents promise that if God healed him through prayer, they would go down the next day and buy him a new pair of shoes.

The prayer line was so long that night that Willie could not find a place to stand. After I

had finished praying for the sick, I was on my way out of the building, tired, exhausted and wanting to get to my room for some rest. As I was passing by the room where little Willie was standing on his crutches and built-up shoe, I looked into it. Why? I don't know.

I saw the little fellow looking so lost and helpless. Something got hold of me and I went in. "Son," I said, "do you want to be healed?" Little Willie said, "Yes, sir." I was too tired to pray a formal prayer, so I just reached out and touched his forehead and asked God to heal Willie's leg, in the name of Jesus. I then left the building.

A year and a half passed. I had not heard that Willie had been healed instantly by God. I was amazed as anyone to see him standing on the platform at another Roanoke Crusade!

Willie said that when I touched him, he felt his faith go, and God healed him. Immediately his leg, 2-1/2 inches shorter than the other, was lengthened.

He couldn't walk in his built-up shoe because it made his leg too long! His parents had to buy those new shoes before he could go to school.

Today Willie is healthy and normal. His built-up shoe and pair of crutches, under glass in Tulsa, Oklahoma, bear mute testimony to the power of a little boy's faith in God.

Of all the upland game birds in America, I think the most beautiful is the lordly, multi-colored ring-necked pheasant.

Before 1882, there wasn't a pheasant in America. But our hunters had heard of this crafty and tasty oriental bird, and a few were imported from China and released in Oregon.

The pheasant liked America—besides tasting good, he had good taste, too!—and today they're one of the leading upland game birds in the northern and central states.

But plentiful as they are, pheasants aren't always so easy to find. They seem to know when hunting season begins. However, a pheasant is one upland bird that's relatively easy to hit. He takes off with a loud cackle and flies fairly slowly until he gains enough altitude to give himself the gun—if we don't beat him to it!

Upland game, of course, means quail in the South. By comparison with the pheasant, the gallant Bobwhite seems jet-propelled. When a whole covey takes to the air at once it sounds something like an Air Force squadron.

Half the fun of hunting quail is watching the dogs at work. They're fascinating!

Other popular upland birds are ruffed grouse, dove, woodcock, snipe and wild turkey. Believe me, they're all great for testing your skill—and filling your skillet!

Annual report of Wilbarger-Wichita SCD has been completed. Stubble mulching and crop residue use was applied on 66,900 A. Some 57,000 A. were in soil improving crops, such as winter peas, alfalfa and guar. 67,000 A. are terraced. 2,519 A. of range were seeded and 1,019 A. of pasture planted. 24 waterways were completed

and an additional 50 were shaped. Dead litter was established and ready for seeding. Brush was controlled on 44,000 acres. Proper range use was applied on 73,000 acres. The district has 1,479 co-operators and 667 co-operators made initial applications of one or more practices. Many more re-applied recurring practices. W-WSCD was honored as the outstanding district in Region 5 of Texas and received \$300 for the award. It also ranked first in Region 5 in the National Farm Life program. Many service clubs had programs on soil conservation; and the press, radio and television furnished valuable information.

## Banquet

Over 300 Iowa Park citizens and guests attended the annual All-Town Banquet sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce Thursday, Dec. 1. Principal speaker was Mr. Reagan Brown, rural sociologist with Texas A & M college extension service.

Brown said the Challenge of Choice is an important problem facing rural towns with modern transportation making it only a 30 minute ride to major shopping centers around a person's home.

Each center must be made attractive enough to cause people to want to trade there.

He also stressed the importance of raising healthy and sound children, because a major problem of our nation is juvenile delinquency.

A report of the progress of our Town of Friendly Living during 1960 was given by Leslie Clapp, outgoing president. Donald Hill showed color slides of homes and businesses here.

Elvy Sargent introduced guests from Archer City, Burkburnett, Electra, Valley View, Wichita Falls and other surrounding communities.
