
## Park Boy to Wed Californian

## Granbury Wins Iowa Park Meet

Granbury won the third annual Iowa Park Track Meet last Saturday by scoring 96 points. Iowa Park was second with 86.

Hawks were not without their heroes, however. Bobby Gilbreath won the 180 low hurdles with one of the fastest times in the state this year—19.4. He also won the 120 high hurdles in 15.4; and was second in broad jump with a leap of 21 ft. 7 1/2 in.

Mike Davenport threw the discus 134 ft. 4 in. to win first place and Jimmy Gillispie threw it 131 ft. 8 in. to place second.

Hawk mile relay team — Otha Woods, Jim Gard, David Parkey and Bobby Gilbreath—won in record breaking time of 3:30.4.

Others who scored for Iowa Park were Otha Woods, third in the 880; Gilbert Stogsdill who broke the mile record when he ran 4:53.6 but placed only third; Jim Gard, second in the shotput with 45 ft. 5 1/2 in.

The meet was conducted in ideal weather, and 25 teams were entered. Boys from Winters, Springtown, Hamlin, Midlothian and Granbury came the farthest.

Men of Iowa Park pitched in to help run off the meet by acting as officials. This made the entire program a success because of the efficient manner in which they handled their duties. A big vote of thanks and expression of gratitude is hereby given to each one of them.

## Water, Sewer

Water Superintendent J. C. Keiningham reports the new 14 inch water line connected with the new water plant was tied to the overhead water tower on Cash street Tuesday night at 12:30.

When completed, Iowa Park's two filtering plants will be able to treat 1,800,000 gallons of water in 24 hours. These two plants are located at the end of North Wall.

Construction of a new overhead water tower at the end of North Jackson has been started. This tower will have a capacity of 250,000 gallons.

Plans call for new 12 inch and 10 inch water lines running to Fourth street to the city limits. A 10 inch line from Cash to Chestnut will take water to the south part of town; and there will be a 6 inch loop from Bond on Pecan to Texowa.

New fire hydrants have been set at Cash and Bond; Bond and Park; Aldine and Bond; Pacific and Louisa; Pecan and Bond and Crystal and Bond.

New hydrants have been installed to replace old ones at the Park Hotel, City Hall, Famous Department Store, White's Store and Baptist church corners. All old fire hydrants are tied into the new water mains.

The new sewage disposal plant just south of the old one in the southwest part of town and the old disposal plant which is being completely rebuilt will be sufficient for approximately 7,000 persons.

New sewerage lines are being laid: a 12 inch line from Highway 287 to the sewage plants; a 10 inch line from the highway to Aldine street; an 8 inch line from the highway to Bank street on Bond, then to Pacific.

Loops and large main lines with booster stations will make the sewerage facilities fully capable of serving Iowa Park now and in the near future.



### Farmers Union

National Farmers Union will have its annual convention in Washington, D.C. the four days March 13 to 16.

This will be the first time in the farm organization's 59 years the national convention has been held in the nation's capital, and attendance is expected to be the greatest ever.

Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman, Labor Secretary Arthur Goldberg, Food for Peace Program Administrator George McGovern, and Under-Secretary of State Chester Bowles have accepted invitations to speak to the convention.

President John F. Kennedy has been invited to address the assembly. If he does it will be only the second time in modern history a President has appeared at a farm organization convention.

There will be an address by John A. Baker, formerly head of NFU's Washington office, now director of Agricultural Credit Services in USDA.

The program has been arranged for delegates to meet with their Senators and Representatives; and tours of historic monuments have been planned, including a special tour of the White House.

H. R. 10, a bill allowing self-employed persons tax benefits for setting up their own retirement programs, is gaining backers in Congress and may have some chance of passing this year.

George McGovern has returned from Latin America and reported he was appalled by the misery and hunger. He is hopeful American abundance can do much toward bringing about land reform and economic development there.

Orville Freeman told a television audience that if the cost of food had risen as much during the past eight years as the cost of other things we use, it would have cost consumers \$70 billion more to eat. He said too much emphasis has been put on the negative side of agriculture during the past eight years when, actually American agriculture is a "magnificent, unbelievable success."
