## Jug of Gasoline Explodes in Car Wichita Dies

Marshal Henry Jones is helping other county law enforcement officers investigate the mysterious death of David L. Houston, 65, of Wichita Falls.

Houston was so badly burned around 10:00 a.m. Monday that he died Wednesday at 8:30 p.m.

According to Raymond Rathke and L. D. Williford, both of Iowa Park, the victim was sitting in his 1941 Chevrolet on a gravel road three miles east of Iowa Park when they parked behind him. A few minutes later the car burst into flames and they jumped out of their auto and tried to pull him out.

Houston seemed to wake up out of a daze, jumped from the flaming machine and ran about 75 feet down the road before falling.

Rathke and Williford managed to smother the flames.

F. D. Jones, a farmer about a half-mile west of the scene, told officers he saw the smoke and ran to the car. When he arrived Houston was lying at the side of the road.

Houston said before he died there was a gallon jug of gasoline on the floor of the car when he left home that morning.

Iowa Park Volunteer Firemen were called to extinguish the fire in the automobile, which was a total loss.

Mr. Houston was carried to the hospital in a Tanner ambulance.

Traffic fatalities in the nation in 1954 decreased from 38,300 to 36,300. During 1954 someone was killed in a traffic accident every 3 hours and 36 minutes on an average.

Someone was injured every 307 seconds.

Traffic deaths on state and federal highways outside of cities and towns have decreased three consecutive years. Through March 1955 there was a decrease under the same period in 1954, which is a good start on a decrease for four straight years.

It is on these roads that Texas highway patrolmen do most of their work because 300 patrol cars cannot begin to cover 26,000 miles of state and federal roads, let alone farm to market and county roads.

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## Ditchbank Meditations

by Bill Rippl  
INTEREST IN IRRIGATED PASTURES IS GROWING

Interest in irrigated pastures is growing. Some combinations that are working well are alfalfa-alfalfa mixture and coastal bermudagrass over-seeded with alfalfa or Madrid sweetclover. Johnsongrass and alfalfa or Madrid clover make a good combination if properly managed.

Alfalfa or clover, mixed with the grass, not only increases yield of forage but also raises its protein content. Grass with the legume helps to prevent bloat.

All the time the grass-legume pasture program is going on, the soil is improving. Deep roots of the legume are opening up the tight soil area, hardpan or plow sole. Both are increasing water holding capacity of the soil and helping to prevent erosion. If properly handled, such a program leaves the soil in better condition than it was before.

There are many advantages and some disadvantages in grazing irrigated pastures. In a grazing program the livestock do the harvesting. They also spread their own manure. On the other hand, tramping of the fields when wet is not good for the soil.

In these days of high labor and machinery costs it is quite an advantage to have bossy harvest her own feed. The same applies to the manure problem. It has been estimated that the manure from a herd of 30 milk cows, if fully utilized, is equal to 9 tons of sulphate of ammonia, 2.25 tons of superphosphate and 4.25 tons of potassium—annually, that is. This means that cows on pasture are putting back on the soil much of the food value taken out in the forage they consume.

Farmers who have tried irrigated legume-grass pasture say that milk production always increases when the cows go on such pasture. If that Johnsongrass field is worrying you, why not add a little alfalfa or Madrid sweetclover—about six pounds of seed per acre—and see what the cows can do with it.

Much of the marginal land of the Wichita Irrigated Valley can be reclaimed for pasture. Coastal bermudagrass and clover will do the job. In extreme cases some drainage is first in order and then some flooding to leach out excess salts. It has been noted that some such land has been reclaimed for cotton and other intolerant crops. Coastal bermuda will grow farther into the distressed areas than most any crop we know.

According to reports from the local Experiment Station, coastal bermuda pastures may be over-seeded in the fall with alfalfa or Madrid sweetclover which will increase yields and raise the protein content of forage. Button clover also appears promising for this purpose. Vetch may be used on the lighter, sandier soils but is more sensitive to local problems.

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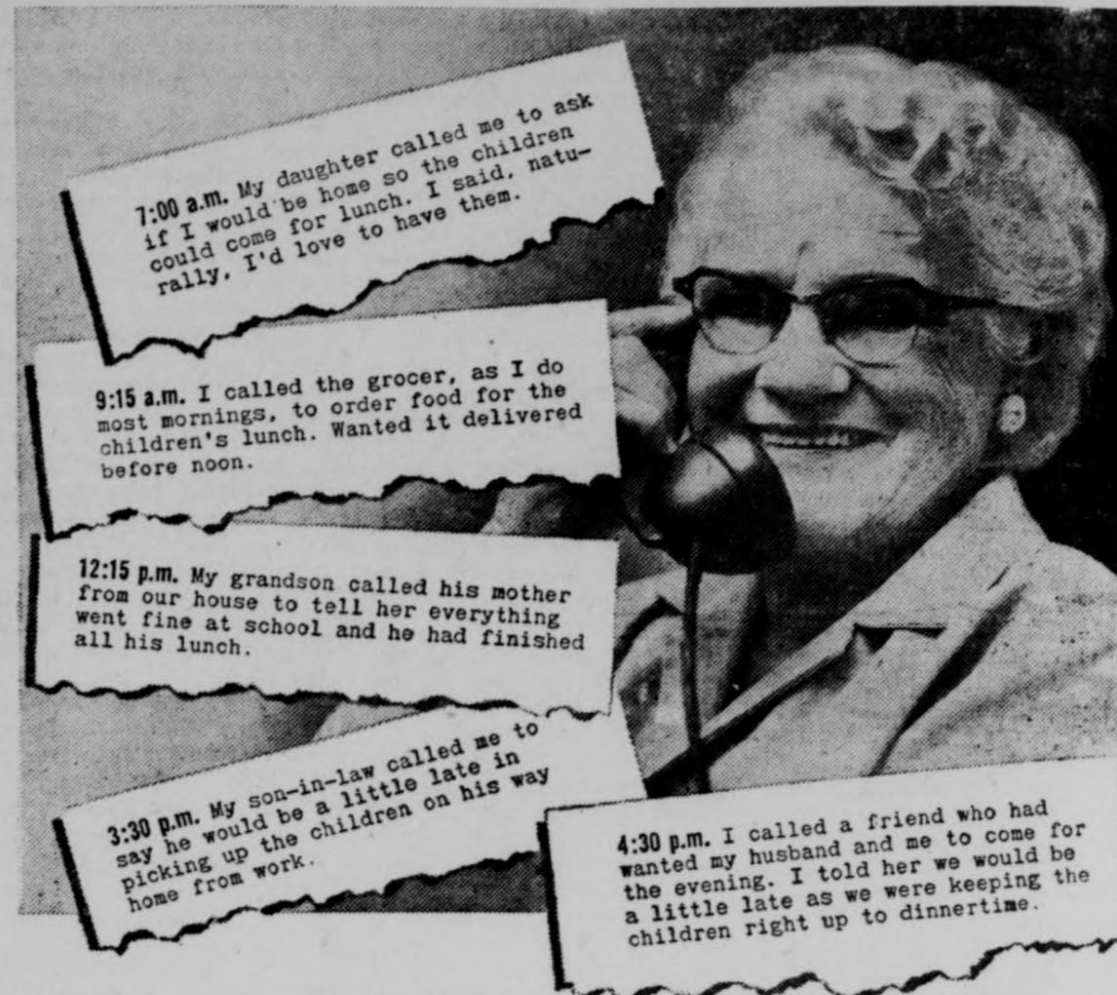

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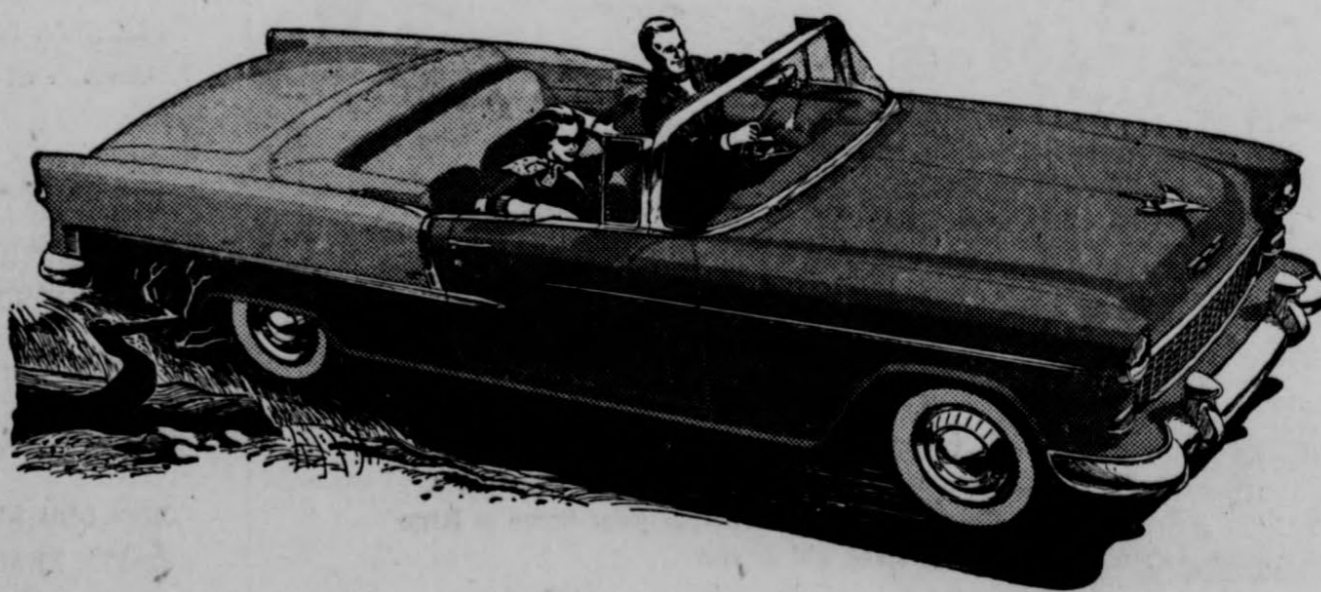
